President Ford Visits Area



More than 5,000 people, many of them from Kewaskum, crowded into the West Bend high schools field house Friday night to see and hear the President of the United States, Gerald Ford, who spoke in West Bend while on a weekend swing through the state.

The talk was brief, about 20 minutes, which was followed by a question and answer period. Sometimes people were lined up 18 deep at the microphone and the President answered some tough questions thrown at him. He was about an hour late for the speech because of crowds that flocked along the route of his motorcade, which came from Milwaukee by way of U.S. 41 and State 33. Ford was never without a large contingent of secret service agents, presidential staff and the press.

President Ford spent the night at the West Bend Holiday Inn where he met with campaign workers and community leaders at a closed reception.

It was the first presidential appearance in West Bend since Franklin D. Roosevelt came in the 1930's.

Early Saturday morning President Ford visited Senland Farms at R. 1, Campbellsport, where he walked through a dairy farm, learned of dairy farm problems and ate a hearty dairy farm breakfast. The Peter Senn family greeted Ford at 7:35 a. m. as he brought his presidential campaign to Fond du Lac County.

Accompanying the President to Senland Farms were 6th District Rep. William A. Steiger, former Gov. Warren Knowles, who heads Ford's Wisconsin campaign, former Defense Secretary Melvin Laird, and White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen.

Senn led the tour of the farm buildings as he and the President talked constantly and intimately during the walking tour of the farm. Ford ran into a problem while touring the dairy barn when his pants became "soiled" and he changed clothes before sitting down for breakfast with the Senns.

In the house, where only four writers, all from the national press pool, were allowed, President Ford spent about 45 minutes with the

Senns and Steiger. He ate well, according to the Senns. The menu included milk fresh from the Senns' Grade A cooler, scrambled eggs, sausage and bran muffins.

The presidential campaign then left for Fond du Lac where a parade and reception were held. The crowd along the parade route was estimated around 40,000. President Ford attended a farm forum at the Goodrich Little Theatre for about 500 invitation-only agriculturalists. Following the forum, the President attended a reception in the Goodrich Cafeteria for some 700 persons before the parade down Main St.

The President rode in a huge, black limousine — one of his special cars flown to Wisconsin Friday from Washington, D.C. for his stops in Milwaukee, West Bend, Campbellsport, Fond du Lac, Oshkosh and Green Bay, where he concluded his tour by dedicating the new Packer Hall of Fame building before returning to Washington.

11 Local People Honored to Meet President Ford

Eleven local people from Kewaskum were honored to meet the president of the United States last Friday evening at a private reception at the Holiday Inn in West Bend. The lucky 11 were Dr. and Mrs. R. G. Edwards, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Zarling, Lester Francke, Gladys Garbisch, Mrs. Lorinda Tessar, Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Stautz and Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Seefeldt.

Many familiar faces at the reception belonged to those from the local elected hierarchy, the Republican party and the business community. There were several Democratic faces in the room and a few Reagan supporters. There was a large contingent of secret service agents, presidential staff, and the press which was confined in a roped-off

area.

From that area, the media could mark the progress of the President's high forehead, which was about all that could be seen at first, as he worked his way through the group, shaking hands and signing autographs to the time of "Yessir, That's My Baby," played by the three-piece Don Sampson orchestra.

The oom-pa-pa beat changed to "Angry, Please Don't Be Angry," as he neared the press area, surrounded by the secret service agents and the local greeters and meeters.

The way had been prepared earlier by the secret service as well, which checked thoroughly the paraphernalia of musicians, camera men and others and also kept a close watch and ear on the

doors and the progress of the president toward the reception.

Waiting for the President's arrival, the guests slowly filtered in, clustering in small groups. The women wore a variety of costumes, ranging from dressy pantsuits to elegant evening formal wear, and the men sported dark business suits or smart leisure outfits.

"It was very exciting to be there," commented Char Zarling. In fact when the invitation was extended to them Thursday morning, she thought it was an April Fools joke. They had been out of town for 10 days and didn't realize the President was coming to Wisconsin, let alone to Washington County and then having the opportunity to meet him in person.

Yoost Defeated by Danielsen, School Board Members Re-Elected; Near Record Vote of 742 Cast

The voter turnout in Tuesday's spring election was the second largest in the history of the Village of Kewaskum. An unexpected 742 votes were cast, only 33 less than the record in 1972 of 775. Warm, sunny weather no doubt boosted the turnout as voters stood in line during most of the evening hours. Close to 70 per cent of the registered voters turned out.

An upset was recorded in the race for village trustee when incumbent Elmer Yoost was defeated. Yoost finished last in the balloting as he failed to gain a fifth two-year term on the board. The other incumbents, Raynor Herriges and Gregor Nigh, won re-election. Newcomer Robert Danielsen finished second in the balloting, also outpolling Nigh. Herriges received the most votes, 560, Danielsen 519, Nigh 513, and Yoost 413. Herriges will be serving his fifth term, Nigh his fourth and Danielsen his first.

In the race for the Kewaskum School Board, both incumbents won new three year terms. Byron Gessner of the Town of Scott finished first with 1,466 votes to 1,457 for Gerald Secor of the Town of Farmington and 1,066 for the first time candidate Richard LaFleur of the Village of Kewaskum. Secor will be starting his third term on the board, while Gessner has served one term on the board. Gessner finished first in five of the townships of the district and Secor in two. Each received two votes in Mitchell and there were no votes in Ashford. The only area where Gessner made a poor showing was in the Village of Kewaskum where he was last. Secor took the village by 87 votes, tallying 527 votes to 440 for LaFleur and 420 for Gessner.

Secor 48, LaFleur 31; Town of Ashford—No votes; Town of Auburn—Gessner 96, Secor 99, LaFleur 69; Town of Farmington—Gessner 300, Secor 268, LaFleur 184; Town of Scott—Gessner 150, Secor 106, LaFleur 77; Town of Wayne—Gessner 208, Secor 188, LaFleur 103; Town of Mitchell—Gessner 2, Secor 2, LaFleur 0.

LaFleur made a respectable showing for his first attempt at seeking office. He did well in the village but fell off in the rural areas where he may have lacked name recognition. Unofficially, 2,100 persons cast ballots in the district this year compared to an estimated 1,500 last year. The presidential primary may have been a reason for a heavier turnout.

Results in the presidential preference vote in the Village of Kewaskum were as follows: Democratic Party—Sargent Shriver 0, George Wallace 21, Lloyd Bentsen 1, Jimmy Carter 153, Morris Udall 110, Fred Harris 1, Ellen McCormack 22, Henry M. Jackson 27, Birch Bayh 0, Milton Shapp 0, write-ins, Humphrey 3, Republican Party—Gerald R. Ford 261, Ronald Reagan 133, American Party—None. Kewaskum voters followed the trend on the state, giving Carter and Ford the most votes.

On the county supervisor ballot, Charles F. Miller, village president and incumbent member of the Washington County Board for the Village of Kewaskum, District No. 10, was unopposed for re-election. He received 664 votes and there were 11 write-ins.

On the judicial ballot for justice of the supreme court Roland B. Day, incumbent, was re-elected over Leander J. Foley in the village. Day received 408 votes to 288 for Foley.

On the referendum question in the village there were 401 "no" votes and 254 "yes" votes. The referendum also lost out statewide.

CESA Committee Meets With School Board; To Make Up 3 School Days

Agency School Committee members from CESA 16, along with Royal Tice, CESA 16 Coordinator, attended the meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education held Monday evening, Mar. 29. The primary purpose of their visit was to become acquainted with members of the Kewaskum board and with the Kewaskum School District. Following their discussion with the board, they toured the middle school and high school buildings.

The Agency School Committee has seven members. It is charged with the responsibility of making determinations on any boundary changes or school district reorganization problems which may arise in their CESA area. The members of the Agency School Committee are appointed by the CESA Board of Control, which is an elected group. In reply to a question, the board was told that the Committee presently handles an average of about four change requests a year, most of them small changes.

Most of the board questions centered around the way in which decisions of the Committee are appealed to the state. A decision of the committee can be appealed to the state. Four chairmen of non-involved Agency School Committees from other areas of the state are appointed, along with someone from the Department of Public Instruction. This group, upon an appeal, reviews the decision of the Agency School Committee which was originally involved.

Clark Pearson, High School Principal, gave a report on North Central. He presented a summary of both commendations and recommendations from the evaluation committee, along with a letter which indicated a final decision on membership would be made soon. The final report will also be available soon in printed form.

Bob Danielsen presented an award to Kathy Spencer. She was named the Junior Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Young Educator of the Year. Miss Spencer teaches Spanish at the High School. She is advisor to American Field Service, and works with many other student activities.

Three of the days of school lost because of the recent ice storm or for other reasons

will be made up. The makeup days will be April 9, April 19, and June 4. An additional 1/2 day of teacher in-service will be made up, that on Saturday, June 5. All schools, except Wayne, lost four teaching days during the storm. Wayne lost five. The Kewaskum Elementary School lost one day last fall because of vandalism. The three days of makeup will also handle the additional Kewaskum Elementary lost day since the state required only one day be made up in each school as a result of the ice storm.

A new appraisal which was just received from Industrial Appraisal Co. resulted in the board increasing insurance coverage on the buildings and equipment of the district. The new appraisal showed replacement values of over \$11,500,000 and insurance coverage was at \$8,200,000. A good share of the difference came in the buildings

just completed. Those buildings and their fixed equipment were listed at the cost paid for them of approximately \$1,800,000. The appraised value of those new buildings, however, is nearly \$3,100,000.

In other actions, the board decided to run only those summer school programs operated last year. These were only in driver education and music. They also approved an application for a Federal Title IV Program for library materials and two assistant track coaches for this year only at the middle school. Following the open session, the board adjourned to closed session to discuss negotiations, a grievance, and non-scheduled professional salaries.

Board of Education To Meet Monday

The Kewaskum Board of Education will hold its regular meeting on Monday, April 12, at 8 p. m. in the administrative offices. Two items of old business will be on the agenda, as the board will discuss possible additions to the special education staff and to the Middle School staff. The special education staff proposals include a teacher of students with learning disabilities for the secondary level students and a teacher of pre-kindergarten

age students with learning problems. The Middle School staff member addition would be to reduce class sizes and the number of teaching assignments of some teachers.

Resurfacing of tennis courts and approval to install the paint spray booth are business items on the agenda. Miscellaneous items which come up will also be considered, and the board will discuss non-scheduled professional salaries in closed session.

Highlights of 1975 Recalled at Historical Society Tea Party

Highlights of 1975 were recalled by President Dan Schmidt of the Kewaskum Historical Society at their tea party prior to the March meeting.

The society met for the first time in January, 1975, and elected the following as officers for the year: Dan Schmidt - president, Jim Paul - vice president, Ros Kiefer - treasurer, Vange Teeselink - secretary, Janet Koch, Charles Miller and Merv Thompson - board of directors.

In May, a display including antiques, photos, glassware and postcards was exhibited in the lobby of the Valley Bank in Kewaskum, followed by a flag raising ceremony on Memorial Day.

The society had vehicles in the firemen's parade in July, and got wet in a rope pulling

contest. Also that month, they set up a small display at the Washington County Fair to make themselves known to the people of the county.

"Early Farm Days" antique show last August was by far the society's biggest event of the year, as over 40 exhibitors brought antique farm equipment to display at the village park, in conjunction with the Lions Club Chicken Barbeque. A threshing bee was held, as over 1,000 people attended during the show, and plans are already underway for another one this year. There are plans for an ice cream social in addition to the exhibits, and the Lions have pledged some plates of chicken to help raise money.

In October, the lease was signed for the museum on Parkview Drive. Funds and

manpower are badly needed in order to meet the May 29 projected opening date. Plans call for a store, parlor, outhouse, schoolroom, and fireplace to be located upstairs and some farm equipment will be displayed in the basement.

Although much has been done, there is still much work to be done, including ceiling painting, installing a restroom, installing a new front door, weatherproofing, and fixing up the basement.

The 1975 officers were elected at the annual meeting this January as follows: Dan Schmidt - president, Jim Paul - vice president, Ros Kiefer - treasurer, Cliff Stautz - secretary, directors Hattie Weddig, Gloria Rodenkirch and Robert Schultz, with Vange Teeselink and Janet Koch elected as curators.
