\$16,573.40 for Cleanup Operations Approved by the Village Board

A total of \$16,573.40 in estimated expenses for the cleanup operations following the recent ice storm was the amount approved by the Ke-Village Board on waskum Monday

Of that total, \$7,000 is the estimated cost of damage to the village park, including damage to wiring, lights, and debris cleanup. The remainder of the cost was in scattered categories, the two largest being wages to village employees and the cost of repairs to a generator at the sewage treatment plant.

Howard Laubenstein and Joe Butschlick were authorized to prepare the necessary papers for the village to obtain an easement through their property, to install sewer and water laterals. The easement will extend through to the edge of their property so that future homes in that area could tao onto their laterals. Laubenstein also reported that his lawn and garden center as well as Roger service should have their

changed from B1 to B3, which is less restrictive.

Superintendent of Public Works August Bilgo reported that no one will be allowed to burn damaged tree limbs. despite similar actions in neighboring townshins. such refuse should be left on the curb for pick un by the village. Trustee Dan Schmidt urged that any homeowner having trees with damaged limbs should have them trimmed at once, as well as painted so that disease does not spread throughout the village.

A proposal to hire another part-time patrolman by police chief Don Hlavaty was tabled. He had requested that the extra help be obtained. since the present patrolman substitute is not always available when needed.

A building permit was issued to Schulz Realty for a one family residence Edgewood Lane, and a tavern license was granted to Terry Jordan, who will operate the business formerly called "Tom's Place" on Riverview

If you have a cold or have are under 110 pounds, pregnant, or traveled out of the U. S. within the past six months, you cannot donate this time. If you ever had hepatitis, jaundice, cancer. heart disease or diabetes, you are also unable to give.

If you are 17, you will need a Blood Center consent form which will be available that day, signed by your parent or guardian. If you are 18 you can make your own decision to be a blood donor.

You may donate every 10 weeks, but not more than five times in 12 consecutive

Martin Honored Two Intern Teaching Positions For 25 Years As Approved at School Board Meeting

Two intern teaching positions for the 1976-77 school year were approved at the meeting on March 10 of the Kewaskum Board of Education. Discussion was held on three positions, one each in agriculture, mathematics and industrial arts. The board approved one in agriculture and one in mathematics.

Intern teachers can teach half-time, the remainder of their day reserved for inservice, classroom visitations, meetings with advisors and teaching preparation. Each intern works one semester, and the cost to the district is \$2,000 per semester for each intern.

The board discussed the question of make-up days as a result of the ice storm. Not knowing what the state ruling will be on making up the days, the board decided to tentatively plan now to make up the three days on those dates set in the master agreement. They would be April 9, April 19, and June 4. This question will be considered again when a ruling comes from the state.

Contracts were approved to be issued to teachers for the 1976-77 school year. They were issued on the basis of this year's master agreement, negotiations or discussions on and will be adjusted when salaries are concluded.

Paul Redig made a presen-

tation, on behalf of the Fra. of six copies of the book THE GROWING OF AMERI-CA. One copy is to go to each of the six buildings. Redig also gave a brief statement on the present status of the Kewaskum FFA, and reported that an FFA alumni group is being formed. The board expressed its support for this new organization.

Approval was given for Al Liegl to repair the folding wall of the old high school gym. The cost will be approximately \$1,400. They also approved the purchase of a used rebuilt offset printing machine at a cost of about \$1,200. A summer classroom driver education course was approved.

The contract for Floyd Brenholt as superintendent of 1976-77 was apschools for proved. The new contract amount will be \$23,675 compared to \$22,845 this year. The mileage rate to be paid for school business was increased from 10c to 13c per mile. Other benefits remained the same as in previous years. except that if the premium for health and accident insurance increases more than \$100 per year, this will be reviewed.

A closed session was held following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations, nonscheduled professional salaries and a grievance.

Bicentennial Committee Plans To Build Bathhouse in New Park

A plan to build a bathhouse at the new village park by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee came one step closer to reality at the March meeting.

Member Merv Thompson reported that he obtained permission for the committee to tear down an abandoned church in the Town of Wayne, which will be used to supply bricks for the new structure. The Kewaskum High School Student Council has offered to assist by helping clean up the bricks and help haul them into town. Work on the project will begin sometime in the spring if everything goes as planned.

The committee decided to print not less than 1,500 books on Kewaskum's history, which will be available later this spring. They will be sold at



The destruction to electric wires and poles in the March 1976 ice storm was massive; in many cases, entire stretches of lines had to be completely rebuilt. In the hardest hit area -- the Washington and Ozaukee counties -- many subtransmission lines were extensively damaged. As shown in this simplified Wisconsin Electric Power Co. diagram, the subtransmission line (1) had to be rebuilt, before the distribution substations (2) could get electricity. After the substations were energized, the primary distribution lines (3) had to be repaired. It was only after the subtransmission lines, substations, poles, transformers and main distribution lines were repaired that work could begin on the individual service lines (4) that were connected directly to the main distribution lines and on the extension lines (5) and the individual service lines fed from these. -Wisconsin Electric



Wisconsin Electric Power Company officials estimated that electric service would be restored to almost all re-maining customers by last Friday night, depending on the severity of the weather Thursday and Friday.

A company spokesman said that service restoration to a small number of scattered customers in isolated areas might require additional time and crews would continue to work on that task through the weekend, and in-to this week if necessary until all customers are back in service.

The destruction to wires and poles in portions of Wisconsin Electric's service area from the ice, rain and wind conditions was massive, according to the utility spokesman. In many cases, entire stretches of line going into and coming out of substations had to be completely rebuilt. At the height of the storm. the spokesman said, approximately 60,000 customers were without service. The hardest hit areas were in Washington, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Waukesha, Jefferson and Walworth counties.

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY TO THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

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
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
