## Now Second Largest in County

### Valley Bank Reports Increase In Deposits of Over \$3 Million

At the annual stockholders meeting of the Valley Bank of Kewaskum all officers were re-elected for the ensuing year. Directors are Glarys C. Reis, Suzanne R. Nelthorpe, Milton L. Meister, Charles J. Ogi, James D. Reigle, Wayland D. Tassar, Ray R. Umbs and Gerald H. Zimmel.

President Tassar reported that despite economic conditions, the bank had another successful year and shows a

strong statement of condition. Total deposits increased to \$25,748,738.54, an increase of well over \$3 million in the past year. Tassar stated that while loan demand has remained very heavy, the bank has generally been able to keep pace with the demand.

Valley Bank is presently the second largest bank in Washington County, with offices in Kewaskum and Allenton.

### Julie LaFleur Named Betty Crocker Leadership Winner

Julie A. LaFleur has been named Kewaskum High's 1975-76 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow. Julie won the honor by competing with other seniors in the written knowledge and attitude examination on Dec. 2. She will receive a certificate from General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational scholarship program, and becomes eligible for state and national honors.

State Family Leaders of Tomorrow receive a \$1,500

college scholarship while state second-place winners receive a grant of \$500. The state winner also earns for his or her school, a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," from Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

In the spring, state winners and their faculty advisors will be the guests of General Mills on an expense-paid educational tour to Washington, D.C., a special event of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, whose scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place winners will receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

Also tentative plans were discussed and some plans made for a Kewaskum Tea Party on March 16, 1976 to which a progress report for 1975-76 will be given and recognition to those that have helped the society thus far.

## Opening of the Village Store

Saturday, January 31, marks the beginning of a new era in the history of a village landmark which has stood on Main street for over 100 years. The Village Store, formerly Miller's Studio, will open for business at 7 a. m. Under the ownership of Carl Spoeth and Karl Fee, the store has been refurbished entirely in an attempt to recreate some of the atmosphere of an old country store. The owners intend to serve the needs of the community by remaining open from 7 a. m. to 11 p. m. seven days a week and carrying items that customers will need between weekly shopping trips.

Features of the store's interior include the original ceiling, high shelves built by Charles Miller's grandfather, a functional pot-belly stove, wood frame, glass top display case for bakery wares, an antique cash register, an antique bakery hutch, and a number of smaller period items that would have been common to an old general store. As one would expect of antique hunters, the two partners are continuously looking for pieces to display

in the store.

The store will carry general grocery items, fresh bakery, hunting and fishing licenses, and a few craft items. In addition photo-developing service will be available through G.A.F. The two owners state that they wish to remain open to suggestions by customers as to any additional items that people would like to see carried in the store. Interest in craft items, for example, is expected to heighten with the arrival of summer tourists, but "we want to display a few things right at the start, so that people will know we have these crafts available," says Spoeth.

The store resulted from an idea that Spoeth had last summer when he noticed the "For Sale" sign at Miller's. "It seemed like a good place for an old general store," Carl said, "and the more I thought about it, the more it appealed to me, until I felt that my idea had to become a reality."

Converting Spoeth's dream into a reality involved much planning and hard work, not

least of which was acquiring a partner. Having a background and skills in engineering himself, he felt the need for someone with retail food experience. Karl Fee, a close friend since childhood days, immediately came to mind. A series of long-distance calls from Kewaskum to Atlanta, Georgia, where Fee and his wife Ann were living, resulted in the acquisition of a partner. As Fee expressed it, "it seemed too great an opportunity to pass up."

Carl and Jane Spoeth and Karl and Ann Fee grow more and more enthusiastic about the General Store as the opening date draws near. The two couples feel that after months of hard work, the store is beginning to take shape and that Kewaskum is a perfect setting for their new business. They feel lucky to live in such a peaceful town, rich in historic beauty and old-fashioned courtesy.

On Saturday, January 31, the Spoeths and Fees heartily welcome everyone to step back into another era at the Village Store!

### Two Students Will Be Represented On Kewaskum School Board

Students will be represented on the Kewaskum School Board as a result of a vote taken by the board at its regular meeting Monday evening. At that meeting, the board approved two non-voting members from the high school student body. The members, chosen by the Student Government, will be Roseann Czaja and Joy Zarlring. The approval by the board will be effective immediately and will continue through the end of the year, with a review sometime before that. A few details concerning the matter will be discussed by the Student Government and the school administration.

A sex discrimination policy, outlining a grievance procedure, was approved unanimously. The superintendent of schools was named as the person in the district to be contacted relative to questions or complaints concerning possible sex discrimination.

Discussion was held concerning the new school to be started by St. Lucas Lutheran Church. Since this will have an effect on public school enrollments, budgets and aids, the results are of great interest to the local board and school personnel.

Richard Theusch made a report on the results of the delegate convention of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards. Two items particularly were discussed. The group voted against supporting state-wide student assessment. A resolution from the floor calling on the legislature to make only nine of the thirteen standards mandatory, and the other four

optional was passed by the convention assembly.

The board approved all bills as presented, then adjourned to executive session to discuss grievances, teacher evaluations, the salary of the superintendent and a personnel question.

### St. Lucas to Open Christian Day School

As the result of a 6 month study, the voting body of St. Lucas Lutheran Church passed a resolution to open a Christian Day School this coming September. The school will be conducted for grades kindergarten through 8. This decision was made at the annual meeting on January 25.

Members who served on the study committee were Gerald Zimmel, Chairman; Ervin Uhlman, Secretary; Wallace Cudnohoske, David Schaefer, Norman Kempf, Dennis Garvey and the Rev. Paul Hoenecke. Their survey indicated there would be an enrollment of at least 55 for the 1976-77 school year.

The congregation will now call two full-time teachers and a half-day kindergarten teacher under the present plans. These teachers will be graduates of Dr. Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minnesota, the teacher training college of the Wisconsin Ev. Lutheran Synod, with which St. Lucas Congregation is affiliated. They will begin their work here in Kewaskum in July.

## If it's 200 years old, tell the DAR

The Joseph Marest Chapter, DAR, along with all the other DAR Chapters within the state, is seeking information about heirlooms and artifacts that were in use from 1770 through 1800.

This search aims to locate and learn the stories about articles actually used in the Revolutionary War as well as objects from the daily life of the period, and includes items in museums as well as items in the possession of individuals.

Muskets, pistols, flintlocks,

snuff boxes, costumes, jewelry, pewter, fabrics, samplers, furniture, fireplace accessories, and tools are some of the objects that could be reported.

Personal papers and records; documents of the Revolution especially commissions, general orders, accounts of troop movements and battles, and materials of like character; school records; legal documents, deeds, wills, and land grants; all are of interest to the DAR.

Because many of the items about which information is being sought are valuable and cherished, a coded record will be kept by each chapter and the names of persons owning the articles reported will not be used in any publicity about the project.

Articles that are available for loan will be on display at the Bicentennial Memorabilia Exhibit during the Wisconsin DAR Spring Conference in Madison, March 23-24. This exhibit will be opened to the public.

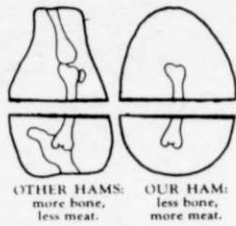

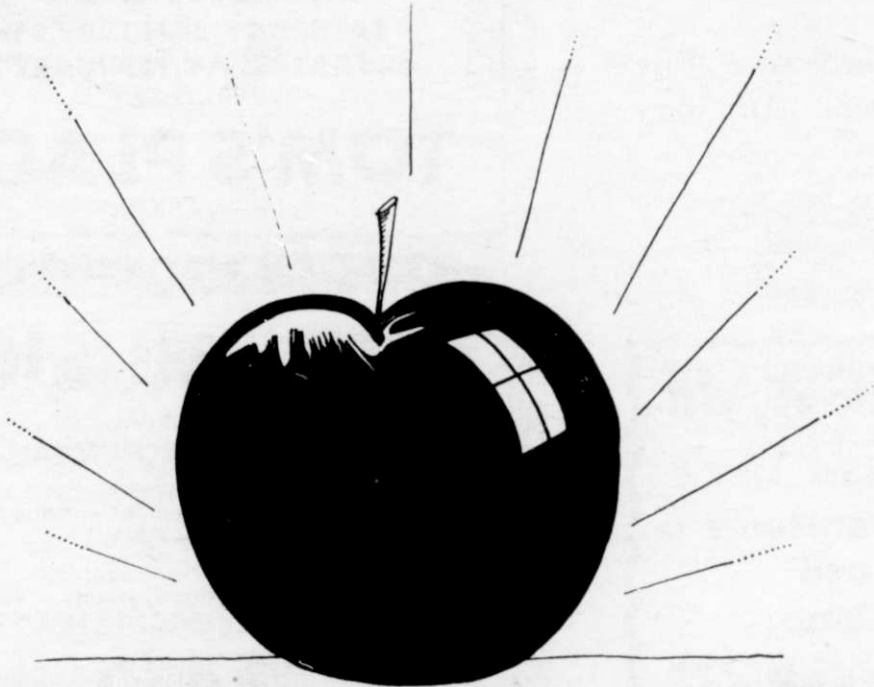

## Kewaskum Jaycees to Sponsor Operation Identification Program

The Kewaskum chapter of the U. S. Jaycees will give local residents an opportunity to protect their valuables against theft with "Operation Identification," a proven burglary prevention project.

Under "Operation Identification," residents will borrow engraving equipment supplied by the Jaycees to engrave their driver's license number on valuable articles. In the event of theft, the property owner would report the theft and his license number to police.

The engraving equipment will be obtainable through outlets in Kewaskum. Bill Gruhle, chairman of the project for the Jaycees, said the locations of engraving equipment checkout centers will be announced at a later date. The Jaycees already have received the cooperation of the Kewaskum Police Department for the project.

"Operation Identification," which is being conducted in many communities by local Jaycee organizations, was originated in 1963 in Monterey Park, Calif., by Police Chief Everett F. Holladay, with the cooperation of the local Exchange club. In 5,500 participating homes in Monterey Park only five burglaries were reported since 1963. In the nonparticipating homes there were more than 1,800 burglaries.

Participating residents were given stickers for their doors and windows warning would-be thieves that all valuable items were marked.

"If we can get everybody to participate," said the Monterey Park Police chief, "it looks as if we will have licked the burglary problem."

In Kewaskum, said Gruhle, homeowners who borrow the engraving tools will be asked to engrave their driver's license number next to the manufacturer's serial number when possible. The engraving should be on a nonremovable part of the object. Persons borrowing the engraving tools will be given a blank form on which to list all i-

tems engraved and the locations of the numbers. This form should be kept in a safe place by the resident. According to the Jaycees, "numbers make it much easier to identify objects and track down rightful owners. Verbal descriptions are not nearly so efficient, as evidenced by the police auctions across the country where recovered stolen goods are sold because ownership can't be established."

Gruhle listed typical items that should be engraved: television sets, radios, stereo phonographs and tape recorders, bicycles, cameras, typewriters, electric tools, jewelry, musical instruments and kitchen appliances. Residents participating in Kewaskum will be given stickers to put on their doors warning potential thieves that "all items of value on these premises have been marked for ready identification by law enforcement agencies."

The Jaycee "Operation Identification" chairman said the engraving helps stop thefts in three ways. "If a

thief is stopped by police with the marked items in his possession, he can't plead convincingly that they are his own. Second, the possessions now are easily identifiable, which means "fences" who buy and resell stolen property are cool to these items; the thief gets stuck with the goods when what he really wants is money. Third, the stickers may discourage a thief from attempting entry."

Gruhle said burglaries have dropped dramatically in the many communities where "Operation Identification" is in effect.

"The key to success in this program," said Gruhle "is for a large number of Kewaskum residents to participate, so thieves will know they are operating in dangerous territory."

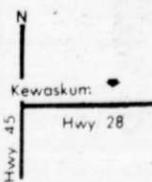

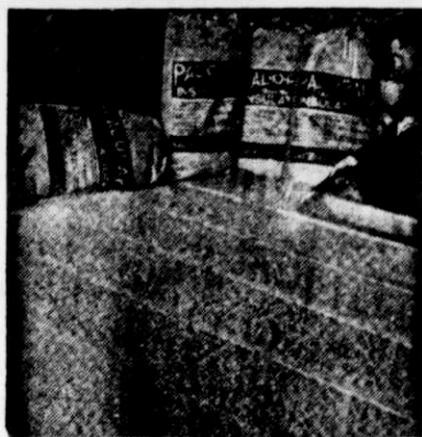

Kewaskum erased a deficit with a comeback to nip Germantown, 66-64.
