## **Two Students Will Be Represented On Kewaskum School Board**

Students will be represented on the Kewaskum School Board as a result of a vote taken by the board at its regular meeting Monday evening. At that meeting, the board approved two non-voting members from the high school student body. The members, chosen by the Stu-The dent Government, will be Roseann Czaja and Joy Zarling. The approval by the board will be effective immediately and will continue through the end of the year. with a review sometime before that. A few details concerning the matter will be discussed by the Student Government and the school administration.

A sex discrimination policy, outlining a grievance proce-dure, was approved unani-mously. The superintendent of schools was named as the person in the district to be contacted relative to questions or complaints concerning possible sex discrimination.

Discussion was held concerning the new school to be started by St. Lucas Lutheran Church. Since this will have an effect on public school enrollments, budgets and aids, the results are of great interest to the local board and school personnel. Richard Theusch made a report on the results of the delegate convention of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards. Two items particularly were discussed. The group voted against supporting state-wide student assessment. A resolution from the floor calling on the legislature to make only nine of the thirteen standards mandatory, and the other four

optional was passed by the convention assembly.

The board approved all bills as presented, then adjourned to executive session to discuss grievances, teacher evaluations, the salary of the superintendent and a personnel question.

## If it's 200 years old, tell the DAR

Articles that are available for loan will be on display at the Bicentennial Memorabilia Exhibit during the Wisconsin DAR Spring Conference in Madison, March 23-24. This exhibit will be opened to the public.

## Kewaskum Jaycees to Sponsor **Operation Identification Program**

the U.S. Jaycees will give local residents an opportunity to protect their valuables against theft with "Operation Identification," a proven burglary prevention project.

Under "Operation Identification," residents will borengraving equipment row supplied by the Jaycees to engrave their driver's license number on valuable articles. In the event of theft, the property owner would re-port the theft and his license number to police.

The engraving equipment will be obtainable through outlets in Kewaskum. Bill Gruhle, chairman of the project for the Jaycees, said the locations of engraving equipment checkout centers will be announced at a later date. The Jaycees already have received the cooperation of the Kewaskum Police Department for the project.

"Operation Identification," which is being conducted in many communities by local Jaycee organizations, was originated in 1963 in Monterey Park, Calif., by Police Chief Everett F. Holladay, with the cooperation of the local Exchange club. In 5,500 participating homes in Monterey Park only five burglaries were reported since 1963. In the nonparticipating homes there were more than 1,800 burglaries.

Participating residents were given stickers for their doors and windows warning wouldbe thieves that all valuable items were marked.

"If we can get everybody to participate," said the Monterey Park Police chief, "it looks as if we will have licked the burglary problem."

In Kewaskum, said Gruhle, homeowners who borrow the engraving tools will be asked to engrave their driver's license number next to the manufacturer's serial number when possible. The engraving should be on a nonremovable part of the object. Persons borrowing the engraving tools will be given a blank form on which to list all i-

The Kewaskum chapter of tems engraved and the locations of the numbers. This form should be kept in a safe place by the resident. According to the Jaycees, "numbers make it much easier to identify objects and track down rightful owners. Verbal descriptions are not nearly so efficient, as evidenced by the police auctions across the country where recovered stolen goods are sold because ownership can't be established."

Gruhle listed typical items that should be engraved: television sets, radios, stereo phonographs and tape recorders, bicycles, cameras, typewriters, electric tools, jewelmusical instruments and kitchen appliances. Residents participating in Kewaskum will be given stickers to put on their doors warning potential thieves that "all items of value on these premises have been marked for ready identification by law enforcement agencies."

The Jaycee "Operation I dentification" chairman said the engraving helps stop thefts in three ways. "If a

thief is stopped by police with the marked items in his possession, he can't plead convincingly that they are his own. Second, the possessions now are easily identifiable, which means "fences" who buy and resell stolen property are cool to these items; the thief gets stuck with the goods when what he really wants is money. Third, the stickers may discourage a thief from attempting entry." Gruhle said burglaries have dropped dramatically in the many communities where "Operation Identification" is in effect.

"The key to success in this program," said Gruhle "is for a large number of Kewaskum residents to participate, so thieves will know they are operating in dangerous territory.'
