#### Washington County a Disaster Area

# Ice Storm Worst in Memory

A three-day ice storm which started last Monday and Tuesday and reached its peak on Thursday, was reported to be the worst in memory, probably the worst ever. It included rain, freezing rain, sleet, snow, thunder and lightning.

The devastating storm left damage Thursday and Friday like a tornado had struck the area. Electric and telephone poles and wires were downed, an unbelievable number of trees, limbs and branches were felled all over from the terrific weight of the ice coating, many sections were without heat, light and power for days, all events were canpeople were warned celled, to stay off the streets because of falling, arcing live wires and trees, some villages and cities were isolated, highways and streets were closed and barricaded, schools and industries closed, police and firemen were on duty around the clock.

The storm left a mess of debris and trees and shrubs which were not broken bent to the ground or were stripped from the weight of the ice coating. Many of them were ruined. People were

frightened by the falling wires flashing and the sound of trees and limbs cracking off could be heard everyplace. Chain saws were heard constantly cleaning up the fallen trees and limbs over the weekend.

Roseland Drive between Midland Ave. and Western Ave. was one of the hardest hit in the village. Fallen trees and limbs blocked the street and six trees had to be cut off completely because of being damaged and crippled so badly. Riverview Dr. from Main St. to the village park was also blockaded because of fallen wires and tree branches.

Local schools were closed for five school days on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week and Monday and Tuesday of this week, reopening Wednesday. When full power did come back, buses were unable to complete their routes because of fallen wires and trees. Regal Ware was shut down from Friday until Tuesday. A number of local business places were closed due to a lack of light and power. Resident who had light and heat took neighbors and friends without into their homes to keep warm, some housing 12 or 14 peo-

Winds gusting up to 50 miles an hour and below freezing temperatures on Friday added to the havoc, breaking more trees but blowing some of the ice off them. There were flash floods in many areas. From 50,000 to 60,000 homes in the surrounding area were without power and light and Washington County was probably the most severely hit.

There was the danger of water pipes freezing. Farmers had problems getting water for cattle. Milking and milk cooling also was difficult. Farmers tried to get access to portable generators. The government sent some emergency generators. Ice in ponds was broken for water, which was also hauled. Dry ice was distributed and shipped in where available keep foods from to help spoiling.

Friday noon Lt. Gov. Martin Schreiber ordered 200 National Guardsmen Washington County to help maintain officials road blocks, drive trucks, distribute dry ice and portable generators and guard busi-ness buildings. When Gov. ness buildings. Lucey returned to Wisconsin from Washington, D. C. he doubled the number guardsmen.

In Washington County many poles roads. themselves fell across about It was estimated that 500 utility poles were down, some of them steel towers that carry high voltage lines. About 2,000 wires were wires were down. Forty downed poles were counted on U.S. 45 between Kewaskum and West Bend.

Washington County Civil Defense Director Sherman Carr closed the county to all traffic except emergency vehicles. The ban even included U.S. 41, the main artery to the north. State Hwy. 45 south of West Bend was still closed Monday, where utility wires went down across the road. County Hwy. 175 was also closed. On these highways power lines were hanging so low there was danger of limbs breaking them and adding to the peril. Major power lines blocked State Hwy. 33 between West Bend and Newburg. In Sheboygan County there was no way to get either into or out of Ran-Lake. Eighty per cent and in some areas 90 percent of the homes were without

# Firemen Answer 5 More Calls, 3 At Same Place

The Kewaskum Fire Department was called out five more times during the early morning hours following last week's devastating ice storm. Three of the calls were to the same home.

Two of the fires occurred early Friday morning. One at 2:02 a. m. was at the Tom Miklas residence on Townline Road (St. Bridget's Road) three miles west of Kewaskum. Timbers in back of a stone fireplace started burning in the house. There was no electrical power in the home and the family was using the fireplace for heat. Firemen removed some of the timbers and put out the blaze.

The second fire at 6:50 a.m. was at the Mrs. Selma (Sally) Backhaus home on North Fond du Lac Ave. (Hwy. 45) near the northwest village limits. Little damage was reported from the chimney blaze.

Early Monday morning the firemen were called to the John Fischer residence on County S west of New Fane. The Fischers' fireplace, which was being used to keep their home warm during the power outage, overheated causing fire to start in the beams behind and under the stone facing. The firemen responded to this call at 1:27 a. m. and fought the blaze until 3:20 a. m.

When the Fischers discovered more fire in the beams they put in a second call at 4:05 a. m. Fire Chief Augie Bilga, Jr. reported that some beams were charred behind the fireplace and had to be removed. The firemen also had to remove some of the stones from the front of the fireplace. They used a small amount of water to extinguish the blaze.

Bilgo received another call from Mrs. Fischer at 8:53 a. m. when she noticed there was still smoke and steam coming from the house. She requested that he send some of the men back to check the home once more. The fire call went out again and a number of men responded to the home for the third time. The Fischers had been without heat or electricity since last Wednesday afternoon.

The firemen answered six the one last week Monday evening when a bolt of light-ning hit Mrs. Mary Roeder's home on Forest Ave., causing extensive smoke and fire damage. At the same time lightning also struck a transformer across the road from the Ardell Cardarelle Home on Highland Dr., about 11/2 miles northwest of the village. The home was not damaged but the lights and telephone were knocked out. While Chief Bilgo was being notified of the Cardarelle bolt, the call came in to the Roeder home. Details on these fires were published last week.

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

power and light.

Radio stations WTKM in Hartford, the Port . Washington station and WBKV FM of West Bend were out of service for one day. WBKV AM of West Bend was operating on emergency power and stayed on longer hours to give emergency reports.

People were urged to stay in their homes because of the danger of falling branches and hot wires. They were also urged not to use their telephones except in case of emergency.

In West Bend an emergency care center was set up by the Red Cross at Silverbrook Middle School. Then about 2 a. m. Friday that school lost power. It was later restored. In Kewaskum, the Peace Church, Kewaskum High School and K & R Carpeting offered shelter and warmth.

A state of emergency was declared and Hartford and West Bend almost completely closed Friday. Part of Kewaskum was also closed. Some church services were cancelled. Damage was much greater than at first thought and repair crews said it would take months before things would return to normal.

People who were fortunate enough to have light and power had relatives and move in while friends their power was out. Many families resorted back to the ways of their grandparents, putting up wood and oil space heaters and cooking stoves.

many fire There were calls. In West Bend there were 18 fire and rescue calls Thursday night, the most ever. In Kewaskum there were seven fire calls within a week

Thursday night was a very eerie and frightening one. Besides policemen and firemen, many others kept an all night vigil. Others slept restlessly in chairs or with their clothes on. There was the never ending breaking and cracking of tree branches, wires snapping and arcing, and the expected sounds of police and fire sirens. One resident reported that upon glancing out of her window

about 2 a. m. sparks of fire were arcing in every direc-

The last remembered bad ice storm was in February, Things were not as completely dependent on electricity for heat and power then so it did not appear as

Affected areas were roughly south of a line from Crawford to Ozaukee counties with Washington County the hardest hit. It was declared a disaster area.

In our area there were an estimated 647 without telephone service. Allenton was completely without phone service. The streets closed in Kewaskum were mainly those where larger trees had been established. Some gas stations on the southwestern part of town were unable to pump gas. Two village food stores had light and power and there was an outage at the other.

About 1½ inches of ice formed on wires, which was too heavy a load for them to take. Millions of dollars in damage and in cost to industry, which could not operate because of the overburden it would put on power lines, resulted. Many businesses and farmers in the locality suffered thousands of dollars worth of damage. At some business places food had to be given away or else thrown away because of spoilage.

Arthur Kurtz, deputy state secretary of agriculture, called the ice storm the most devastating disaster ever inflicted on Wisconsin farmers. Milk had to be dumped and there is danger to the crops if the ice stays too lang on the land. Some farmers' cows developed mastitis because they were not milked on time.

Gov. Patrick Lucey arrived at the West Bend airport on Tuesday by helicopter to get a first hand look at damage on a two hour tour in Washington County. He said it reminded him of the destruction done by the tornado in the Oshkosh area. He thinks after the estimate of damage is made there may be a good chance that the county will be declared a disaster area

and eligible for federal funds. Members of the village

crew, volunteer firemen and lots of other volunteers helped remove fallen branches. haul them away in village vehicles, and clear streets. Many brought their own chain saws. The current was off at one of the sewage lift stations causing a backup. Crews worked late into the night cleaning the street sewers and some basements were reported flooded. Supt. of Public Works August Bilgo and his crew also worked all day Saturday.



In a battle between two conference champions, Kewaskum, the Scenic Moraine kingpin, ousted New Holstein, Packerland Conference titlist, 77-72, in the Regional at Kiel Saturday night, postponed from Friday because of the ice storm.

Two-time Class B state champion Sheboygan Falls, which won the state titles in 1974 and 1975, flashed its form of old in demolishing Kiel, 74-56, in the second game.

Kewaskum and Sheboygan Falls thus earned the right to meet for the Kiel Regional championship Monday night, in which the Falls Falcons whipped the Indians, 91-73, in their third impressive tournament win. Falls now moves on to the Whitewater Sectional this weekend.

Kewaskum was in a tough tournament bracket with New Holstein's Packerland Conference champions, Kiel's Packerland runner-up, and Sheboygan Falls' defending state champs.

Led by the bruising board play of 6-4 Jack Kern, Kewaskum was ahead of New Holstein most of the way. Kern scored 26 points and grabbed 14 rebounds. With Jack setting the pace, the Indians controlled the boards, 33-24, with Kerns' play out-

standing. The Indians had another hot hand in Scott Tessar, who chipped in with 25 points. Guard Tom Rohlinger added 12 points and forward Leon Laatsch had 10. Rohlinger's points came at key times, two of his baskets at the start of the last quarter.

High scorer Ken Depies led the Huskies with 21 points and Neal Bricco scored 19, but New Holstein couldn't match Kewaskum's strong inside game

Kewaskum made 30 of 68 shots, for 44 per cent, while the Huskies hit 31 of 61 shots for 51 per cent. The Indians outscored the Huskies at the free throw line, 17-10.

Depies, 6-3 junior, is a fine player but Kern was better, driving on him all night When the drives didn't work offensive rebounding by Kern led to some easy second shots and a few fine tip-ins. Depies was No. 2 scorer in his conference.

Sheboygan Falls spent most of the night at the free throw line as the Falcons downed Kewaskum in the Regional finals Monday, 91-73. The Falcons, who have come on strong after a slow this season and now are 12-9, made 29 of 38 free throws to keep their hopes alive for a third straight state championship.

Falls will join Regional winners Milton, St. Francis and the winner of the Ripon-Columbus Regional in the Whitewater Sectional. Ripon beat Slinger and Columbus ousted Mayville in overtime.

A big 27-point second quarter propelled Sheboygan Falls to a 15-point halftime lead, 47-32, over Kewaskum. The Indians never did catch up. They did close the gap to 8 points in the fourth quarter but the rally lost its steam when Leon Laatsch, the Indians' leading scorer with 19 points, fouled out.

Slick 6-1 senior guard John Mauer, who was held to 8 points in the first half,

came on after the intermission to lead all scorers with 30 points. Mauer, a starter on Falls' last two state championship teams, was deadly at the free throw line. He made 14 of 17, including 8 of 10 in the final quarter. Kewaskum coach Jim Westphal said Mauer is probably the best player his team has seen all year and possibly one of the better guards in the

Westphal was puzzled by his team's heavy fouling. "We never fouled that much before," he said. He also felt that Kewaskum's inability to contain the Falcons' other guard, Terry Gottsacker, hurt in the first half when the game hung in the balance. Gottsacker scored 14 of his 17 points before halftime.

Kern and Tessar followed Laatsch, the only non-senior in Kewaskum's starting lineup, with 18 points apiece. Rohlinger had 11 as Kewaskum closed the book on a 16-5 season. Chuck Mauer had 20 for the Falcons and Debbink 14.

The Indians appeared tight, committing a raft of turnovers in the first quarter. The Falcons threw a box and one on Kern and he only got his hands on the ball once offensively in the quarter. Fouls and mistakes plagued the Indians in the second quarter. Besides Laatsch, Rohlinger and Jim Bilgo (who played with a very sore ankle) also fouled out and that was it. The Indians were 42% from the floor to 46% for the win-

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



Notice is hereby given that the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum will hold a public hearing on the 22nd day of March, 1976, at 8:00 P. M. in the Municipal Building of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, for the following purposes:

PART I To amend the ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, the following proposals shall be considered:

A: To repeal the YARD requirements of the B-4 section of Section 3.4 of the Zoning Ordinance of the Village of Kewaskum, and to re-create same as follows:

With the permitted use restriction that, "all operations shall be conducted within an enclosed building".
