Tax Levy Increase Approved at Routine Annual School Meeting

With the exception of the question of adding a second teacher at the Farmington School, the annual meeting of the School District of Kewaskum turned out to be pretty much routine business.

The meeting approved the tax levies as proposed. This levy will total \$1,893,854.15, an increase of \$208,125.16 over last year. The tax rate is estimated at 13.167 mills next year compared with 13.127 this last year. There were few questions concerning the budget. One involved the effect of the negative aid concept on Kewaskum. It was indicated that at this point there is no effect on the Kewaskum District.

One change approved in the budget and in the resolutions was an increase in salaries to board members from \$400 to \$500 per year. The resolution on this change was approved on a 53 to 10 vote.

The motion at the budget hearing to present the budget to the annual meeting was approved 47 to 11. The no votes were primarily the result of a question concerning the addition of the kindergarten section at Farmington.

A resolution was presented which asked that the budget be changed to allow for the additional position. The reso-

lution specified where the added section was to be located, and it was ruled that this was not within the power of an annual meeting. It was also suggested that the proper spot to actually amend the budget was in the annual meeting and in the resolution which authorized the tax levy.

The resolution was again raised at that point on the annual meeting agenda. Since it was indicated at that time that it was the intent of Mrs. Merwin, who made the motion, to add to the budget or to change the levy, that resolution on the levy was passed as originally proposed by the school board.

The motion or resolution on the Farmington kindergarten section was then discussed. Again, the advice of attorney to the chairman, Dr. Ogi, was that a motion of this type, specifying locations of classes, could not be binding on the board. The motion was then entered by Mrs. McKee as an advisory motion to the board to add the class. This motion was defeated by a 46-41 vote, with one absentee. That was the last item to be taken up, and the meeting was adjourned following the advisory vote.

Principals' Salaries Approved

Meeting last Monday evening following the annual meeting, the Kewaskum Board of Education approved salaries for three full-time principals and one assistant principal. Salaries approved were for Clark Pearson, High School Principal at \$21,075; Roy J. Esser, Assistant Principal and LVEC at \$19,450; Ken Erickson, Middle School Principal at \$18,147 and Richard Zarling, Elementary Principal at \$19,203. Contract lengths for Mr. Pearson and Mr. Esser are 240 days, for Mr. Erickson 205 days and for Mr. Zarling 220 days. Except that the rate for mileage was raised from 10 cents to 13 cents per mile, other benefits remained the same as in previous years.

In other business, the board approved two teacher contracts and conditionally accepted one resignation. Contracts approved were for Larry Becker and John Triphan. Mr. Becker will teach vocational agriculture. He is a beginning teacher and a graduate of University of Wisconsin - Madison. Mr. Triphan was hired for special education. He too is a beginning teacher. He graduated from Stout with a major in psychology and has taken his work in special education at Grand Valley State College and at

Western Michigan.

The resignation came from Carol Bremser, who teaches at the Farmington School. Her resignation was accepted pending the hiring of a suitable replacement.

A closed session was held following the regular meeting to discuss salary of the school social worker and teacher negotiations.

SPECIAL MEETING OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Kewaskum Board of Education will hold a special meeting on Monday, Aug. 2, at 8 p. m. in the administrative offices.

Discussion and action on boundaries of parochial school attendance areas are the major reasons for the special meeting. With the new school being started by St. Lucas, it is necessary to set up attendance area boundaries. Also to be discussed will be requests for music instruction for some students intending to attend St. Lucas, approval of teacher and social worker and psychologist contracts, and miscellaneous items which may come up. Following the meeting, a closed session will be held on wages of non-certified personnel and salaries of teaching principals.

Wins Music Scholarship

Becky Brehm, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Brehm, Waukesha, formerly of Kewaskum, has won one of ten four-year tuition scholarships awarded by Summer Music Clinic at Madison. These scholarships are valid at either UW-Madison or UW-Milwaukee and may be used in any department of the university.

Becky's scholarship was given based on her high school musical and academic achievements, and on results of a competitive audition on July 3 at music clinic. At this audition Becky performed on the viola and oboe, sight read and sight sang for a panel of university professors.

Although Becky auditioned this summer, the scholarship will actually be awarded next summer when she completes attendance at one more year of Summer Music Clinic. The scholarship will then be in effect for the fall of 1977.

Campbellsport Youth Bitten By Bat Infected With Rabies

Troy Lucas, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Lucas, Campbellsport, was bitten by a bat at 6:00 a. m. Sunday, July 25.

The youth slapped the bat off his face and ran downstairs to tell his mother. She dashed upstairs with a broom and killed the bat which was still lying on the bed. Mrs. Lucas then called Dr. R. G. Edwards of Kewaskum.

At noon, Troy received his first injection of rabies vaccine, which Mrs. Lucas obtained from the West Bend Pharmacy.

The bat had been placed at once in the deep freezer and was transferred to the State Board of Health on Monday morning, July 26, on the order of Dr. Charles Ogi, veterinarian, by the sheriff's deputy of Fond du Lac County.

On Tuesday, July 27, at 4:00 p. m. the doctor from the State Board of Health phoned Dr. Edwards to inform him that the bat was proven truly positive for rabies. He advised Dr. Edwards to administer an additional

protection dose of immune globulin which would act at once to provide the patient with bacteriocidal defense. The other vaccine being given daily would not provide such help for several more days. The wound lesion on the face made the need for the vaccine much more urgent.

By phone and radio, the pharmacist in Madison who had the needed drug on hand, sent it to Dr. Edwards by sheriff's helper to the Dane County line, then across Dodge County to the Washington County officers, who delivered the medicine to Dr. Edwards at 6:00 p. m.

Troy Lucas received the injection by 7:00 p. m. which may have saved his life.

Dr. Edwards feels our policemen need praise for their work much more often than they receive.

This report was submitted by Dr. Edwards to make our general public thankful we are being so well-protected at all times.

Kewaskum 4-H and FFA Members Receive Top Awards at County Fair

Several Kewaskum 4-H and FFA members received top awards in both showmanship and judging at the 118th Annual Washington County Fair held last weekend, July 22 - 25.

Mark Matenaer of the Kewaskum FFA sold his reserve champion steer for \$2.60 per pound for a total of \$3,517.80 to Bowe and Weninger Real Estate of West Bend.

The Golden Knight Supper Club of West Bend bought the grand champion steer raised by Randy Bader of Hartford for \$2.25 per pound for a total of \$2,922.75. In addition, the Golden Knight bought the grand champion lamb for \$4.00 per pound and a fine-fitted lamb shown by Jody Dogs of West Bend.

The fair's reserve champion lamb was purchased by the West Bend Elevator for \$325 and the champion hog raised by John Etta of Kewaskum was bought by Tom Miklas of Hartford. Rick Schlosser of R. 1, Allenton sold his reserve champion hog to Don's Elevator of Allenton.

In the showmanship area, Perry Etta won the fair's beef showmanship award. Scott Wulff was named best dairy showman and also received the award for best fitted animal. Carey Dogs was named best sheep showman.

In the hog showmanship category, Dave Wilkens won first place in the senior divi-

sion and Jon Etta won the same in the junior division. Both are from Kewaskum.

Trophies for dairy showmanship were provided by East Central Breeders and PCA. The trophies in the other categories were provided by the Heritage Bank of West Bend and Walnut 4 x 4.

Krazy Daze Great Success

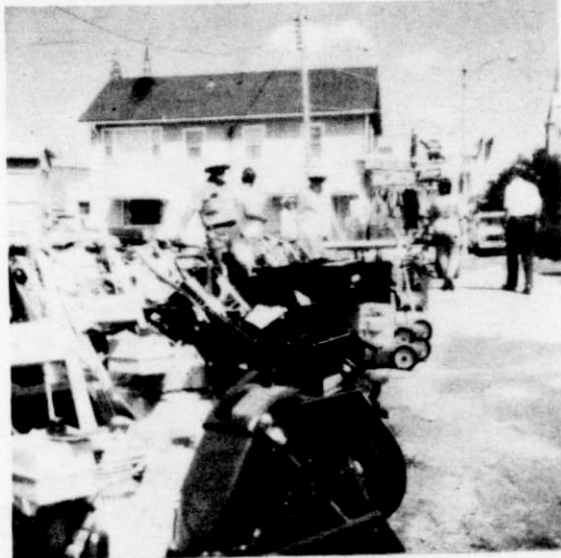

One-To-One

This month, I would like to discuss what I consider the backbone of any successful business operation... efficiency, control and the safeguarding of customer satisfaction.

Effective this month, General Telephone Company of Wisconsin implements a new system, based upon a Centralized Repair Center (CRC) concept, which will increase the firm's efficiency and control in clearing service problems. At the same time, this new system will also further guarantee customers that correction of such problems will be handled in the fastest, most direct manner possible.

Perhaps a bit of background is in order. Under our old system for recording service problems, calls placed to our repair office numbers during normal business hours were handled locally, with repair tickets written on the spot for action by repairmen. This process remains in effect.

However, reports of problems during non-business hours often took a more roundabout route. A trouble report could pass through many hands before reaching its final destination.

As an example, a customer reporting trouble in a remote exchange may have had that call answered in a progression of district and regional toll centers, not necessarily operated by General Telephone personnel. 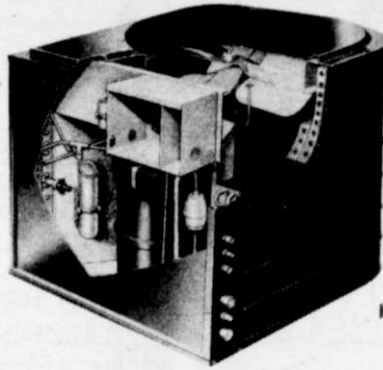

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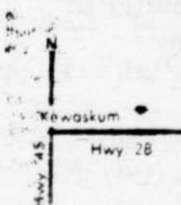
