### Grand Opening of Kewaskum Museum Is Largely Attended

(Due to a film development problem, we were unable to publish the museum opening photos this week).

"I'm very happy about the whole thing. The attendance has been great," commented Dan Schmidt, president of the Kewaskum Historical Society, following the grand opening of the society's museum, located at 1202 Parkview Drive, on Saturday.

Following a speech by president Schmidt, "Mayor" Charles Miller added a few words of his own and then cut the ribbon officially opening the museum at 10 a.m. In addition to the society's members, about 75 people were on hand for the ceremony, including Jan Koch, representing the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee, and Margaret Hawig, representing the Washington County Historical Society.

Speaking for County Bicentennial Committee Chairman Gilbert Sauer, Mrs. Koch offered her congratulations on a job well done, and praised all the "marvelous donors" which helped make the museum complete. She also advised the society that it would receive a certificate of recognition for its work.

About 325 people visited

with woodburning stove and crank telephone, and a bedroom which has a rope bed, donated by Jim Paul, a handmade quilt, and an old wedding dress and tuxedo.

The general store has many smaller items in it, including an old fashioned set of scales. In it, visitors can purchase the society's two membership buttons, the book on Kewaskum's history, and toys being sold by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee. In addition, the museum even has an outdoor privy, donated by Merv Thompson. There is also a firehouse display which can boast of having Kewaskum's first piece of fire equipment, an 1884 Remmel hand pumper on loan from the Kewaskum Fire Department.

The downstairs contains a farm display, which includes some plows, hand tools, and even a still, donated by the Ron Markus family.

Some of the other major items on display include a rolltop desk provided by the village, a loom donated by Mrs. "Chesty" Ramthun that is owned by Otto Backus, a fanning mill and miscellaneous tools provided by Syl Kedinger, a "Never Tip Bobsled" provided by Weasler Manufacturing, and some cabinetmaking tools provided by Miller's of Kewaskum. 




### Local Scouts Highlight Activities
