Board Approves Hiring of Another Part Time Patrolman, Land Annexed

The Kewaskum Village Board approved the hiring of another part-time patrolman as requested by Chief Donald Hlavaty at their April meeting.

A meeting was held between Hlavaty, the Kewaskum Police Association and the board's public safety committee last week, at which an agreement was reached on the matter. The position was advertised in the Statesman last week and a total of five applications were received. The board discussed them in executive session.

Previously, the Kewaskum Police Association had voiced no objection, as long as whoever was hired did not have first choice of what shifts to work.

Hlavaty also urged the board to investigate the possibility of passing an ordinance banning mini-bikes in the village. The reasons he gave were that they were unsafe and that children, aged 10-12, were riding them on sidewalks and in the streets with several board members agreeing with him. Action on this may be taken up at the next meeting.

Permission was also granted to purchase a new radar unit for the village's squad car, as it is presently not working properly and cannot be repaired. It will be purchased from a firm in West Bend which manufactures them at a cost of \$1,100, so

that replacement parts can be obtained more easily.

The annexation of land owned by Drs. Cesar and Aurora Sison south of the village was approved unanimously. Also included in the annexation were several private homes along Highway 45, so that no "islands" of land belonging to the Town of Kewaskum will be created.

Myron Perschbacher appeared before the board to ask about progress on the new village park. He was told that to date plans have been drawn up, architects and engineers were hired, and test samples were taken. Board member Raynor Herges commented "everybody thinks that you just go in and dig a hole. Charlie (President Miller) made lots of phone calls, but never got to first base." At a previous meeting, it was learned that funds for any type of pool were not available for the past two years.

President Miller stated that, "the only thing that hasn't been done is getting the proper funding. This thing should be started soon."

Mrs. Schaefer Presented 6th District Women's Club Award

At a recent meeting of the Kewaskum Women's Club Mrs. Ray (Agnes) Schaefer, R. 2, Kewaskum, was presented a certificate of Achievement in Creative Homemaking, awarded by the Sixth District, Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs at its convention at Oshkosh, March 31.

Mrs. Charles Miller, president of the Kewaskum Club, who submitted Mrs. Schaefer's name to the district for consideration, noted that she was proud to have been able to sponsor such a well-deserving candidate.

Mrs. Schaefer has been a member of the Women's Club for many years and is also active in numerous other church and community activities. She has served for 16 years in the A.F.S., and as the homes selection chairman has placed 14 A.F.S. students in local homes.

Always interested in directing and helping young people, Mrs. Schaefer taught Sunday School classes for 40 years at St. Lucas Lutheran Church, and was a 4-H leader and sewing instructor for a long period of time. For several years she drove a school bus to Fond du Lac daily so that local students could attend Christian schools there.

Agnes and her husband, Ray, own and operate a beef farm near Kewaskum, and many of her "creative" ideas have been applied to remodeling and redecorating their 100 year old farm home. Recently she refinished woodwork and antiques in a redecorating project, while always pursuing her usual activities... baking, soap-making, canning, freezing, gardening and sewing.

Sewing has been Mrs. Schaefer's primary interest over the years. She says, "I've sewed for my children

from kindergarten through marriage." Her three children are Audray Wiesen, now living in Wauwatosa, David, Kewaskum, and Daniel, working on his Ph. D. in Animal Nutrition at U. of Illinois. All are married, and there are three lively granddaughters to sew for.

Agnes's sewing has caused her friends to marvel. Often she has taken courses to learn the latest methods as new fabrics, etc., have been offered to sewers. A picture of Daniel's formal wedding suit was submitted with the article to the Women's Club committee. After the wedding, she "converted" the suit to informal... another awesome task to knowledgeable seamstresses.

Originally Mrs. Schaefer attended Fond du Lac County Normal School and taught in a one-room country school. After marriage, she substituted in teaching, but found homemaking with all its variations a satisfying outlet. She also keeps records and books for the farm operation, and in recent years has been "assistant" to her husband in his job as assessor for the Town of Kewaskum.

Agnes has held many offices in Women's Club and Ladies' Aid, has done volunteer work in many charities, and at present is working on a committee which is planning Kewaskum's Bicentennial Pageant.

"The Kewaskum Women's Club feels fortunate to have this talented homemaker as a member," said Mrs. Miller, "and we are justly proud of her achievement."

Marjorie Schoofs Receives \$4,000 Lakeland Grant

Miss Marjorie Schoofs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Schoofs of Kewaskum, has received the prestigious Dean's Honor Award from Lakeland College, Sheboygan. The scholarship is a four-year, \$4,000 grant. In order to qualify, the student must have been in the upper ten percent of her class, scholastically, have evidenced academic superiority, been recommended by her counselor and been active in the extra-curricular events in her high school. Marjorie will enter as a freshman in September.

Lakeland College is a fully-accredited, four-year, liberal arts school, affiliated with the United Church of Christ. Lakeland offers 20 majors and 17 minors. It offers the only Health Care Administration major in the state.

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masters. At a meeting held at the Jackson Post Office, the area postmasters also discussed recent changes in clerks' hour allotments and future postal actions.



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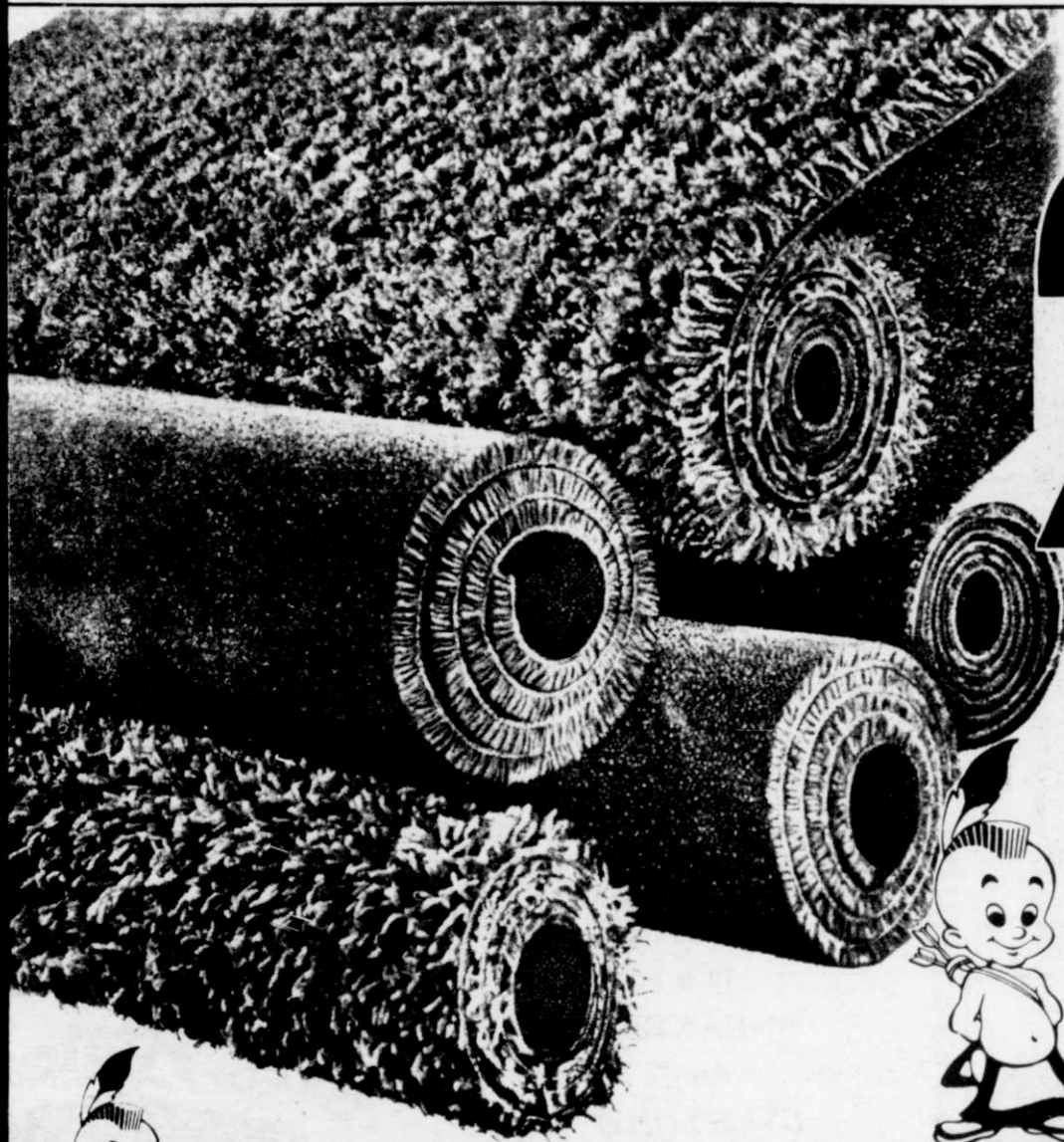

Red Cross Drive In Kewaskum Begins April 26

The West Bend Red Cross is conducting its March membership Drive in Kewaskum beginning April 26. A little late — due to the recent ice storm.

In West Bend, we do provide services to the serviceman on a 24 hour basis. Messages sent or received by members of the armed forces, go to a Red Cross field director stationed at all military bases all over the world. The Red Cross is the verifying agent, for the serviceman, for leaves, or what ever information is needed.

The ice storm is a good example of the needs during a disaster. Red Cross is known to provide immediate shelter, food, or clothing for all disasters, whether it be a one family fire or a community disaster.

The Red Cross is known for their safety programs—first aid, swimming, lifesaving, small craft safety and CPR or Cardiopulmonary resuscitation classes. Saving hu-

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SAFETY FIRST On Your NEW BIKE



1. Obey all traffic regulations, lights, stop signs, one-way streets.
2. Keep right. Ride single file. Don't weave in and out, swerve, race or stunt in traffic. Never hitch a ride on a truck or other vehicle.
3. For night riding be sure to have reflectorized pedals, a white light and white reflector in front and a red light or state-approved reflector in the rear. Have a clear sounding horn or bell to warn others of your approach.
4. Slow down at all intersections, look both ways, then proceed with caution.
5. Always give pedestrians the right of way.
6. Watch out for cars pulling into traffic or for doors opening.
7. Don't carry passengers or packages that interfere with your vision or control.
8. Always use proper hand signals for stopping and turning.

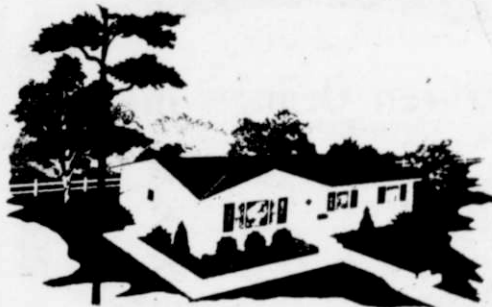

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Capuchins From Milwaukee, Kewaskum Open New Mission in Honduras

Two Capuchin priests who are native sons of Wisconsin have been assigned to a new mission territory in Honduras. They will serve the spiritual needs of fifteen thousand Miskito Indian people living in an area called Miskitia in Southeastern Honduras. The two priests are Father Donald Richardson, formerly of Milwaukee, and Father Ralph Fellenz, formerly of the Town of Farmington, near Kewaskum. Prior to their new assignment, Father Richardson had spent 15 years and Father Fellenz six years in the missions in eastern Nicaragua.

They will make their mission headquarters at the small town of Puerto Lempira which has a population of between 800 and 900 and is the governmental center of the area. From here they will

travel by truck, boat, on horseback and on foot to reach the sixty villages they will serve. They are the first priests to be assigned full time to serve the Miskito Indian people in Honduras. Prior to this, Capuchins stationed in Wasoam, Nicaragua crossed the border at infrequent intervals and reached as many of the people as they could in the space of a few days.

The Capuchins were asked by Bishop Jamie Brufau of the Diocese of San Pedro Sula, Nicaragua to open this mission because of their knowledge of the language and culture of the Miskito Indian people. Also, Amperio Bekham, the leading Catholic layman in the Miskitia area of Honduras had studied at Pius Tenth Seminary in Bluefields, Nicaragua and the

Catechetical School at Wasoam, Nicaragua both of which were established and are conducted by the Midwest Capuchin Province of St. Joseph.

According to Father Richardson, one of their first goals will be to train local

Christian leaders in each of the sixty villages. "The first task of course will be to get to know the people and with them to determine what their needs are," Father Richardson explained. "Then we will move into the area of having the people in each village elect the man they want as spiritual leader for their community. If things run true to form, they usually pick an older, married man whom they respect as a natural leader. Because many of the older people did not have the opportunity for even a minimum education, we will first have to provide alphabetization courses for many of those elected. Once they have gotten the basics of reading and writing, we can start putting on short courses in the villages to prepare them for their work as spiritual leaders or Delegates of the Word as they are known in some places in the States."

Father Fellenz explained that most of the Miskito Indians were farmers who eke their living out of a small plot of land on which they grow rice and beans as their staple crops for their own food supply and to sell of the harvest is good. For the most part, farming methods are still very primitive although the government is working on a number of human promotion programs which in time should improve this situation. There are now government schools in most of the villages staffed by teachers who studied under government grants and are required to work approximately five years in the villages following their graduation.

"Our big challenge is to get the native Miskito Church developed at least to the level that it is in Nicaragua," Father Richardson said. "Our job is to be animators and to develop the local church to the point where it can take care of itself but this will take time."

Father Richardson is the

son of Alex Richardson of 4051 North 60th St., Milwaukee and the late Frieda Richardson. He graduated from St. Elizabeth Grade School in 1945 and then attended St. Lawrence Seminary, Mt. Calvary. He joined the Midwest Capuchins in 1949 and was ordained in 1957.

Father Fellenz is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Fellenz of Route 1, Kewaskum. He was born and raised on a farm near Kewaskum and graduated from St. Michaels School in 1956 and then attended St. Francis Seminary, Milwaukee, from 1956 to 1961. He joined the Midwest Capuchins in 1961 and was ordained in 1968.

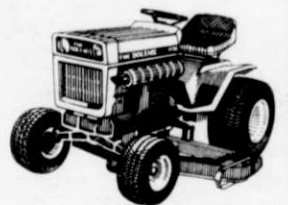

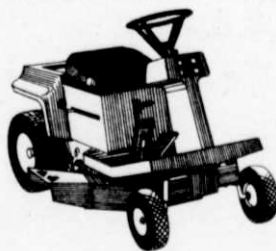
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Receives Ripon College Awards

MASTER CHARGE SALES RISE

Domestic sales volume was up and account delinquencies were down according to Interbank Card Association, which licenses Master Charge cards. The year end financial figures were recently made available.

The number of Master Charge cardholders rose 7.4% to slightly more than 37 million cardholders. The number of merchant outlets accepting the card rose to 1,264,271 in 1975 up from 1,190,511 in 1974. At year-end the number of banking offices involved totaled 19,896.

Gross sales volume rose to

\$11.3 billion in 1975, up 14.4% from the \$9.8 billion in 1974. Retail sales volume accounted for \$10.1 billion of the total, an increase of 16.7%.

Past due accounts of 60 days or more were 2.3% of outstandings, down from 2.9% of outstandings at year-end 1974. Interbank reported that this drop in delinquencies marked the lowest delinquency level since mid-

1973.

Outstanding balances on Master Charge accounts were \$5.42 billion at year-end. The average Master Charge sale during 1975 amounted to \$25.75, while the average outstanding balance for each cardholder amounted to \$365.72.

Survey Shows 9 of 10 Satisfied With Funeral Services

A nation-wide study shows that nine out of ten persons who have arranged a funeral in recent years were very satisfied with the way funeral directors served them.

That was the underlying conclusion in the survey's findings released recently in Milwaukee by Central Surveys, Inc., who conducted the opinion study during the last two months on the public's attitudes toward funeral directors.

The survey also found that:

- 95% felt the funeral director did a good job of explaining the charges for services, facilities and merchandise available.

- Most people feel that funeral directors' charges are "in line" rather than "high" or "low."

- 97% said the funeral director and his staff were helpful and considerate in all ways.

- Most people would call the same funeral director again.

- Only a very small minor-

ity had any unfavorable comments.

Respondents also agreed that funeral directors gave an adequate explanation of the services, facilities and merchandise they had available and 94% said the funeral director did not attempt to pressure them into undesired or unnecessary expenses, services, facilities or merchandise.

The survey results substantiate what funeral directors and funeral director associations, both state and national, have been saying since the Federal Trade Commission started its inquiry into funeral practices, that the

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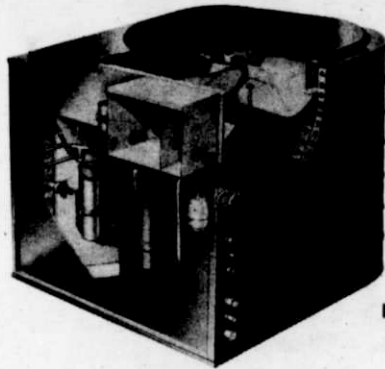
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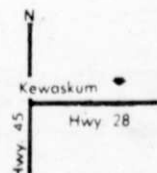
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
