Proposed School Budget Up

A petition asking for two kindergarten sections at Farmington was presented to the Kewaskum Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening. The petition resulted from an earlier board decision to reduce from two to one the number of kindergarten classes at Farmington next year. The board took this action because of a projection of an enrollment drop from 49 to about 28 for next fall.

In discussion, it was indicated that the budget is very tight for next year. The projected budget is at the state-imposed spending limits. Additions in one area would require deletions in some other category. The board did not change its previous action but indicated they would

review the kindergarten situation later in the summer when enrollments are somewhat more final.

Resignations from Paul Redig, agriculture teacher, Jeanne Urban, Middle School physical education and health teacher, and Dan Miller, teacher at Beechwood were accepted.

The proposed 1976-77 budget was reviewed for action at later meetings. The budget as proposed estimates a tax rate of 13.29 mills. This compares with 13.127 mills for the current year. The levy would be \$1,911,192 compared to \$1,685,728.99 this year.

A decision was made not to begin data processing for payroll next year. This had been discussed earlier, but it appeared there would be no savings in expenditures nor any improvement in accounting.

Another meeting was scheduled for Monday, June 21 at 8 p. m. in the administrative offices. The board adjourned to executive session to discuss wages and salaries and a personnel question.

At its annual meeting held on May 20, the Medical Staff of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, re-elected all officers for the coming year (June through May).

They are: Dr. W. A. Nielsen, president; Dr. C. V. Sison, Kewaskum, vice-president; and Dr. R. E. Zellmer, secretary - treasurer.

According to the hospital bylaws, the president of the Medical Staff is, by virtue of his position, a voting member of the Hospital Board of Directors.

The executive committee of the Medical Staff is composed of six members—the officers and three other members elected from the active staff.

Re-elected to another three-year term on the executive committee was Dr. R. D. Gibson. The other two members who still have a part of their three-year terms remaining are Dr. A. T. Grun-jahl and Dr. C. S. Geiger. The administrator of the hospital, Fred Bury, is an ex-officio member.

The duties of the executive committee are to coordinate the activities and general policies of the various clinical services and to act upon reports of all other committees of the Medical Staff.

Brehm Gives Last Concert

The final musical event for the school year at the Kewaskum Middle School took place on Wednesday, June 2, in the High School Gymnasium. It was an excellent concert featuring the Middle School Band and the Sixth Grade Beginners from Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne. This concert was not the last one that these many fine and talented musicians will participate in, but it was the last one under the baton of Clyde Brehm. After seventeen years of outstanding musical leadership in the Kewaskum School System he is leaving for a position outside of the education field. As a former student put it when he addressed the audience Wednesday night, "Mr. Brehm will long be remembered for his musical contributions to the school and community."

A reception was held after the concert which was sponsored by many former and present students of Mr. Brehm. Gifts were given to him from alumni, students and friends in the school system.

To Clyde Brehm, the schools and communities of the Kewaskum District would like to say good luck to you in your new undertaking, and thanks for all that you have done for the youth of the Kewaskum Schools.

Campbellsport Youth Killed In Car Crash

William Strassburg 16, of R. 3, Campbellsport, was killed early Wednesday, June 16, when his car left Fond du Lac County Trunk B east of Eden and struck a culvert. Strassburg, alone in the car, was dead at the scene.

He died of massive injuries sustained in the crash. Police said the vehicle left the road on a curve 880 feet east of County Trunk H, struck a culvert and flipped end over end.

Strassburg was a star athlete at Campbellsport High School, where he would have been a senior in the fall.

His father, Ralph, is employed as a general foreman at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum.

Dombrowski Makes Escape

Chester Dombrowski, a former Chicago police officer convicted in Wisconsin in 1967 of first degree murder, walked away from his guard at Berlin, Wis. last Wednesday evening and escaped.

The policeman was arrested following a car accident along U.S. 45 north of Kewaskum. A subsequent search of his car resulted in his conviction on the murder charge and was at issue in a court case that went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Dombrowski, 39, was taking an emergency medical technician's course at Berlin Hospital when he told his guard he had to go to the bathroom. He failed to return.

Dombrowski has been an inmate at the Fox Lake Correctional Institution since 1974. He had been at Waupun State Prison following his 1967 conviction in the death of Herbert McKinney, 27, also of Chicago, who was killed elsewhere and his body was found on a farm owned by his brother just north of the Washington-Fond du Lac county line near Kewaskum.



Honor 4 Retiring Teachers

Four Kewaskum teachers, who announced their retirement from long educational careers at the end of the school year, were honored Friday, May 28, at the Camelot Country Club by the Kewaskum Educational Association.

The four retirees, who together have taught close to a total of a century in the Kewaskum area are Mrs. Esther Hanselman, a teacher at Kewaskum High School, Mrs. Signe Loberger, Mrs. Angela DeWitt, and Mrs. LaVerne Hron of the Kewaskum Elementary School.

Mrs. Hanselman, a graduate of Oshkosh University, has taught general math, consumer math, algebra and geometry at Kewaskum High School for 20 years. She was also the advisor for the Future Teachers of America group of Kewaskum, helped coach forensics and served on the steering committee for the North Central evaluation at school.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanselman, who have raised three children, plan on making Eagle River their permanent home where they have operated a summer resort since 1949.

Mrs. Loberger, who lives with her son in West Bend, taught in Michigan before coming to the Kewaskum area. She taught before she was married and did substitute work while she and her husband, who passed away a few years ago, raised their six children.

She received her degree from Oshkosh University in 1970 by going to school nights and during summers after her children reached school age. She has taught at Beechwood and Kewaskum for a total of 11 years. She has taught second grade in Kewaskum the past few years.

Mrs. DeWitt, who was graduated from Wood County Normal School and Stevens Point University, is ending a 37 year career. She taught in Adams and Wood counties before spending 18 years teaching in Kewaskum. She was the third grade teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School.

Mrs. DeWitt, who has two children, will remain living in West Bend, where she has made many plans for her retirement.

Mrs. Hron, has taught 46 years altogether. Thirty-nine of those years were spent teaching in the Kewaskum District.

She was graduated from Random Lake High School and Milwaukee State Teachers College. She attended ma-

ny classes evenings and during the summer.

She first taught in the Campbell School, then Cheeseyville School and Plat Grade School before coming to Kewaskum.

Mrs. Hron has been a member of Delta Gamma, an honorary teaching fraternity. She has also been associated with the International Reading Association since its beginning, the Wisconsin Reading Council and the Washington - O-zaukee Reading Council.
