School Board Considers List Of Routine Items at Meeting

A relatively routine agenda faced the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening, even though the list of items to be considered was quite long.

Circus time will, apparently come to Kewaskum this summer. The board had no objection to the Kewaskum Junior Chamber of Commerce organization using a portion of the school grounds for a one-day show. The date is not finally set.

Although members of the board expressed reservations, and Dr. Ogi voted "No," the request by Sharon Miller and her parents that she be allowed to graduate at the end of her junior year was approved.

The resignation of Mrs. Loberger, effective at the end of the school year was approved. Mrs. Loberger will retire after thirteen years of teaching, 9½ of them in the Kewaskum schools.

The board held a first reading and discussion of a policy on sex discrimination. The policy names the superintendent as the designee of the district for anyone to see who wishes to discuss questions concerning possible sex discrimination in the schools. It also sets up a grievance procedure for resolving problems of sex discrimination.

In other action, the board heard a report from Clark Pearson on the North Central Committee visit set for February 9, 10, and 11. They also authorized a payment of \$1 per day per car to Hon-

eck Chevrolet for driver education cars. Alternatives are being investigated by school personnel.

A special meeting was set for Monday, January 19, at 8 p. m. to certify candidates for the school board election.

Approval was given to purchase rubber runners to use in the gym, and a letter was read from the Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club inviting board members to a meeting they are holding on January 22 at 8 p. m. in the bank building on special education programs.

The board adjourned to executive session to discuss negotiations, the superintendent salary and to consider a personnel matter.

New Policy for High School Games

Starting this Friday, January 16, with the basketball game between Kewaskum and Mayville, all fans of Kewaskum High School are asked to enter the new gymnasium from either the south doors or the north doors of new gym. The main entrances to the school will be locked. Concessions will also be sold in the wrestling area of the new gym. With the completion of the freshman game, the main part of the school building will be locked off. This will also hold true for all girls basketball games and all wrestling matches after January 16.



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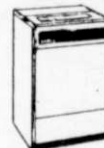

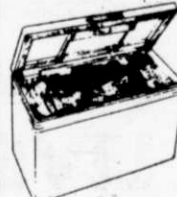

IRS tells taxpayers how to avoid delays

Many Wisconsin taxpayers will not be able to receive early refunds this year unless they receive their W-2 forms from their employers soon.

IRS District Director Lawrence M. Phillips today reminded employers that Saturday, Jan. 31, is the last day to have completed W-2 forms in the hands of their employees.

IRS Publication 15, "Circular E—Employer's Tax Guide," available free from IRS District offices, contains additional information on the proper handling of W-2 forms.

The IRS also warns taxpayers to avoid these errors that can delay refunds:

Neglecting to sign the tax return (both taxpayers must sign a joint return);

Copying figures from the wrong tax tables or schedules, or from the wrong line in the tables or schedules;

Claiming medical deductions that don't exceed 3 per cent of adjusted gross income;

Adding or subtracting incorrectly;

Claiming casualty losses without first subtracting \$100 from the amount of the loss;

Deducting more than one-half of the cost, or more than \$150, of premiums for health insurance;

Failing to use the peel-off label and inserting an incorrect Social Security number, or forgetting to include a number when missing;

Neglecting to include W-2 Forms from each employer, as well as all schedules and other forms needed for the return.
