Final Action Is Taken on Added Staff Members at Board Meeting

Final action came on the question of added staff members at the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting held Monday evening. The discussion of staffing has been on the meeting agendas for the last two months, and the board decided not to add the last two positions under discussion. On a vote of four to three the proposal for a pre-kindergarten special education program was denied, and on a four to two vote, the added position for a teacher of science and social studies at the Middle School was turned down.

In the overall staffing for next year, the board has added two intern positions at the high school, one in math and one in agriculture. Two special education positions were added, both at the Middle School-High School levels. Because of enrollment changes, one full-time kindergarten position was eliminated for next year, as well as one elementary teaching position in the Kewaskum Elementary School. These discussions and actions have taken place over the last few meetings.

The remainder of the items on the agenda went very quickly. The board approved two contracts for teachers. A contract for Roy Peterson was approved in mathematics. This position was opened when Mrs. Hanselman retired. He will also have behind-the-wheel driver education as an added assignment. Mr. Peterson has three years of teaching experience at Assumption High School in Wisconsin Rapids, and at Guttenberg, Iowa. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin - LaCrosse.

Allen Tessar volunteered to act again as the local correspondent with the Wisconsin Association of School Boards. Allen Tessar, Dr. Ogi and Tom Gundrum will be on the budget committee.

No action was taken to have a Middle School graduation. There has not been one for a number of years. Ken Erickson reported that there will be an honors program and concert for students the last afternoon of school. Parents are invited to attend.

Continuation of student representation on the board for next year was approved unanimously. The program, begun this year, was felt to have been a very beneficial one.

The board approved hiring Van Der Jagt, Buss and Associates to do the school audit again this year.

Notification of intent to construct two ponds on the school property will be published. No decision will be made on this construction until the budget is considered. However, since this project requires a notice and then a wait of 30 days, it was decided to publish now even though the final decision on building the ponds will not be made until later.

The board adjourned to closed session to discuss salaries, negotiations and a personnel question.

Youths Seized Following Chase

Two Illinois juveniles were being held in the custody of Washington County authorities Monday after being involved in a high-speed chase that occurred Sunday night along U.S. 45 between Kewaskum and West Bend.

At 9:42 p. m. the Kewaskum Police Department notified sheriff's deputies of a speeding car that had been clocked at one point at 95 mph.

A 17-year-old sailor stationed at Great Lakes, Ill. and another 15-year-old boy eluded roadblocks by driving into ditches and by playing "chicken" with squad cars blocking the road.

The youths turned into a parking lot near the Ace Motel on the north end of West Bend to avoid a blockade and struck a Sheriff's Department squad car, causing about \$800 damages, before continuing on over several lawns to reach Fairview Dr. They then doubled back to Kewaskum along Hwy. 45.

The boys abandoned the car when they ran out of gas near the intersection of County H, south of Kewaskum. The youths took off on foot and according to authorities were tracked by the Sheriff's Dept. bloodhound, "Mannix," but they apparently had hitched a ride into West Bend.

The pair was later apprehended by West Bend city police and turned over to the Sheriff's Dept.

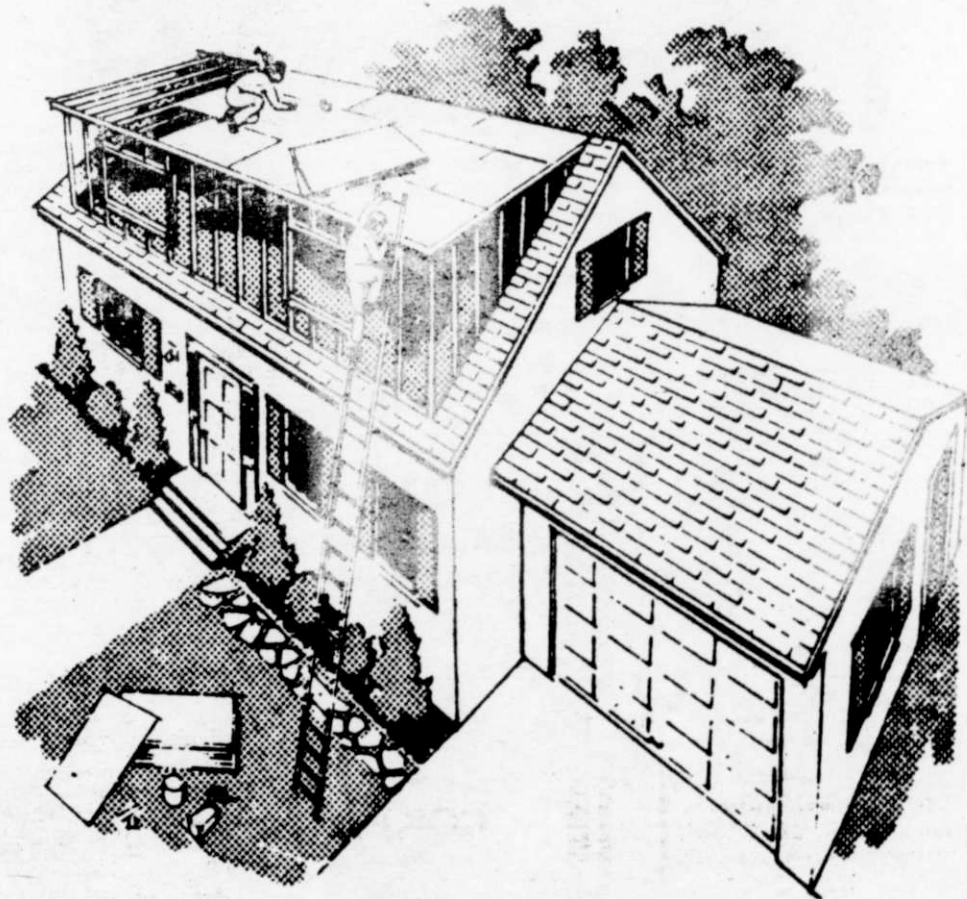

The meeting was adjourned at 11:20 p. m., with the thought that the 1976-77 club year will be arriving in only four short months, with new horizons to conquer!



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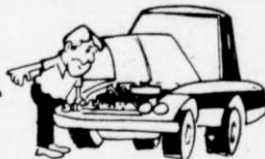

Jan Koch Receives Bicentennial Award

The United States Postal Service Employee Bicentennial Award was awarded to Mrs. Jan Koch of 510 Keller St. last week.

The award was presented to her by Donald Brocher, District Director of Employee and Labor Relations in a ceremony held at the post office last Wednesday. At that time, she also received a special letter of commendation from the regional postmaster general, citing her involvement in Bicentennial activities.

Only four such awards were made in Southeastern Wisconsin, which has over 6,000 postal employees. She is a clerk at the Kewaskum Post Office, and her husband Harry is postmaster. They have two daughters, one married and one at home. Her main leisure time activity is golfing.

Her Bicentennial work began in 1970, when she became Bicentennial chairman of the Joseph Marest chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She later became secretary of the Washington County Bicentennial Committee, as well as a member of the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee. Last year she also served on the board of directors of the Kewaskum Historical Society, and is presently still a member.

Upon receiving the award, she commented, "This is truly very nice and I thank you; it is doubly nice to be recognized for something I enjoy doing. Back in 1970, I would talk about the Bicentennial, and people would say Bi-what?"

"This honor will always be a reminder to me of our country's 200th birthday, and of the fine people I have worked with that gave their time and talents, and of the patience and understanding of my family and friends."

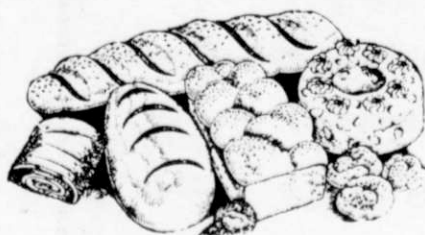

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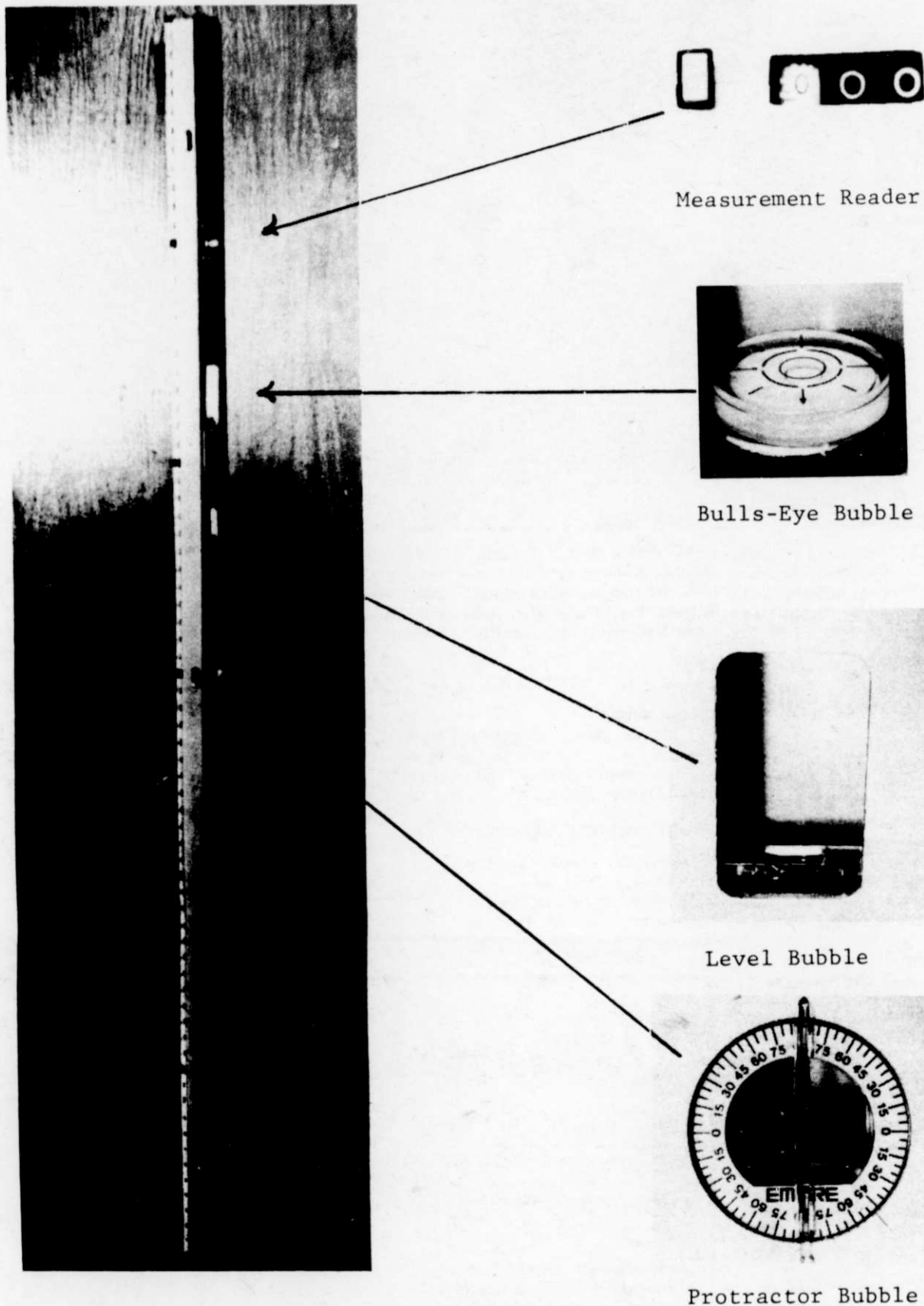

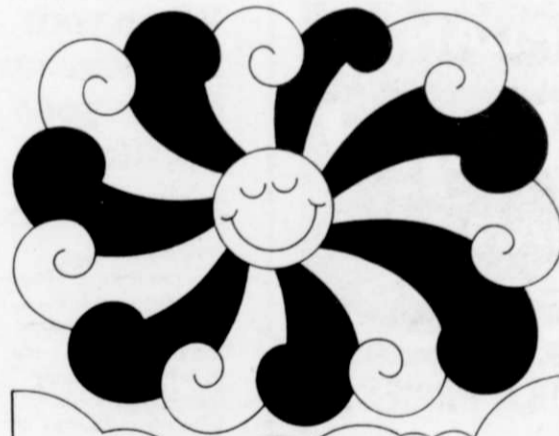

There are 11 teams in the Monday Night League. After the second week of shooting Bunkelman's and Dundee Sand & Gravel were tied for first place with 2-0 marks.

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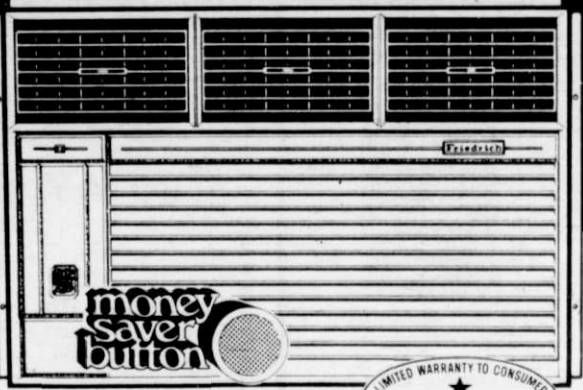
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
