New AFS Exchange To Be Started Here

Since 1960, Kewaskum High School has participated in an American Field Service exchange student program. A total of 15 students have lived in the community for one year with Kewaskum families and attended the high school as a result of the program.

Kewaskum, in turn, has been able to send students abroad for two month summer programs, and this year, the school and the AFS will engage in a new type program, a domestic exchange.

Father-Son Teams Win Outstanding Conservation Farmer Awards

Arthur Terlinden and son Dennis and Harry Ramthun and sons, Kenneth and Harold, received the Kewaskum Kiwanis Outstanding Conservation farmer awards at their annual farm-city program Monday night Dec. 15, at the Hon-E-Kor Country Club.

Kiwanian president Jerry Stollenwerk presented the plaques after Roy Esser, Kiwanian, and Don Kurer, Soil Conservationist, presented slide talks of the livestock operations and conservation practices applied on the farms.

Roy Esser pointed up the interesting fact that land in California is now more valuable than gold due to crop-

land becoming short in supply. People need to eat and they can't eat gold.

The Terlindens and Ramthuns are cooperators with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District and have complete conservation plans for their land.

Art and Dennis Terlinden own a 255 acre dairy and hog farm northwest of Kohlsville and rent 70 additional acres. They farrow 50 brood sows and raise 800 feeder pigs each year. Terlinden's farm plan calls for 92 acres of contour strip cropping, all of which have been applied. Contour strips are alternate bands of hay and corn planted on the contour to hold water on slopes and deep soil out of streams. 1,400' of streambank is protected on this farm by shrubs, spruce and pine trees planted along both sides of the stream for wildlife habitat. 1,350' (1.2 ac.) of grass waterway was constructed to move water gently down the slopes also to keep streams and marshes free of soil sediment. Tim-

berstand improvement was applied to the 20 acre woodlot which involves harvest cut, thinning, culling and tree planting. More waterways and a wildlife pond are proposed for construction in the future on the Terlinden farm.

The Harry, Ken and Harold Ramthun families farm over 850 acres of land about one mile north of West Bend near Hwy. 144. About 330 acres of this total is owned by them, the remaining acres are rented. The livestock operation is primarily dairy consisting of 110 milk cows and 110 dairy replacements. They fatten about 150 Holstein steers. Most of the conservation practices on the land were applied since 1970. They are 70 acres of strip cropping, over 2 miles of grass waterways or 8.5 acres, over 5 miles of subsurface (tile) drainage to lower the water table in wet cropland. Odd areas such as field corners and land too steep for cropping were planted to

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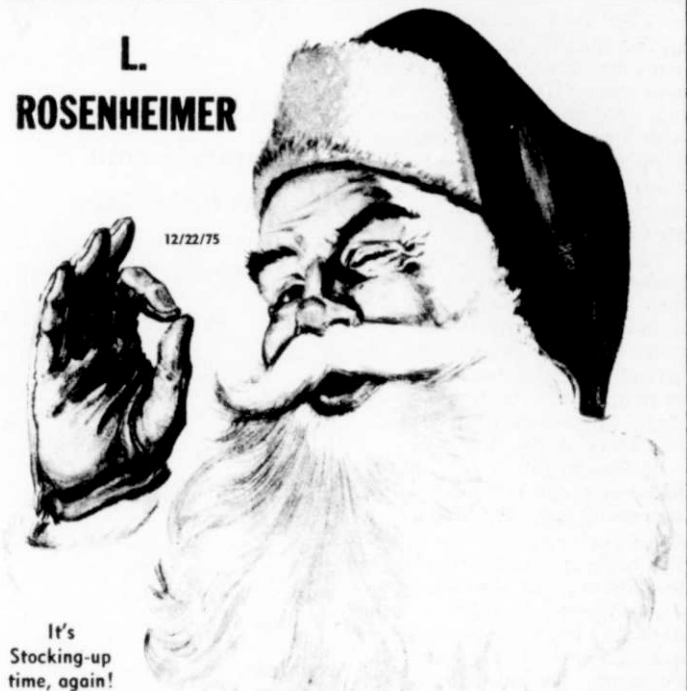
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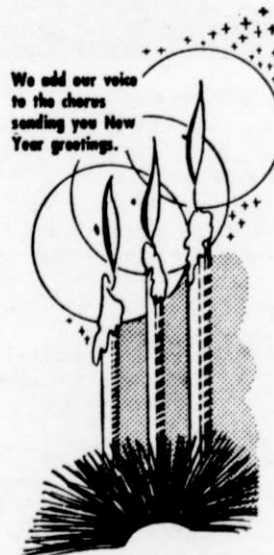
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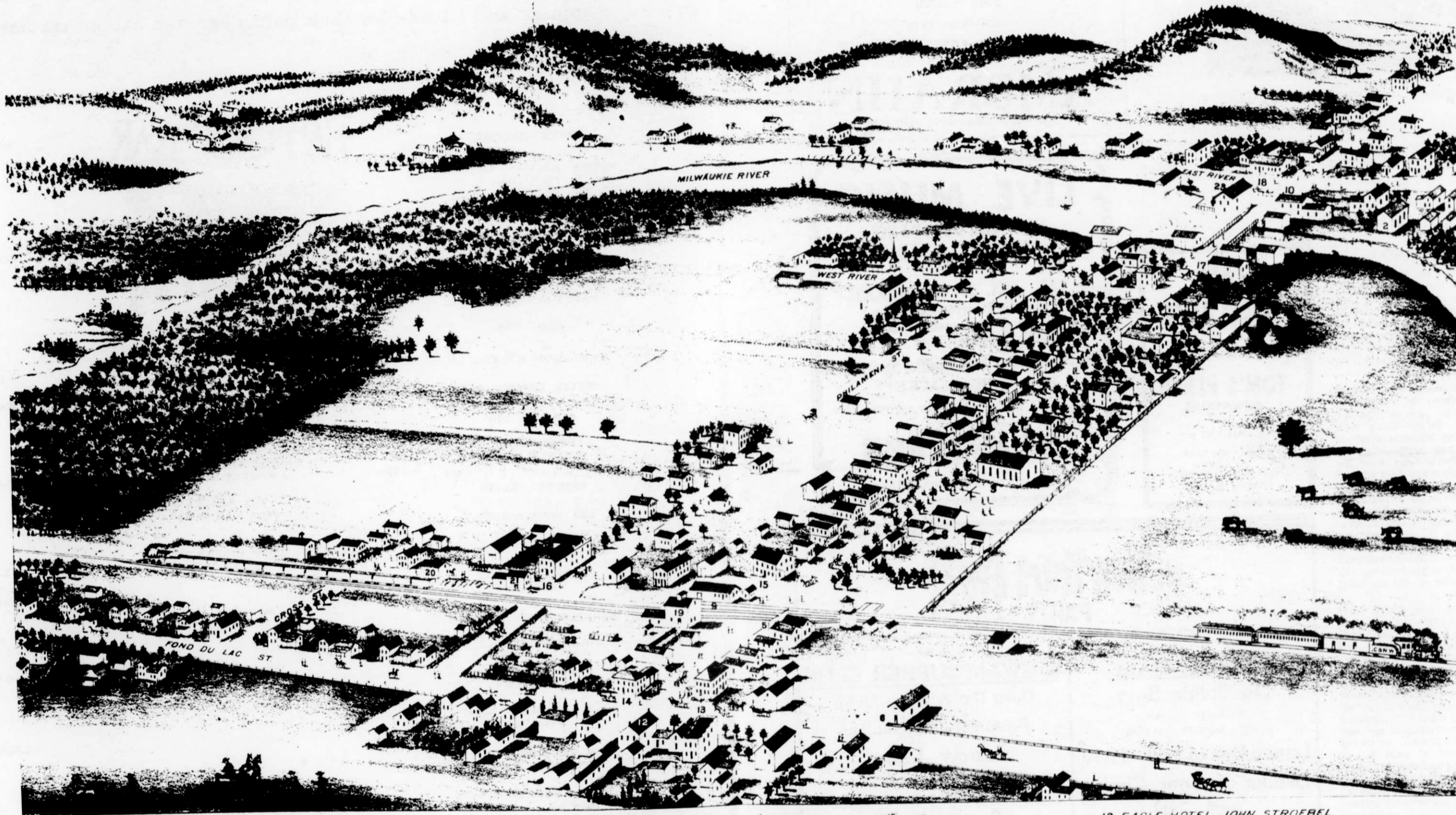

Thermography Not to Be Used As Only Technique to Detect Breast Cancer

Thermography. What is its place in breast cancer detection? At the recent meeting of the Washington County Unit of the American Cancer Society the question of the value of thermography when used as a breast cancer screening technique was brought before the Board.

Thermography, as defined by Dr. George Handy, State Health Officer, "is a non-specific method that detects heat emanating from the breasts and produces an instantaneous image on photographic film without the use of x-rays."

In regard to thermography, the Committee on Cancer of the State Medical Society of Wisconsin unanimously adopted a statement which reads in part:

"In the detection of cancer of the breast, the State Medical Society of Wisconsin warns the public against thermography when used as a sole diagnostic tool. It is felt, in light of the non-discriminate level of positives (50%), as well as the high incidence of false negatives (25-39%), thermography alone has no place in the evaluation of breast cancer and potentially can give the patient a false sense of security, leading to delays in seeking evaluations which could avoid the unfortunate consequences of late diagnosis."

The statement was approved by the State Medical Society of Wisconsin.

It should be noted that there will always be a percentage of women who would attend a thermography "screening clinic" because they are already suspicious of some possible problems. A false negative report could give them cause to put their suspicions to rest, resulting in a delay in seeing their doctor. This is extremely serious as cures in breast cancer depend upon early diagnosis.

The Council on Health, an advisory body to the Wisconsin Division of Health has issued a policy statement on breast cancer screening "warning that thermography when used alone as a screening technique to detect the disease is insufficient. The Council recommends monthly self-examination and periodic

examinations by a physician which may be combined with x-ray mammography and thermography as indicated in individual cases." Both of the above statements are available in their complete form at the West Bend Community Memorial Library.

The American Cancer Society continues to recommend regular check ups by your doctor along with monthly self-examinations as the best means of early detection of breast cancer. The monthly breast check will help a woman notice anything unusual in her breasts during the months between her regular visit to her doctor. Her doctor, knowing his patient and her medical history, will be in a position to recommend those procedures which will best suit the needs of that particular patient.

Your American Cancer Society urges you to see your doctor regularly, and in those months between visits, to do a thorough breast self-exam once a month, every month. Your Washington County Unit offers a free program called a "Breast Self Exam Teach-In". It consists of a short film explaining the proper procedure for breast self-examination, a trained instructor to assist you in learning the technique, a breast form model which has "lumps" programmed in to practice on, as well as take-home literature. This program is available to any group or organization upon request, and is offered regularly as an "open program" in the Spring and Fall of each year.

Kern not only played but shared scoring honors with Scott Tessar with 16 points. Tessar also came up with a strong floor game and Kern grabbed 16 rebounds. Kewaskum made 32 of 62 shots for 53 per cent.

The Indians' margin came at the free throw line where they hit 15 to the Owls' 6. Coach Jim Westphal was happy with a 4-0 record going into the holiday break, considering all the injuries the team had.

In the two other Scenic

games Friday, Kettle Moraine shaded Pewaukee in overtime, 63-60, and Mayville routed Hartland, 59-43, with a strong last quarter. There have been many real close games so far in a well balanced conference this year.

Kewaskum's next game will be on Jan. 9 when they host Kettle Moraine. Let's hope by that time most of the injuries will have healed.

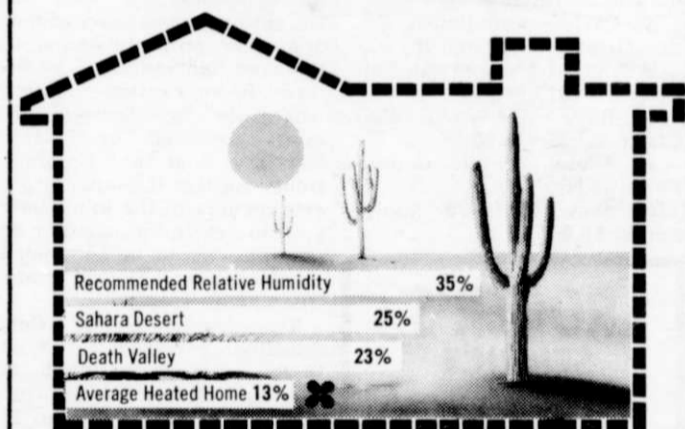

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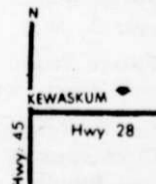


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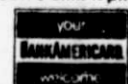
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
