County Cancer Group Meets

The Washington County unit of the American Cancer Society held its first meeting for the 1975-76 year on Nov. 12 at the West Bend Mutual Insurance Company.

Lillian Fischer, Betsy Schultz and Jan Smith re-Betsy ported that they represented Washington County at the Wisconsin Division's annual meeting Oct. 17 and 15 in Oconomowoc where the county unit received a certificate for having surpassed its crusade goal. Washington County was also recognized with a special award for holding a successful fund raising event. In other business, President Gary Draeger presented an engraved plaque to Gehl Company for its help with the past crusade, and said plans are being made for next year's event.

According to other com-mittee reports, breast selfexamination teach-ins were held recently for the staff of the Cedar Lake Home. 1976 County Fair Plans Beginning To Develop

Plans for the 1976 Wash-ington County Fair are be-ginning to develop, according to County Agricultural Agent Maurice Hovland.

The most recent was a meeting of the Livestock Sales Committee, chaired by Roy Esser. The purpose of the meeting was to get plans underway for the 1976 sale. The committee was most interested in getting a competent judge, making sure that rules were established and that there was a way to enforce the rules. It was indicated that the public should know about the action of the committee throughout the year.

One of the things the committee discussed in quite detail was the work of Production Credit Association (PCA). During the discussion the question arose, does the public really understand the role of Production Credit As-

sociation in the sale event? According to Esser, Pro-duction Credit Association functions only as a clerk for the sale. They do the bookkeeping, help handle the sale, and advance \$40,000 worth of checks so the showmen can have their money immediately after the fair. In other words, PCA finances the sale. In addition, they as an organization and individuals, purchase a number of animals, plus buying tro-phies for the dairy show.

It is support such as PCA gives the organization that can help make it a success or According to Esser, failure. without the PCA's support. operating the sale would be difficult.

The committee indicated that they would again be sell-ing about 40 head of beef. The number of swine and sheep would be determined at a later date.

In addition to PCA's support, it is also absolutely necessary that we have the support of other people that assist, and receive nothing for their efforts except hopefully the thanks of the public. Keep Rural Mail Boxes Clear, Local Postmaster Urges

The cooperation of rural postal customers in helping to keep approaches to mail boxes clear during the coming winter months was requested today by Postmaster Harry E. Koch.

"Postal customers are responsible for keeping approaches to their mail boxes clear of snow and other obstructions that would make mail delivery difficult or impossible," Postmaster Koch said. "People should be aware that failure to clear paths to mail boxes promptly after heavy snows may temporarily prevent carriers from making deliveries. Customers will be contacted if they have an obstructed mail box."

There may also be a need to ask postal customers to relocate their boxes on a new line if excessive and extended detours are necessary, the postmaster said.

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
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


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Indians Open With Overtime Win **Over Strong Plymouth Team, 75-70**

In a hard fought non-con-ference battle at Plymouth Friday night, the Kewaskum Indians opened their 1975-76 basketball season with a come-from-behind overtime victory, 75-70, over the Panthers.
