What sort of outdoor Bicentennial project could possibly be done in sub-zero January weather? The could answer can be seen (temperature permitting) at 1085 Fond du Lac Ave. on the south side of the village. The structure, depicting a '76 Bennington flag with an eagle symbol superimposed on the stripes, is made entirely of winter's unique slick and cold creation — ice. The display, built by Dan

Meilahn, measures about 7 feet high by 12 feet long. A level base of small sheets of ice from a nearby stream supports the structure which weights over 1,250 pounds and consists of over 150 gallons of water by volume.

The necessary ice blocks were made by first coloring a measured amount of water

23 Fire, 150 Ambulance Calls in '75

Chief Augie Bilgo reported that the Kewaskum Fire Department answered 23 fire calls in 1975. 10 more 1974, when there than in were 13

Of the 23 calls, seven were in the village, while 13 were in the Town of Kewaskum and three in the Town of Auburn. The 1974 calls included eight in the village, four in the township and one in the Town of Auburn.

In addition the department answered four mutual aid calls to assist other departments which included Campbellsport two. Kohlsville one and West Bend one.

Kewaskum firemen worked 800 man hours alone fighting three major barn fires (Arnold Schmidt, Roger Neuman and John Felten). Kohlsville spent 360 man hours helping fight two of the major barn fires on a mutual aid call and Boltonville 150 man hours assisting on a mutual aid call at another major barn fire, while Campbellsport put in 40 man hours helping at two of the major barn fires.

In addition the Kewaskum department spent 400 man hours fighting other smaller fires in the village and townships.

The firemen's trained rescue squad answered 150 calls, covering a total of 4,240 miles, in 1975. This was five fewer than in 1974, when 155 calls were answered.





Indians Defeat Mayville in Key Game, Lead Scenic by Two

They built a new gym with a larger seating capacity and still it was jammed by a noisy, thumping crowd for the Kewaskum Indians crucial game with rival Mayville here Friday night.

Mayville failed in its bid to tie Kewaskum for first place as the Indians won a big 63-52 victory. The win put Kewaskum two games ahead in the Scenic Conference with a 6-0 mark, while Mayville and Germantown (defeated by Slinger) dropped to 4-2 and are tied with Grafton for second.

Tom Edwards, who has been dogged by knee and foot injuries during his prep career, was a key man in the game. The 6 foot-5 Edwards came off the bench to score 16 points and give the Indians the edge they needed to defeat the Cardinals, also a tall team. "There are some teams Edwards doesn't match up too well against because of his injuries but Mayville doesn't have great quickness and he helped neutralize their height," Coach Jim Westphal said.

Westphal credited a big edge for his front line over the Cardinals in setting up the win. Six-foot-four Jim Kern scored 17 points and grabbed 16 rebounds, while tall Leon Laatsch added 11 points.
