Board Approves \$15,900 Firefighting Two KHS Girls Contract for Town of Kewaskum

A \$15,900 firefighting contract was approved between the Town and the Village of Kewaskum by the Kewaskum Village board on Monday.

The contract, which expires in December, is \$2,600 more than the one covering 1975. This cost covers 15 fires, after which an individual charge per fire is made. A firefighting agreement also exists with portions of the Town of Auburn, which does not expire until July 1.

Fire Chief August Bilgo examined the contract and found it to be identical to last year's except for the cost increase, which was caused by a rise in the increased valuation of the property in the township. The money received from these contracts goes into a fund which is used to help defray the cost of the new firehouse and fire en-gine purchased by the fire department.

The release of \$9,600 belonging to Ideal Land, Inc. which the village is holding in order to guarantee the work that they did in the Ideal Subdivision was proper, was tabled. A meeting between the subdividers and representatives of the village was scheduled for next week to settle the matter.

Both parties disagree on whether or not any village approval was ever granted, with the subdividers claiming that it must have been, or else building permits could not have been issued. Superintendant of Public Works August Bilgo was reported to be dissatisfied with the work that was done in the subdivision.

An anticipated \$17,000 in revenue sharing funds for next year were planned for use in the areas of public protection and recreation, as was done in the past. Ten thousand dollars will be budgeted in the area of public safety, with the remainder going to fund the summer recreation program.

The hiring of Ruben Oppermann as part time patrolman as requested by Chief Donald Hlavaty at a salary of \$3.50 per hour was also approved.

The board will hold its next meeting on Wednesday. May 19, so that they can attend a meeting of the League of Wisconsin Municipalities meeting on May 17, their regular meeting date.

Many scholarships are awarded each year by Kewaskum clubs, organizations and industries.



MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

Bi-Monthly Meeting April 19, 1976-8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in bi-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Miller presided and all Board Members were

The minutes of the meeting of April 5, 1976 were approved as printed. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous

Thomas Larsen outlined for the Board his proposed schedule for a summer recreation program which is to begin about June 7, 1976.

Representatives of Ideal Land, Inc. were again present to request release of their subdivision development deposit. The Board went on record not to release the funds until the Commissioner has checked with the Village's Engineering Consultant whether or not the installation of the required facilities had received final approval.
