Fireworks in Park Saturday, July 3 Plus Women's Water Fights - Log Rolling - Bucket Brigade

The customary spectacular Fourth of July holiday fireworks display, sponsored annually by the Village of Kewaskum under the supervision of the fire department, will be held in the village park on Saturday night, July 3. The fireworks will be set off at dusk.

As a special bicentennial year feature the firemen have planned three special events this year starting at 6:30 p. m. There will be women's water fights, a men's log rolling exhibition and a bucket brigade exhibition. With the 3rd falling on a Saturday, the food and refreshment

stands will be in operation earlier this year, starting at 5 p. m.

Some new displays have been purchased this year, which are sure to make the fireworks bigger and better than ever. There will be the usual animated fireworks, including thunderous aerial bombs and sprays, and a variety of beautiful and colorful ground displays.

The fireworks will again be touched off on the west side of the river, providing an excellent view for spectators from the park hill on the other side of the river and other vantage points.

Music and other entertainment will be provided in the park proper before and after the fireworks. A game and refreshment stands will be open starting at 5 p. m. Hamburgers, popcorn, beer and soda will be available.

The firemen invite residents of Kewaskum and surrounding community to add to their holiday enjoyment by attending the fireworks and having a good time. . Come early and spend the evening.

In the event of rain, the fireworks will be held Sunday, July 4.

Proposed Budget, Increase in Bus Rate Approved by School Board

day evening, June 28, at the meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education to a budget to be proposed to the annual meeting. The board considered a number of possible budget changes at the meeting. The major change was a reduction of \$10,000 from money which had been placed in the budget for blacktop-

There were a number of other items discussed Mr. Ammel was present to discuss the proposed purchase of band uniforms. While no final decision was made, funds for half the uniforms were left in the budget figures. This figure is \$7,500, about half the total cost. Other possible ways of helping to pay for the uniforms were dis-cussed. Two proposed were fund raising activities sponsored by parents and students and charging rental fees for the uniforms. Objections were raised to both, but further investigation will be made into these possible alternatives.

Approval was given Mon- front doors at the high school. The money to replace was left in the budget but the possibility of repairing rather than replacing them will be investigated.

All budget changes recommended and accepted or initiated by the board resulted in an increase of \$1,300 to income through athletic ticket price raises. Increases in expenditures amount to \$5,000, \$2,000 of this being carryover from last year. Cuts amounted to \$17,698 from the budget. These amounts came primarily in the blacktopping and in capital outlay.

In other business, the board heard a request from Mr. and Mrs. George Eggert to purchase a strip of land south of the high school parking area. While owned by the schools, it abuts the back yard of the Eggert property. The board indicated they would meet at the site at the beginning of their meeting on July 12 to become more familiar with the situation.

A transportation contract with Johnson Bus was approved for 1976-77. The ov-

The Potawatomi Indians with their Chief Kewaskum were very much a part of Kewaskum's history so consequently Indians will be featured. The old "out house" is an ever present reminder of the past and the Kewaskum firemen will provide an interesting "touch" to this piece of history.

erall rate increase will amount to about 5.6%. Primary routes will increase from \$16.00 to \$16.90 per trip, with dovetail routes (second trip by the same bus morning or evening) will go from \$10.40 to \$11.00. Kindergarten routes will increase from \$12.00 to \$12.60, and late busses from \$13.00 to \$13.75.

The agenda for the annual meeting was approved. A request to hold a personal property auction in the high school gymnasium received no final action. The board indicated its preference not to allow this, but would give it further consideration if there were no alternate sites available.

A request by David Vande Vrede to be represented by the KEA was not approved. A letter from the board attorney indicated the board did not have to voluntarily approve a request for this representation.

The board adjourned to executive session to discuss salaries and wages.

Budgeting for 1976-77 was the topic of discussion at the special meeting held June 21, by the Kewaskum Board of Education. The board reviewed the proposed budget for next year, and settled on an athletic program to be included in the budget.

It was tentatively decided to add a freshman girls' basketball program, to add girls' gymnastics and to add girls' tennis. This will bring the Kewaskum athletic programs for boys and girls to equal status. There will be seven activities in which each may participate. With higher charges of ticket prices for the various events, the net district added cost will be approximately \$1700.

Other items discussed included a request for new band uniforms. The total cost would be \$15,000, with half budgeted for this year and half next. The possibility of doing only half of some \$17,000 blacktopping was also mentioned. A few other minor items in capital outlay and maintenance were also questioned.

The question of an added kindergarten section Farmington was raised again when a resolution was presented asking the board to hold two sessions at Farmington rather than the one planned. The question was not acted on since kindergarten enrollments are still somewhat uncertain. The number possible is increasing as parents enroll their children, but it is not known how many children who meet the age requirements will be withheld for another year. 




"Minute Man at Lexington," by Henry Hudson Kitson, marks the sight of the first shot of the Revolutionary War in Lexington, Mass.

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
