\$206,579.05 in Contracts for **New Fire Station Issued**

A total of \$206,579.05 in contracts for the new Kewaskum Fire Station were issued by the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday.

The general contract was awarded to Badger Structures, a division of the A. L. Wagner Company of Sheboygan, for \$178,198, which included six alternates. Members of the fire department visited buildings previously constructed by the company, and had "nothing but praise" for the quality of work. The alternates dealt with delaying the starting date until April 1, elimination of interior painting, an asphalt driveway, and changes in the flooring and the type of studs used.

A change in the roof from the design that appeared in specifications will save \$8,500, rather than the \$10,-000 that was originally anticipated, since the board decided to use a slightly higher quality roof in order to prevent possible damage in the

future The heating and ventilation contract went to Kohlman and Mueller of St. Cloud for \$12,750, while the electrical work will be done by Kirchner Electric Company

West Bend, at a cost of \$15,-631.05. The plumbing contract was tabled until the next meeting, at the request of President Miller, so that some details could be checked over, including some possible alternates.

Since the contracts were completed on Monday afternoon, the village attorney had not reviewed them at the time of the meeting, and so they were passed subject to his approval.

A committee to attempt to find a location for the recycling program conducted by the Kewaskum Junior Women's Club was appointed to include trustees David Nigh and Roger Strack. Members of the club had previously appeared before the board to request help in locating a new site. They are presently doing their work in the basement of the museum run by the Kewaskum Historical Society.

A committee to consist of trustees Dan Schmidt and Raynor Herriges will study what types of new Christmas decorations will be purchased by the village this year, taking advantage of the offer of funds provided by several local service organizations.

Village Police, Employees Get 7% Increase in Salaries

for the Kewaskum Police Department and other employees of the Village of Kewaskum was approved at the bi-monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board.

Retroactive to January 1, 1976, the date on which their old contract expired, patrolmen will receive a starting salary of \$812.13 per month, which increases to \$1076.95 after 4½ years' experience. The chief of police will receive \$1121 per month, while part time patrolmen will receive \$3.75 per hour. At present, the village has three fulltime patrolmen and one who works part time. In addition, Easter will be added as a paid holiday.

For other village em-ployees, the superintendent of public works will receive \$1156 per month, while the commissioner, whose office combines that of secretary and treasurer, will be paid \$1085 per month, and the wastewater treatment plant head will receive \$1079.

The salary of the commissioner's secretary was set at \$2.95 per hour, while the librarians will receive about \$2.40 and the assistant wastewater treatment plant operator will earn \$5.12 per hour.

General employees salaries will range from \$4.28 to \$5.03 per hour, depending on their experience, while the half time mechanic employed by the village will earn \$3.05.

Board Acts on Tree Trimming Ordinance

83 Votes Cast in Village, 37 in Town

Only 83 voters in the Village of Kewaskum and 37 in the Town of Kewaskum bothered to go to the polls and vote in Tuesday's Primary Judicial Election. Locally the only balloting was for nomination for election to the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

Milwaukee Circuit Judge Leander J. Foley Jr. led heavily endorsed incumbent Justice Roland B. Day by a wide margin as both were nominated for election to the Supreme Court. The incumbent trailed Foley by more than 50,000 votes in the primary. Unofficial state returns in 3,345 of 3,409 wards gave Foley 175,846 to 120,822 for Day. Christ Alexopoulos. running for the eighth time, ran a week third with 49,535. Foley and Day will face each other in the April 6 election for a 10 year term on the high court.







Kasten Speaker At GOP Lincoln Day Dinner Here

(KEWASKUM)-Congressman Bob Kasten (R-Wis.) Thursday night called for presidential candidates who "drop out" of the campaign to "pay back to the federal treasury all unspent funds which they so readily accepted when the handout was tendered."

In a Lincoln Day speech here to Washington County Republicans at the Amerahn, Kasten said he agreed with Supreme Court Chief Justice Warren Berger that public financing of presidential campaigns is "an impermissible intrusion of gov-ernment" into the American political system.

Kasten said that to date 15 presidential candidates have received \$7 million in matching federal funds. "Much of these taxpayer dollars have been used for personal publi-city puffery," Kasten charg-ed. "The taxpayers of the country are being victimized by this ill-founded system. It only helps to further undermine the confidence of the American people in their government."

He cited two "drop outs," former North Carolina Governor Terry Sanford, who received \$244,000 in federal matching funds, and Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen who was given more than half a million dollars.



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
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Two more victories the past week for an 11-1 record clinched at least a tie for the Scenic Moraine title for Coach Jim Westphal's Kewaskum Indians. The Indians are two games ahead with two to go and a win over either Mayville or Germantown will take it all.

Kewaskum defeated Slinger here Friday night, 67-61, and overwhelmed Kettle Moraine there Tuesday night in their best performance of the season, 89-65. It was also their top scoring output of the campaign.

A super performance by Scott Tessar, who hit on 10 of 11 free throws and had a total of 24 points, led the Indians over Slinger Friday and shattered Owl Coach Doug Potter's strategy of overtaking Kewaskum. Owls had won five straight before bumping into Kewas-

The Indians' full press and man-to-man defense in the second half forced Slinger to hit on only two of eight shots in the third period. Kewaskum appeared jittery in the first quarter and committed nine costly turnovers to Slinger's two. As a result they were behind at one time, 15-9. Two free throws and a basket just before the quarter brought them within two, to make it 15-13. After a defensive second period, the Indians were still behind at halftime by one, 28-27.

The Indians played like champions in the second half as though they had to win to stay in first place and the Owls met their match. Early in the second half, a flurry of scoring by the Indians gave them a comfortable lead, reeling off 10 points in succession, for a 40-32 advantage. Slinger managed just 9 points in the third quarter to the Indians' 19.
