President Ford Visits Area



More than 5,000 people from Kewasmany of them kum, crowded into the West Bend high schools field house Friday night to see and hear the President of the United States, Gerald Ford, who spoke in West Bend while on a weekend swing through the state.

The talk was brief, about 20 minutes, which was followed by a question and answer period. Sometimes people were lined up 18 deep at the microphone and the President answered some tough questions thrown at him. He was about an hour late for the speech because of crowds that flocked along the route of his motorcade, which came from Milwaukee by way of U.S. 41 and State 33. Ford was never without a large contingent of secret service agents, presidential staff and the press.

President Ford spent the night at the West Bend Holiday Inn where he met with campaign workers and community leaders at a closed reception.

It was the first presidential appearance in West Bend since Franklin D. Roosevelt came in the 1930's.

Early Saturday morning President Ford visited Sen land Farms at R. 1, Campbellsport, where he walked through a dairy farm, learned of dairy farm problems and ate a hearty dairy farm breakfast. The Peter Senn family greeted Ford at 7:35 a. m. as he brought his presidential campaign to Fond du Lac County.

Accompanying the President to Senland Farms were 6th District Rep. William A. Steiger ,former Gov. Warren Knowles, who heads Ford's Wisconsin campaign, Defense Secretary former Melvin Laird, and White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen.

Senn led the tour of the farm buildings as he and the President talked constantly and intimately during the walking tour of the farm. Ford ran into a problem while touring the dairy barn when his pants became "soiled" and he changed clothes before sitting down for breakfast with the Senns. In the house, where only four writers, all from the national press pool, were allowed, President Ford spent about 45 minutes with the

Senns and Steiger. He ate well, according to the Senns. The menu included milk fresh from the Senns' Grade A cooler, scrambled eggs, sausage and bran muffins.

The presidential campaign then left for Fond du Lac where a parade and recep-tion were held. The crowd along the parade route was estimated around 40,000. President Ford attended a farm forum at the Goodrich Little Theatre for about 500 invitation - only agriculturalists. Following the forum, the President attended a reception in the Goodrich Cafeteria for some 700 persons before the parade down Main St

The President rode in a huge, black limousine - one of his special cars flown to Wisconsin Friday from Wash-ington, D.C. for his stops in Milwaukee, West Bend. Campbellsport, Fond du Lac. Oshkosh and Green Bay, where he concluded his tour by dedicating the new Packer Hall of Fame building before returning to Washing-

Yoost Defeated by Danielsen, School Board Members Re-Elected: Near Record Vote of 742 Cast

The voter turnout in Tuesday's spring election was the second largest in the history of the Village of Kewaskum. An unexpected 742 votes were cast, only 33 less than the record in 1972 of 775. Warm, sunny weather no doubt boosted the turnout as voters stood in line during most of the evening hours. Close to 70 per cent of the registered voters turned out.

An upset was recorded in the race for village trustee when incumbent Elmer Yoost was defeated. Yoost finished last in the balloting as he failed to gain a fifth two-year term on the board. The other incumbents, Raynor Herriges and Gregor Nigh, won re-election. Newcomer Robert Danielsen finished second in the balloting. also outpolling Nigh. Herriges received the most votes. Danielsen 519, Nigh 560. 513, and Yoost 413. Herriges will be serving his fifth term, Nigh his fourth and Danielsen his first.

In the race for the Kewaskum School Board, both incumbents won new three year terms. Byron Gessner of the Town of Scott finished first with 1.466 votes to 1.457 for Gerald Secor of the Town of Farmington and 1.066 for the first time candidate Richard LaFleur of the Village of Kewaskum. Secor will be starting his third term on the while Gessner has board. served one term on the board. Gessner finished first in five of the townships of the dis-trict and Secor in two. Each received two votes in Mitchell and there were no votes in 'Ashford. The only area where Gessner made a poor show ing was in the Village of Kewaskum where he was last. Secor took the village by 87 votes. tallying 527 votes to 440 for LaFleur and 420 for Gessner.

LaFleur made a respectable showing for his first attempt at seeking office. He did well in the village but fell off in the rural areas where he may have lacked name recognition. Unofficially, 2,100 persons cast ballots in the district this year compared to an estimated 1,500 last year. The presidential primary may have been a reason for a heavier turnout.

American Party-None. Kewaskum voters followed the trend on the state, giving Carter and Ford the most votes.

On the county supervisor ballot. Charles F. Miller, village president and incumbent member of the Washington County Board for the Village of Kewaskum, District No. 10. was unopposed for re-election. He received 664 votes and there were 11 write-ins.

On the judicial ballot for justice of the supreme court Roland B. Day. incumbent. was re-elected over Leander J. Foley. In the village Day received 408 votes to 288 for Foley.

On the referendum question in the village there were 401 "no" votes and 254 "yes" votes. The referendum also lost out statewide.
