School Board Discusses Property Transfer, OK's Teacher Contracts

The Kewaskum Board of Education met briefly Saturday morning to discuss an upcoming hearing on a property transfer and to approve some individual teacher contracts.

The property transfer involved a request to change a 160 acre parcel from Plymouth to the Kewaskum district. The board position was three-fold: 1) Kewaskum will accept the decision of the Agency School Committees, 2) Kewaskum does not wish to get involved with appeals or any other action in the matter and, 3) Kewaskum is not looking to add any territory from other districts.

In other action, the board approved four teacher con-

tracts. Robert Getter, was approved to take the position open in music with Clyde Brehm's resignation. Getter is a graduate of Whitewater and has two years of teaching experience at Hustisford. SIGN UP JUNE 12 FOR SWIM LESSONS

The official opening of the Kewaskum beach will be slightly delayed this year. Guards and equipment will not be present at the beach until further notice is given in the Kewaskum Statesman, West Bend News and over WBKV. Parents are strongly urged not to allow their children, especially young non-swimmers, to visit the beach until the lifeguards are on daily duty.

The orientation meeting for swim students on June 14 has been postponed. However, there will be registration for swim lessons on Saturday, June 12, at the Kewaskum Municipal Building on First Street from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. The tentative

schedule of classes is: 10:00, 10:30, 11:00 and 11:30 a. m.beginners; 12:00 noon - advanced beginners; 12:30 p. m. intermediates and swimmers combined.

Classes for lifesaving or adult beginners will be arranged when and if there is sufficient interest. All lessons will be conducted Monday thru Friday in 2 sessions of 3 or 4 weeks each.

A fee of \$1.00 for village residents and \$2.00 for nonresidents is payable at the time of registration. This will cover both sessions.





Jr. Woman's Club Wins \$100 Prize

The Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club won a \$100 third prize among Wisconsin clubs which from 1974-1976 did the most to improve the environment of their communities.

Wisconsin winners in the General Federation of Women's Clubs-Shell Oil Company Environmental Conservation Program were announced at the convention of the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs meeting at Madison May 12.

The awards were presented by Larry Cahill, Shell's Chicago North Commercial Marketing District Manager. Shell and the GFWC present five awards totaling \$1,300 in each state and the District of Columbia except Hawaii to encourage women to work for improvement of community environment.

First place and \$400 in the Wisconsin contest went to the Cedarburg Junior Women's Club who also received a special youth involvement award of \$300. Second place and \$200-was awarded to the Whitewater Junior Woman's Club.

The Cedarburg Junior Women's Club now will compete with first place winners from other states for national prizes of \$2,000, \$1,000 and They are also with other youth involvement winners for national prizes of \$1,000 and \$500. These awards will be announced June 15, at the GFWC national convention in Philadelphia, Pa., Cahill explained.

Carrie Kempf First in State in Record Time

Kewaskum's Carrie Kempf, small in stature but a giant on the track field, brought home the first individual state championship for the local school in the 100 yard dash in the Class B state track meet at Madison Saturday. And in doing so she also broke an existing state record.

The old record of 11.68 was set in 1974. Carrie had broken it in trials with 11.5 and in the state meet she hit the tape in 11.4, just .1 of a second faster than Jenny Lind of Weyauwega, and yards ahead of the rest of the field. This is quite an accomplishment, even though girls' competition in track is still comparatively new.

Kempf also barely missed a double win in the 220 by inches as she was nipped by Lind in a photo finish. Both were given 25.5 clockings with Carrie's having a plus

behind it. The 220 was also a state record, the old one of 25.89 being set by Jane Ubbelohde of Unity in 1974.

And that's not all. Carrie had placed 5th in the long jump Friday with a 16-81/4 (which was below her 17foot leaps in the conference meet and the Regional). All by herself she earned 20 points which was good enough to put Kewaskum in 6th place in the team competition. Finishing ahead of Kewaskum were Prairie du Chien 64, New Holstein 28, Waterford 24, Lake Mills 23 and Tomahawk 22.

Kempf, only a junior, has been to state three years, having been on relay teams her freshmen and sophomore years, and in the 100 as a Both these teams took second, and she was second last year in the 100. This year she brought home a title for her coach, a happy Connie Von Schovek.

Kewaskum's two male qualifiers to the state also placed high. Dennis Bremser's 1:59.5 took third in the 880. He lunged at the tape and fell to the track to take third. Bremser, a senior, will be missed as in some meets this year he won or placed high in four events.

Keith Mueller took fourth in the shotput on Friday with a heave of 50-2. Mueller, also a senior, got off his best effort on his last try. He had won the Scenic shot title as well as the Washington County Outdoor. This was the second straight year Kewaskum had a shot putter place in state. In 1975, Mike Koepke took third.



The Threshold now serves 31 children in its pre-school and 125 adults over age 18. In addition, a special 6 week summer recreation program for school aged handicapped children is provided.

In 1975, 24 residents from the Kewaskum vicinity received direct services.

For adults, job training services include: work and vocational evaluation, on going counselor services, job training in service, occupations, production and machine type jobs.

Competitive job placement Since that time numerous into industries is one of bee added, modifications of Another is to provide a sheldaily ongoing work activities and enrichment programs for those who are unable to obtain gainful employment.

Driver Education training is available for those having potential for this program.

Sheltered work plus instruction is available in: Basic Living Skills, Recreation, Speech Therapy, Ceramics, Arts & Crafts, Gardening and Basic Education.

All adult trainees and clients are bussed daily if needed from anywhere in Washington County. At present 4 vans and a 32 passenger bus are in use.

Another service provided to the community is that of obtaining industrial sub-conwork from county tract firms. This service to firms enables them to meet last minute production rushes and other delays of normal operation.

It enables trainees to earn as they learn and help in their personal daily self sufficiency

The Threshold likewise be-

nefits, for sub-contract income enables them to be more self-supportive and reliant. Hence, they do not have to rely on as much public funding through the CCSA and the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation of Wisconsin.

Twenty percent of their operational expenses are deferred from sub-contract income, seventy percent from local and state funding sources and five percent from community contributions such as United Fund, Kiwan-Club of West Bend and individual donations from private citizens and service clubs.
