School Board Officers Re-Elected: Name of School District Changed

Board of Education will remain the same for another year. The elections, held at the regular meeting Monday, returned Dr. Charles Ogi as president, Jim Oelhafen as clerk and Byron Gessner as treasurer.

As a result of a new state regulation, the official name of the district will become School District of Kewaskum as of July 1. This replaces the system in school districts which listed all municipalities in the official title. The local district, for example, was titled Jt. School District No. 2. Village of Kewaskum, and this was followed by a listing of all municipalities, counties, etc. The board decito accept the name

Part of the tax monies from the Town of Scott have not been forwarded to the school district. As of March 15, the municipalities were to have paid over to the school district a percentage of the school tax equal to the percentage of the total tax collected. The Town of Scott has forwarded a portion of the money due. but still is

Officers of the Kewaskum short about \$15,000 or \$16,-000 of what would normally be due. The board voted to have Byron Gessner, treasurer, send a letter of demand on the funds due.

The board adjourned to executive session to discuss negotiations, salaries and a student personnel question.

Larsen Outlines Summer Recreation Plans With Board

Tom Larsen, who is in charge of the village's summer recreation program, appeared before the Kewaskum Village Board to discuss this year's plans.

He reported that the program will begin on June 7 and end on August 9, a nine week period. The elementary school playground will be open on weekdays from 10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m., with the following activities available: organized games, arts and checkers. softball, field trips, etc.

The high school gym will be open for the use of persons age 16 or over, unless accompanied by a parent, to give them an opportunity to play basketball, lift weights, or play volleyball. It would be available from 6:30 to 8:00 p. m. on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Slowpitch softball will ain be conducted as in the past for both men and women ,with a \$40 entry fee per team for the men and \$30 for women's teams, plus \$5 for each player residing outside the school district. A girls league for female ballplayers age 11-18 is planned

and has 52 entrants so far. Swimming at the beach will open during the second or third week in June, with lifeguards tentatively on duty from 10 to 7 daily, and 12 - 7 on Sunday. Lessons are planned from 10 a.m. to 1 p. m. daily, for 3 to 4 weeks, so that two sessions can be

Dan Meilahn will again be the head lifeguard, assisted by Ellen Secor and two part time assistants. No lifeguards will be on duty during inclement weather.

Larsen also reported that the east bank of the river, which is away from the swimming area, is becoming increasingly dangerous because of "boulders slipping into the river." He urged the board to investigate the situation individually, to see what could be done.

The adult foster care com-mittee in Washington County is looking for families willing to house adults in need of assistance in hand-ling their affairs. These homes are for adults who are either physically or emotionally unable to run a home of their own, but are not in need of institutional care.

A family that accepts an adult in their home is called a host or "sponsor." A sponsor's responsibility depends mostly on their desire to become involved. Some sponsors wish to only provide room and board with mini-mum care. If that is the case, they would be matched with an adult who perhaps works during the day.

Compensation to the sponsor ranges from approximately \$180.00 per month to \$300.00 per month. Compensation is gauged on room board, and the amount of care that a sponsor must provide.

Ten people have already been placed through the program and this number could double, if the sponsors apply.

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TORNADO SAFETY RULES

KNOW THE WARNING TERMS

A TORNADO WATCH means weather conditions indicate tornadoes are expected to develop. Listen for further advisories, and stay alert for sudden strong wind, rain, hail, or a funnel-shaped cloud

A TORNADO WARNING means a tornado has actually been sighted or indicated on radar. Take shelter immediately.

PROTECTIVE ACTIONS

- At home, the basement usually offers the best shelter. Get under a sturdy workbench or table. In a home with no basement, take cover in the central part of the lowest floor in a bathroom, a closet, or under heavy furniture. Keep some windows open but stay away from them.
- In school, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with wide-span roofs.
- In office buildings, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor.
- In factories, go the the designated portion of the plant offering the greatest protection.
- In shopping centers, go to a designated shelter area, not to your parked car.
- If caught in open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or depression.
- Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds, and should be evacuated when strong winds are forecast. (Damage can be minimized by securing mobile homes with proper anchoring and tie-down gear.) If there is no shelter nearby, leave the mobile home area for low, protected ground.

In the event a tornado is sighted, the siren will be sounded at high pitch for three to five minutes.





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

The fightings farmers had won the war with England but freedom does not allow humanity to avoid responsibility. Freedom is one thing; anarchy is another. Fearful of exchanging one form of autocracy for another, the first rules for our self-government, the Articles of Confederation, were too weak to be the basis for any real and stable republic. And so, on May 25, 1787, delegates from the various states met to develop a constitution where liberty under the law could assure a future for America.

If any one person can be called "The Father of the Constitution," that person would be James Madison. Born at his grandmother's home in 1751, he came at a few weeks of age to "the farm which remained his home for eighty-five years." Well educated for that, or any other time, Madison went to the Philadelphia Convention with his homework done Why, he asked himself, had so many other attempts at governments where the people ruled ended in failure? The answer seemed very obvious to Madison. Even a tyranny with its oppression was preferable to governments too weak to govern. He went to the Convention convinced that a strong central government was absolutely necessa-

The farm boy from Virginia was 35 years old when the Philadelphia Convention began its work. A brilliant speech by Madison is called "the turning point in the history of democratic govern-ment." A writer of the time said that "Mr. Madison won the members to it (the new constitution) by his eloquence and his logic." But he was only one of the men, most of them farmers, to whom we owe the right to live in freedom under the law.

John Adams forebears set-tled at Mount Wollaston (later Braintree), Massachusetts, and for generations



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farmed the stony New England Soil, following the only occupation that he and his family had ever known. The Adams of Braintree sowed and plowed, maintained barn and fence, and attended church and town meetings. Like the yeoman farmers who lived all about them, they were honest, industrious and sober.

And these were typical attributes of the founding fathers, the ones who built the Framework For America. Yeoman farmers . . honest

industrious . . . sober . . the kind who could dream great dreams but had the solid practicality to turn these dreams into facts. We live today in a land that has seen the blessings of liberty for ourselves and our posterity only because of farmers like Monroe and Adams. Certainly we should remember them as we "Honor Our Heritage."

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Leaves of native and imported birch trees attacked by "birch leaf miners" turn brown and become dry from late spring to mid-summer. Careful examination will show that the leaves have been severely damaged by the larvae. The adults prefer to lay their eggs in young leaves, while the older foliage often remains free of dam-

There may be three or four generations of leaf miners a year. The larvae hatch in about a week and feed be-tween the upper and lower leaf surfaces, producing the characteristic blotches and blisters. Larvae go through their transformation 1 to 2 inches below the soil sur-

Controlling this pest is a problem. If you spray the soil around the tree with lindane you can probably control the leaf miners in the ground. But you can't possibly control all of them from over the neighborhood. Another method is to spray the entire tree at one-week intervals for three applications beginning in early May, using 1 tablespoon 25% malathion or lindane WP per gallon of water.

Spray when the leaves are expanded and small blisters are just beginning to be noticeable. Repeat in early July for the second generation, and again in the fall.

The alternative is to ignore it. While this may be a little unsightly, actually the tree will not be harmed unless it is completely defoliated.
