Lightning Strikes Twice, Causes Serious Damage at Roeder Home

During a sleet storm early Monday evening, lightning struck twice in the area. A transformer near a rural home was hit and lightning struck a home in the village, causing a fire which did extensive damage.

The transformer hit was across the road from the Ar-dell Cardarelle home on Highland Drive in the Town of Kewaskum, about 11/2 miles northwest of the village. The Cardarelle home was not damaged but the lights and telephone were knocked out. Mrs. Cardarelle got the children out of the home and called the fire department and power company. The home struck was that of Mrs. Mary Roeder at 202 Forest 'Ave., where 32 firemen worked nearly four hours fighting smoke and flames in inclement weather.

The bolt near the Cardarelle home struck shortly after 6 p. m. While Fire Chief Augie Bilgo, Jr. was being notified of it by the sheriff's dispatcher, and informing him he would send several of his men to check the area, the dispatcher got the call for a fire at the Roeder home at 6:10 p. m.

About 10 tanks of air were used. Windows were broken and later foam was poured into the basement. When fire was found in the walls and floor the firemen used water to put out the blaze. They also had to cut a hole in the floor of the living room.

Bilgo believed that lightning had struck the electrical system in the basement, causing fire which followed wires throughout the house. Within seconds after the lightning hit, Mrs. Roeder and her aunt noticed smoke coming from the basement. Because her phone was knocked out, Mrs. Roeder called the fire department from a neighbor's home. A neighbor also reported seeing a ball of fire after the lightning struck.

Damage to the basement area, which included a family room, and its contents was extensive. Basement air ducts melted from the intense heat. Bilgo said he felt all floor joists in the basement would have to be replaced.

The plumbing contract for the new Kewaskum fire station was awarded at the bimonthly meeting of the Ke-waskum Village Board, for

The contract was awarded to H and H Refrigeration of Iron Ridge, with no alternates. They submitted the low bid in that category at the time bids were opened. and their previous experience includes work done at the Iron Ridge fire station.

Annexation of land owned Roger Strack, Howard Laubenstein, and Joe Butschlick was approved by the board, after the required waiting period had expired. They will now form the village's southern boundary.
