Two Capuchin priests who are native sons of Wisconsin have been assigned to a new mission territory in Honduras. They will serve the spiritual needs of fifteen thousand Miskito Indian people living in an area called Miskitia in Southeastern Honduras. The two priests are Father Donald Richardson, formerly of Milwaukee, and Father Ralph Fellenz, formerly of the Town of Farmington, near Kewaskum. Prior to their new assignment, Father Richardson had spent 15 years and Father Fellenz six years in the missions in eastern Nicaragua.

They will make their misheadquarters at the sion small town of Puerto Lempira which has a population of between 800 and 900 and is the governmental center of the area. From here they will

travel by truck, boat, on horseback and on foot to reach the sixty villages they will serve. They are the first priests to be assigned full time to serve the Miskito In-dian people in Honduras. Prior to this, Capuchins stationed in Waspam, Nicaragua crossed the border at infrequent intervals and reached as many of the people as they could in the space of a few days

The Capuchins were asked by Bishop Jamie Brufau of the Diocese of San Pedro Sula, Nicaragua to open this mission because of their knowledge of the language and culture of the Miskito Indian people. Also, Amperio Bekham, the leading Catholic layman in the Miskitia area of Honduras had studied at Tenth Seminary Pius Bluefields, Nicaragua and the ***********************

Catechetical School at Waspam, Nicaragua both of which were established and are conducted by the Midwest Capuchin Province of St. Joseph.

According to Father Richardson, one of their first

Christian leaders in each of the sixty villages. "The first task of course will be to get to know the people and with them to determine what their needs are," Father Richardson explained. "Then we will move into the area of having the people in each village elect the man they want as spiritual leader for their community. If things run true to form, they usually pick an older, married man whom they respect as a natu-ral leader. Because many of the older people did not have the opportunity for even a minimum education, we will first have to provide alphabetization courses for many of those elected. Once they have gotten the basics of reading and writing, we can start putting on short courses in the villages to prepare them for their work as spiritual leaders or Delegates of the Word as they are known in some places in the States." Father Fellenz explained that most of the Miskito Indians were farmers who eke their living out of a small plot of land on which they grow rice and beans as their staple crops for their own food supply and to sell of the harvest is good. For the most part, farming methods are still very primative although the government is working on a number of human promotion programs which in time should improve this situation. There are now government schools in most of the villages staffed by teachers who studied under government grants and are required to work approximately five years in the villages following their graduation. "Our big challenge is to

get the native Miskito Church developed at least to the level that it is in Nicaragua," Father Richardson said. "Our job is to be animators and to develop the local church to the point where it can take care of itself but this will

Survey Shows 9 of 10 Satisfied With **Funeral Services**

A nation-wide study shows that nine out of ten persons who have arranged a funeral in recent years were very satisfied with the way funeral directors served them.

That was the underlying conclusion in the survey's findings released recently in Milwaukee by Central Surveys, Inc., who conducted the opinion study during the last two months on the public's attitudes toward funeral directors.

The survey also found that:

95% felt the funeral director did a good job of explaining the charges for services, facilities and merchandise available.

- Most people feel that fun-eral directors' charges are "in line" rather than "high" or "low."

- 97% said the funeral director and his staff were helpful and considerate in all ways.

- Most people would call the same funeral director again.

- Only a very small minor-

ity had any unfavorable comments.

Respondents also agreed that funeral directors gave an adequate explanation of the services, facilities and merchandise they had available and 94% said the funeral director did not attempt to pressure them into undesired or unnecessary expenses, services, facilities or merchandise.

The survey results sub-stantiate what funeral directors and funeral director associations, both state and national, have been saying since the Federal Trade Commission started its inquiry into funeral practices, that the

vast majority of Americans are well satisfied, both with their funeral directors and the services they offer.
