### Village Park, Swimming Area Praised by Official; Water Safe

The Kewaskum Village Park along the Milwaukee River and the swimming area there were praised last week by a representative of the Division of Health and Social Services.

Don Nelson, of their West Allis office, was here to take water samples at the river, and was joined there by trustee Gregor Nigh. After taking his samples, he complimented the people of Kewaskum for their "fine facility," noting that it was better than many other community parks he had seen. The test results later showed a coliform count of 80 in one place and 90 at the other,

which is very low. The coliform test is a measure of the concentration of certain bacteria in water that could pose a health problem if found in high concentrations.

Village residents should be reminded that no instructions were ever issued from Madison to close down the beach area to swimmers. The delay in opening the beach was caused by local authorities, who wanted to make sure that higher bacterial counts that had been taken earlier would be of no danger to swimmers. Even a high count would only be harmful if the bacteria came from sewage or human waste, and not animal waste.

### Beach Opens; Rules Listed

Beach has officially opened, after some delay, as of Monday, June 21. Supervised swimming hours are from 10 a. m. to 8 p. m. weekdays and Saturdays. Sunday hours are from 12 noon to 8 p. m. A "Beach Closed" sign will be displayed in the lift station window whenever lifeguards are not present.

Swim lessons, ranging from beginners to swimmers are presently being conducted weekdays from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. in two sessions of three weeks each. The first session began June 21. Notice of any daily cancellation of lessons due to bad weather will be given over West Bend radio WBKV 1470 on the dial Classes for lifesaving or adult beginners will be arranged when and if there is sufficient interest.

The personnel at the beach includes: Ellen Secor (head swimming instructor), Dan Meilahn (head guard), Dale Secor (assistant swimming instructor), Doug Acker and Jim Backhaus (guards).

Due to the sleet storm, swimmers should be alert to branches and debris which may be in the swimming area. The rocks on the east bank are gradually slipping into the river. Swimmers must use extra caution in entering or leaving the water. Before diving it may be necessary to personally inspect the bottom for rocks. Very young children should stay away from the east bank.

Parents are urged to remind their children of the rules, which must be obeyed:

- 1. Rocks, mud, sand or other objects must never be thrown in or near the beach or swimming area.
- 2. Floating devices and swimming aids (innertubes, inflatable rafts, large beach balls, or "life preservers") are not permitted in the wa-

The Kewaskum Village ter as such devices can carry a non-swimmer to water of dangerous depth where he may become separated from such device.

> 3. Glass and metal objects (bottles, toys, small metal shovels, etc.) are not allowed on the beach. Soft plastic pails are acceptable but must never be thrown.

> 4. Pushing, shoving, and horseplay is not permitted on either raft or pier due to the possibility of injury. Running on the pier is prohibited as it is dangerous to yourself and others, especially when it is wet and slippery. Swimming is never allowed under the raft or pier, because if someone bumps their head or injures themself he may not be spotted in due time. Going down the slide in a standing position is not allowed. This is extremely dangerous.

5. Any anti-social actions will not be tolerated. This means no physical or verbal abuse, excessive teasing, or badgering of one individual (Continued on page 2)

by another. The beach is a place to have fun and no one should have to fear bullying by others.

6. Bikes are to be parked well away from the beach area, preferably in the available bike rack. Bicycles are never to be ridden on the beach, and certainly not into the water. Pets, such as dogs, are to be kept away from the beach and never taken into the water. During crowded conditions, a dunked dog may react instinctively and become vicious. Food should not be brought onto the beach or into the water. Picnic facilities are available elsewhere in the park.

7. Anyone under 6 years of age must be accompanied by a responsible adult. Also, guards cannot be requested to watch over any specific individuals. This is not a baby sitting service. The guard stand is for guards ONLY. It is neither a seat for others nor a depository for miscellaneous items, as children's watches, radios, towels, etc. Guards are for your protection. Their orders and judgments should be heeded at all times. If a guard deems someone's behavior irresponsible or dangerous, the offender will be ordered to leave the beach area for a designated period.

8. Litter has become somewhat of a problem. Parents should instruct their children to use the trash barrels for depositing any paper wrappers, bottles, or cans.



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9. The matter of jumping and diving off the dam is a critical one. This is extremely hazardous and foolhardy. Above the dam, tree limbs and other jagged objects can collect and may not be seen by a jumper. Below the dam, there are deep holes and swifter currents which pose threats to novice swimmers. Also, there is a concrete ledge which can be struck by jumping or diving. The greatest hazard is that the antics of older children attract younger inexperienced swimmers to the dam area where an accident may occur. Again this year no one will be allowed to jump or dive off the dam. Guards will discourage these actions and the police will cooperate to enforce this

rule.

10. Fishing is not allowed in the swimming area when any swimmers are present and is not recommended during any swimming hours. Ob-

viously motorized boats are not to be operated in the swimming area and all other boats or canoes are to be launched and landed outside the beach area.

Regular Meeting June 7, 1976 8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.
