Lightning Strikes Twice, Causes Serious Damage at Roeder Home

During a sleet storm early Monday evening, lightning struck twice in the area. A transformer near a rural home was hit and lightning struck a home in the village, causing a fire which did extensive damage.

The transformer hit was across the road from the Ardell Cardarelle home on Highland Drive in the Town of Kewaskum, about 1½ miles northwest of the village. The Cardarelle home was not damaged but the lights and telephone were knocked out. Mrs. Cardarelle got the children out of the home and called the fire department and power company. The home struck was that of Mrs. Mary Roeder at 202 Forest Ave., where 32 firemen worked nearly four hours fighting smoke and flames in inclement weather.

The bolt near the Cardarelle home struck shortly after 6 p. m. While Fire Chief Augie Bilgo, Jr. was being notified of it by the sheriff's dispatcher, and informing him he would send several of his men to check the area, the dispatcher got the call for a fire at the Roeder home at 6:10 p. m.

When firemen reached the Roeder home they found the house filled with smoke,

which was especially thick in the basement area. Smoke was pouring out from all areas of the house and firemen used masks in an attempt to get into the house and locate the source. About 10 tanks of air were used. Windows were broken and later foam was poured into the basement. When fire was found in the walls and floor the firemen used water to put out the blaze. They also had to cut a hole in the floor of the living room.

Bilgo believed that lightning had struck the electrical system in the basement, causing fire which followed wires throughout the house. Within seconds after the lightning hit, Mrs. Roeder and her aunt noticed smoke coming from the basement. Because her phone was knocked out, Mrs. Roeder called the fire department from a neighbor's home. A neighbor also reported seeing a ball of fire after the lightning struck.

Damage to the basement area, which included a family room, and its contents was extensive. Basement air ducts melted from the intense heat. Bilgo said he felt all floor joists in the basement would have to be replaced.

Jaycees Begin Project to Stop Burglars

"Operation Identification," a proven protective measure for Kewaskum's burglaries, is being introduced in the village by the Kewaskum Jaycees in cooperation with local police.

The program is designed to discourage burglars from breaking into local homes and businesses by providing positive identification of valuable property such as radios, TV sets, cameras, tape recorders, typewriters, firearms, jewelry, musical instruments and small appliances.

The idea was originated in Monterey Park, Calif. in 1963. Chief Everett Holladay of the Monterey Park Police Department urged homeowners to engrave their driver's license number on valuable possessions, making it harder for a burglar to sell stolen property and providing a valuable aid in tracing and returning stolen goods.

Results showed that only five burglaries were committed in the 5,500 households participating in the program, while more than 1,800 burglaries were committed in the nonparticipating households during the same period.

The Jaycees introduced this program in Kewaskum and revealed that the electric engraving pens will be available on a free loan basis for a three-day period at the Valley Bank.

The engraving tools are easy to use and will inscribe clearly on metal, glass, wood

and plastic. After returning the engraving tool, each person will receive window decals advising everyone that all items of value on the premises have been marked for ready identification by law enforcement agencies.

"The window decals also act as a deterrent factor," said William Gruhle, Project Chairman of the Jaycee program. "Once a burglar knows that the items of value in a home are marked and can be traced easily, he is likely to think twice about breaking in. In addition, a 'fence' won't buy such easily identifiable merchandise and the thief will lose his quick turnover market," Gruhle added.

Plumbing Contract for New Fire Station Awarded for \$25,800

The plumbing contract for the new Kewaskum fire station was awarded at the bi-monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board, for \$25,800.

The contract was awarded to H and H Refrigeration of Iron Ridge, with no alternates. They submitted the low bid in that category at the time bids were opened, and their previous experience includes work done at the Iron Ridge fire station.

Annexation of land owned by Roger Strack, Howard Laubenstein, and Joe Butschlick was approved by the board, after the required waiting period had expired. They will now form the village's southern boundary.

Several zoning changes were moved to a public hearing, including the land which will become the new park,

which will be zoned for recreational use and the Kewaskum Frozen Foods, which was previously zoned residential and for restricted business, and will now be zoned properly. The Kewaskum Malting Co. will remain in the same category, but must go through the rezoning process because the definition of the types of businesses that should be in the category was changed. Two lots owned by Roger McKenna which are zoned agricultural will be changed to residential if there is no objection at the hearing. The hearing has been set for 8:00 p. m. on March 22, and all zoning changes have been approved by the Planning Commission.

Elmer Yoost was appointed acting president during the time that board president Charles Miller is expected to be out of town.

Plan Student Art Contest

An art contest for local high school students was discussed at the February meeting of the Washington County Bicentennial Committee.

Chairman Gilbert Sauer announced that Ed Kocher of the West Bend Fine Arts Gallery will be meeting with art teachers from each of the six high schools in Washington County to select a theme for the contest. It will be open to entries of any type, oils, pottery, weaving, etc., and all entries will be shown at the county fair in July. All students who submit an entry will receive a certificate of merit for their efforts.

Milton Wilkens of Newburg was elected committee vice chairman filling the office, which had been vacant for several months. Wilkens is a member of the Newburg-Trenton Bicentennial Committee, and was very active in locating historical sites for the 1976 Washington County map as a part of the Heritage subcommittee.

It was announced at the meeting that senior citizens from each of the different

parts of the county will be invited to use part of the committee's tent at the county fair to tell interesting stories about their life to spark interest in the past.

For the March meeting, one representative from each bicentennial committee or historical society in Washington County will be invited to finalize their role in the county fair. Local committees are eligible to set up displays at the fair, and are encouraged to obtain a band in the parade, or enter a float. The meeting will be held on March 22 at 8:00 p. m. at the Washington County Courthouse.

Teacher Contracts On Meeting Agenda

The Kewaskum Board of Education will hold a meeting March 8, at 8 p. m. in the administrative offices. Because teacher contracts must be issued before March 15, the meeting is a week earlier than it normally would be.

Approval to issue the contracts to certified personnel will be one item of business. Reports on the North Central visit and the summary conference will be given, along with a report on investigations into the possibility of hiring teaching interns for next year at the high school. Repairs at the high school on a folding wall, discussion of purchase of a printing press and a summer classroom driver education course are business items to face the board. The contract for the superintendent for next year is on the agenda, along with miscellaneous items which may arise.

The board will meet in closed session following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations, salaries for non-scheduled professional personnel and a grievance.

Parish Leaders For Archbishop's Fund Appeal Named



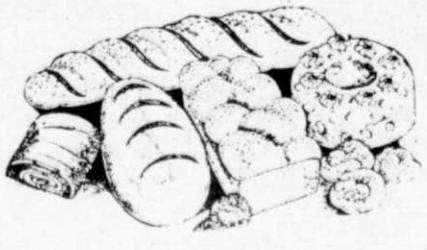

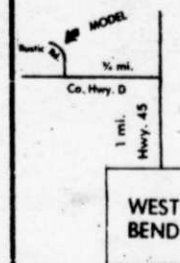

Besides outlasting the Warhawks, the Indians turned in a good defensive game. They committed only 9 fouls and held Germantown to 3 free throws.

Both teams shot well from the field where Kewaskum hit 26 of 53 for 41 per cent

and Germantown hit 25 of 57 for 44 per cent.

In the other two games Friday, Slinger routed Pewaukee, 82-60, and Grafton defeated Hartland, 70-60.

So there'll be another new trophy at Kewaskum High to put aside of the one for the football championship.

Girls Rout Cougars, Lose to Clinton in Sectional Finals

In the first WIAA girls basketball state tournament ever held in that sport, the Kewaskum girls varsity team went all the way to the Sectional finals before being eliminated. One more victory and they would have advanced to the state tournament.

After drawing a bye in the sub-regional, the Indian girls edged out Slinger and Pewaukee in the regional tournament at Slinger and then advanced to the sectional at Edgerton, where they ousted Campbellsport in their opener Friday night, 69-43. They were finally eliminated in the Sectional finals Saturday night by a strong Clinton team (19-1), 46-30. Kewaskum and Campbellsport, which are only six or seven miles apart, had to travel over 90 miles to Edgerton to play each other in the Sectional. Compared to Clinton's 19-1 record, Kewaskum wound up with an overall 14-6 mark. They placed third in the Scenic Moraine Conference with 9-5. Clinton had defeated Sheboygan Falls in their Sectional opener.

In the Sectional opener with Campbellsport, Diane Strack of the Indians led all scorers with 19 points, followed by Wanda Akin with 15 and Julie Stoffel 14. Terry Nonhoff had 17 for the Cougars. In an earlier game this season, Kewaskum also defeated Campbellsport by 9 points. Friday's game was decided early as the Indians jumped off to a 21-8 first quarter lead and increased it to 33-16 at halftime.

In the Clinton game, key players getting into foul trouble and not being able to convert free throws early may have been the difference. Scoring leader Strack picked up 3 fouls in the first quarter. Clinton was ahead by only 5 points, 20-15 at halftime. In the third period Clinton scored 10 straight points to go ahead, 32-17. Strack fouled out late in the third quarter, and Akin did the same early in the fourth period, and that was the ball game. Stoffel led with 16 points. Vicky Voss had 14 for Clinton and Nancy Kruizen-

gon 13. Strack, who has a 15-point average, ended with just 2 and this hurt. Kewaskum didn't play as well as they have been. Clinton, which lost only to Milton this year, faces New Richmond Friday at 1 p. m. in the state tournament.

Indians Oust Rams, Advance To Kiel Regional on Friday

In Sub-Regional tournament action at Kewaskum Tuesday night, the Indians ousted Random Lake in convincing fashion, 76-54, to advance to the Regional at Kiel on Friday night.

Kewaskum will face the New Holstein Huskies, Packeland Conference champions, in the first game at 7 p. m., followed by Kiel (10-3) vs. Sheboygan Falls (winner) over Campbellsport Tuesday, 86-59, at 8:30. New Holstein and Kiel drew Sub-Regional byes. The Indians will be up against a tough opponent in New Holstein, which finished 11-2 in their conference and 14-4 overall, the same as the Indians. The sports editor of the Manitowoc Herald-Times-Reporter called the Statesman Wednesday morning for information and some statistics on the Indians for their paper.

Winners at the Kiel Regional Friday will play for the championship at 7:30 Saturday night and the right to move up to Sectional action.

Tickets for the Kiel Regional were on sale Wednesday at the Kewaskum High School office until 5 p. m. and will be on sale all day Thursday. Kewaskum will enter Regional play without the services of 6-foot-5 Tom Edwards who re-injured a broken bone in his foot at Mayville. His height will be missed.

In the Random Lake Sub-Regional here Tuesday, the Rams made the first basket but from then on it was all Kewaskum, heavily favored over a team that had won only 4 games this season. The Indian press gave Random fits.
