A relatively routine agenda faced the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening, even though the list of items to be considered was quite long.

Circus time will, apparently come to Kewaskum this summer. The board had no objection to the Kewaskum Junior Chamber of Commerce organization using a portion of the school grounds for a one-day show. The date is not finally set.

Although members of the board expressed reservations, and Dr. Ogi voted "No," the request by Sharon Miller and her parents that she be allowed to graduate at the end of her junior year was approved.



FOND DU LAC BAND TO BEGIN REHEARSALS





IRS tells taxpayers how to avoid delays

Many Wisconsin taxpayers will not be able to receive early refunds this year unless they receive their W-2 forms from their employers soon.

IRS District Director Lawrence M. Phillips today reminded employers that Saturday, Jan. 31, is the last day to have completed W-2 forms in the hands of their employees.

IRS Publication 15, "Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide," available free from IRS District offices, contains additional information on the proper handling of W-2 forms.

The IRS also warns taxpayers to avoid these errors that can delay refunds:

Neglecting to sign the tax return (both taxpayers must sign a joint return);

Claiming medical deductions that don't exceed 3 per cent of adjusted gross income;

Deducting more than one-half of the cost, or more than \$150, of premiums for health insurance: Failing to use the peel-off label and inserting an incorrect Social Security number, or forgetting to include a number

In a barn-burner here Friday night that went into double overtime, the Kewaskum Indians emerged the winner over a determined Kettle Moraine team, 79-74, before a screaming crowd. The victory brought the unbeaten Indians' record to 5-0 and kept them in undisputed first place

Led by 6-foot-4 Jack Kern, Kewaskum ended up in a tie at the end of regulation time. 67-67. At the end of the first overtime it was 71-71. But the Indians, with Kern scoring 4 points, outscored the Lasers in the second overtime, 8-3, for the victory.


