Those who did not attend the Bicentennial Pageant held last Thursday at the Kewaskum High School auditorium missed a fine production put on by the Kewaskum Junior and Senior Women's Clubs.

The pageant showed some scenes out of Kewaskum's past as they actually may have happened, using dialog and still life scenes to help bring their message across to the audience. Following an opening address by Village President Charles Miller, the program was narrated by Gary Gerhartz, a music teacher at the elementary school.

Caution Urged at Beach

Due to certain incidents and the possibility of future accidents around the rocks on the east bank of the swimming area, parents and children are once again advised that extreme caution should be used when entering or exiting the water. Diving and running dives by younger children, novice swimmers, or by those less coordinated will be discouraged by guards. The practice of diving

off certain "diving rocks" is presently still allowed, but may have to be discontinued if children are not more careful. Prospective divers should check with the guards as to the proper place to dive the bottom is periodically checked for large stones and should avoid long running dives.

In general, swimmers are to be commended for avoiding the dam area and for not

ming activities near the dam. This is dangerous for anyone at any age and especially for younger inexperienced swimmers. Guards will discourage these actions and offenders will be expelled from the beach area for a period of at least 1 week.

Milk, Teacher Contracts OK'd By School Board

The Kewaskum Board of Education ran through a routine meeting Monday evening, and agreed to meet again following the Annual Meeting on July 36.

Discussion of the request by George Eggert to purchase a small strip of land from the district was tabled pending further information. The approval of administrator contracts for principals was delayed until the July 26 meeting when Byron Gessner and Rich Theusch indicated they wished to review a couple of questions in closed session.

Milk and oil bids were opened. John Engelhardt was awarded the milk contract with a bid of 8.99c per carton. The cost will go up .05c per carton with every 10c per hundred weight increase in milk prices. Small increases are also included in carton prices or wage inover a certain amount. The only other bid came from Cedarburg Dairy. The quote was 9.6c per carton with an escalator formula of .03c per carton for every 5c per hundred weight increase in the cost of milk.

Fuel oil bids were opened but were not acted on pending the receipt of further information.

Two teacher contracts were approved. A contract was approved for Alan Gatzke for the position at Beechwood, replacing Dan Miller. Gatzke is a beginning teacher, and graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Gail Filzen graduated from University of Wisconsin - LaCrosse, and will teach physical education and health at the Middle School. She resides in West Bend and has done substitute teaching in Kewaskum.

The board adjourned to closed session just before 9 p. m. to discuss administrator salaries and salaries of other professional personnel.

Two Kewaskum Residents Race With Olympians

Harold H. Schneider, 8340 Prospect Rd., and Robert B. Secor, 1856 Scenic Dr., Kewaskum, were among 551 runners in the 10,000 meter run sponsored in Milwaukee on July 4 by the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co., Milwaukee.

Schneider placed 260th in the men's open classification, while Secor placed 72nd in the boys' 17 and under.

Runners ranged in age from 6 to 63 and came from more than 20 states.

The 6.2 mile road race which began and ended at NML's Milwaukee lakefront home office was won in 29:04.50 by Frank Shorter of Boulder, Colo., who was the 1972 Olympic marathon gold winner and who will compete in the Montreal Olympics.

Race starter and banquet speaker was Billy Mills, who in 1964 became the only American ever to win the O lympic 10,000 meter run and who is now an NML agent in Sacramento, Cal.





ELECTION NOTICE VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

County of Washington) State of Wisconsin

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.
