### 7 Freight Cars Derail North of Kewaskum



Seven northbound Chicago & North Western Railway freight cars derailed two miles north of Kewaskum in Fond du Lac County near County Trunk V at about 11:55 a.m. last Wednesday.

Two hundred feet of train track was torn up when a truck-form broke off a box car. The accident forced the re-routing of three trains and required a train wrecker from Appleton and automotive wreckers from Butler to be sent up to clear the debris.

Five of the cars were carrying paper and the other two were empty. A dollar damage estimate of the loss was not known. One car was said to be demolished while others suffered some damage.

The track was said to be cleared by mid-morning Thursday. The remainder of the train was pulled to Fond du Lac while some of the wrecked box cars were pull-

ed onto a siding in Kewas-

No one was injured. Workers put in new rails to repair the track. The train with a Chicago crew left Fond du Lac about 11:15 a.m. Wednesday destined for Chicago.

### Kindergarten Pupils to Be Registered

### 28 Educators To Evaluate Kewaskum High

Twenty-eight educators are to make an on-site evaluation of Kewaskum Community High School Feb. 10 through Feb. 11 of next week, Principal Clark Pearson announced today. The North Central Association evaluation team is to be chaired by James Skarda, Principal, Chilton High School.

Principal Pearson said that "the purpose of this external team evaluation is to help the school look at itself objectively. The school has been engaged in a comprehensive self-study, seeking to identify its strengths and determine those areas in which change would seem to be desirable. The North Central Association team will bring an outside professional viewpoint to the evaluation."

Chairman Skarda has indicated, "we are not visiting the school to inspect it. Rather we have come to give assistance to the staff in its pursuit of quality education for its students."

Principal Pearson pointed out that "the members of the North Central Association team are contributing their services to the school. This spirit of professional cooperation is a hallmark of education in this country and is a noted feature of the Association. The goal of a North Central Association evaluation is to stimulate a continuing drive for improvement of the school."

The visiting team is to file a full written report with the school within a few weeks. Also, the chairman of the North Central Association evaluation team will give a report to the staff and members of the public at a time to be announced in the near future.
