Unfair Labor Practices Noted in Westra Picketing at Kewaskum School Projects

An administrative law judge for the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) has found eight Milwaukee area unions guilty of unfair labor practices in connection with strikes at two Kewaskum School District projects.

The judge ruled that the eight unions engaged in unfair labor practices by inducing subcontractors for Westra Construction Co., of Waupun to strike. Westra is a nonunion centractor.

Westra entered into sub-contracts with Rohde Brothers of Plymouth and Spancrete Industries of Valders for some of the structural work. Mueller Pipe!iners of New Berlin had the contract for installation of

Judge Wellington A. Gillis of Washington, D.C. ruled that the eight Milwaukee area unions involved in the case engaged in unfair labor practices by inducing employes of the three firms to refuse to

The judge also stated that the unions persuaded Rohde, Spancrete and Mueller to cease doing business with Westra Construction.

Westra contracted with the Kewaskum Community Schools District to build a new middle school and an addition to the high school. The school project amounted to about \$1.6 million remodeling including equipment.

Judge Gillis ordered the unions to cease such actions and to post in union halls for 60 days an NLRB order supporting his judgment.

denied a ! 1 The unions denied a!l charges of unlawful conduct. Union officials said picketing at the job site was legal and added that no threats or inducements were made to subcontractors.

Construction of the middle school and related school district projects began in 1973.

Iron-based Metal: Tin resource recovery program. cans - remove both ends,

Aluminum: Aluminum foil, junk aluminum, siding, TV dinner trays, pot pie tins, door and screen frames, aluminum beer and soda cans (they must have rounded bottoms and no seams). All are to be cleaned, labels removed and flattened as much as possible.

Clear Glass: All clear glass, no plate glass as in windows, no colored glass, except for one-half gallon and gallon jugs. They are to be cleaned with labels removed

Dean Martin, Kewaskum, reported shooting a 4-point buck in the Tomah area.

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

The minutes of the meeting of November 3, 1975, were approved after the Commissioner explained that the typographical error on the printed copies had been corrected on the master copy of the minutes and on the copy which was forwarded to the newspaper. 



Natural gas shortage predicted for county

"Natural gas cuts of 250 billion cubic feet a year to Wisconsin industry by 1979 will increase dependence on roads, bridges and railroads to carry substitute fuels," Gov. Patrick J. Lucey said this week.

"Without adequate transportation — especially rail-roads — Washington County's natural gas users, such factories, paper mills, dairies and hospitals, could be forced to pay exorbitant prices for alternative fuels such as coal and oil. Or, in the worst of situations, they could be denied fuel alto-gether," Lucey told a news conference.

Lucey based his report on study from the Wisconsin Energy Office that outlined anticipated natural gas cut-backs to "interruptible us-ers" by 1979. Interruptible pipeline service is most often provided businesses, industries and institutions such as hospitals and colleges.

Home natural gas users have been assured of continued supplies, the energy of-

fice said.

"As natural gas is cut the state, back throughout the state,

our transportation system will be called upon to deliver larger and larger quantities of alternative fuels required to keep industries going and commerce strong," Lucey continued.

But if highways are bad and bridges unsafe, heavy fuel trucks will be forced to take roundabout detours to their customers, avoiding roads that have weight limits or bridges that are posted. The additional transportation costs will be added to the already high fuel prices, forcing some industries into an uncompetitive position, thus threatening jobs.

"Some industries will require large volumes of coal as a replacement fuel," Lucey continued. "And in many cases railroads are the only form of transportation that can economically deliver coal to plantside. But if rail lines are abandoned-or allowed to continue in a state of disrepair-coal may be denied to the mills and factories forcing temporary layoffs or plant closings."

Once the full impact of the reduction is felt in Wash2,800 truckloads of fuel oil would be required each year simply to maintain the ener-

gy status quo, Lucey said. On the other hand, if local industries, hospitals and schools turn to coal as a replacement for the curtailed natural gas, 1,744 carloads of the fossil fuel would be necessary just to protect Washington County jobs, and health facilities, Lucey said.

The energy office said the county's food and dairy and manufacturing industries would be particularly hard hit by the natural gas cuts and shift to alternative

It cited the loss of 1,853 million cubic feet of natural gas locally for the two industries by 1979, which would force local employers to rely upon trucks and trains to bring in oil or coal.

In addition, schools and health care facilities in Washington County would be scheduled to lose 655 million cubic feet of natural gas annually, by 1979, according to the energy office projections.

The governor said the energy office predictions, based ington County, more than upon industry notices and

projections, make it "even more imperative that rural and urban Wisconsin recognize the need for a wellbalanced, healthy transportation system."

"Rural and non-metropolitan counties have the most to lose if we fail to enact the transportation funding and reform proposals before the legislature this week," Lucey said. "But the loss in jobs, population and economic future for these areas will not be theirs alone, but a loss for every citizen in Wisconsin who wants every county -rural or urban-to prosper today and tomorrow.'



You can enjoy holiday decorations and make wise use of electricity.

Midget lights on your tree make sense. Five 50-bulb midget strings give you 250 lights and use less electricity than a single 100-watt bulb. The same number of standard size tree bulbs use almost 20 times as much electricity.

You can cut down on the number of lights you need, too, by using tinsel and ornaments to reflect glitter and add sparkle.

Then save on outdoor decorations. Displaying your tree in a window, or putting up other midget light window decorations, will serve double-duty as indoor-outdoor attractions. And if they're the twinkle-type lights, they'll use about half as much electricity because they're "asleep" half the time.

Normally, the larger the tree, the more lights it takes to decorate it properly. A smaller tree will probably cost less to buy and will need fewer light strings and trim for attractive decorating.

Always turn off tree lights when you leave the house. In fact, it's a good idea to turn them off when no one is in the room where the tree is located. This makes power saving sense and is a good safety precaution.

While you want your decorations to be attractive, you also want them to be safe. Keep these safety hints in mind:

• Make sure lighted bulbs do not come in contact with drapes, carpet or furniture. They produce heat and can cause scorching.

- Spread your strings of lights on the floor. Check carefully for frayed wires, cracked insulation, damaged plugs or light sockets. Replace if necessary. Test the lights before putting them on the tree.
- Also check extension cords for wear or damage. Do not run extension cords across walking areas... even if covered with a rug or mat.
- If you are using a real tree, keep it well watered. Dry needles can be a fire hazard.
- Do not overload household circuits—another reason midget lights are beneficial, since they use less power.
- Don't string a light set on an aluminum tree. It is best to illuminate any metallic tree with a floodlight.
- Look for the UL label when buying new lights and equipment.

By using your ingenuity and imagination, decorating for Christmas can be fun... and less expensive. Remember, when you decorate for the holidays, light up wisely and safely.
