## Edward Brandt, Village Assessor, Building Inspector Passes Away



Edward J. Brandt, age 71 years, of 321 Clinton St., Kewaskum, was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, on Wednesday evening, July 28.

He was born July 8, 1905, in Kewaskum to the late Charles and Jennie Strobel Brandt. He married Lucina Martin on March 3, 1930, in Milwaukee.

Mr. Brandt was a former employee of Harnischfeger Corp. in Milwaukee for eight years, and then was transferred to their Teterboro factory in New Jersey where he was their Eastern Service Manager for 39 years. He retired on Aug. 15, 1970, and moved back to Kewaskum. For the past five years he was the assessor and building inspector for the Village of Kewaskum.

He was a third and fourth degree member of the Catholic Knights of Columbus and a member of Holy Trinity Church.

Surviving are his wife; three brothers, Jacob Schlosser of Phoenix, Ariz., John Schlosser of Richmond, Ill. and Harold Schlosser of R. 1, Allenton; one sister, Kathryn Warner of Kewaskum; four brothers-in-law, Paul Halfmann of Campbellsport, Lester Dreher of Holiday, Fla., Roy Warner and William Martin of Kewaskum; three sisters-in-law, Avis Schlosser, Gertrude Schlosser and Dorothy Martin; also many nieces,

nephews and other relatives.

He was pre-deceased by his step-father, Jacob Schlosser, Sr.; one brother, Joseph Schlosser; three sisters, Miss Lillie Schlosser, Margaret Dreher and Helen Halfmann, and one brother-in-law, Arnold Martin.

Visitation was after 4 p. m. Friday at Miller's Funeral Home, with a rosary vigil at 8 p. m. Friday. Funeral services were held Saturday at 10 a. m. at the funeral home and at 10:30 a. m. at Holy Trinity Church with the Revs. John T. Budde, Victor Zwaska and Herbert Waldkirch officiating. Burial was in the new Holy Trinity Cemetery.

## Bid of \$16,315.30 Lowest of Eight For Curb and Gutter Work

A low bid of \$16,315.30 was received from a field of eight bidders for curb and gutter work on six streets by the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday.

The low bid was submitted by Ptaschinski Construction, Inc. of Beaver Dam, at a unit price of \$2.77 per linear foot, with several bids in the \$3 range, going as high as \$5.69 in one case. The terms of their bid call for a starting date of Aug. 31, with completion within 45 days, and included a bid bond in the amount of 5% of the bid price.

All bids were for 5,890 feet of curbing and were given to Jim Arthur of Arthur and Associates for tabulation.

Ram Construction Company of Random Lake was awarded a bid for asphaltting 2,000 square yards on Werner Dr. for \$2.68 per square yard. Bids for that project were opened at the board's last regular meeting.

Citing a hardship variance granted to David Sarauer, Ray Schaefer of West Bend appeared before the board to ask that something be done about granting building permits in Ideal Subdivision. He

stated that he had applied for purchase of a model home and then found out that there "was some holdup with the building permits in that area." He added that the lot on which the home will be built is owned by Port Washington Savings and Loan, and is located in a part of the subdivision that does seem to be satisfactory.

President Miller explained to him that the board's reason for denying permits in that area is that they have received a list of seven things from their engineer that are not done according to the village's subdivision ordinance, and added that their attorney advised them not to grant any more until the matter is cleared up. He agreed to discuss the matter with the proper authorities and then notify Mr. Schaefer of his options in this matter.

Bids for excavation at the Kewaskum Kiwanis Park will not be awarded until the board's next meeting on Aug. 16, so that their consultants on the project can have time to finish cost estimates for the rest of the park and complete detailed maps of the pond and immediate area surrounding it so that approval

## Historical Society Plans For Early Farm Days Show

Discussion on their "Early Farm Days" antique farm machinery show planned for August 15, was the main item of discussion at the July meeting of the Kewaskum Historical Society.

Help from all of the members will be needed on the day of the show, and the two days prior, so that the area can be fenced off and displays set up properly. Some of the members will also be needed to sell ice cream, trays, Bicentennial books and buttons for the society.

On that day, the museum will be closed, since everyone's help will be needed at the display. Some of the items usually found in it will be brought across the river to the park and displayed in one of the buildings there.

Admission to the event was set at 50c per person, with each visitor receiving one of the society's buttons for 1976. Anyone wearing one at the gate will be admitted without charge, as will all exhibitors.

It was announced that on August 17, a drawing will be held for a homemade quilt and three woolen pillowcases. About 400 tickets have been printed for it, that are being sold by most society mem-

bers for \$1 apiece. The proceeds will go toward maintaining their museum.

The winter schedule for the museum beginning in September is that it will be open on the second Sunday of each month from 1 to 4 p. m. or by appointment, until Memorial Day.

A prize of \$20 was awarded to the society for their float at the Kewaskum Firemen's picnic, which in the words of president Dan Schmidt "turned out real well." Although it only captured fourth place, many offers were received to use it in upcoming parades, which had to be turned down because the membership was unsure that it could be pulled along the highway for long distances.

for the project can be obtained from Madison. They will also contact the appropriate agency in Madison to make sure that the plans that they are drawing up will be adequate enough to allow them to make a decision on whether or not to grant approval for the pond.

No word has been received on whether the Highway 45 bypass will go next to the parksite, but president Miller, who is also a county supervisor, termed the possibility "unlikely" and added that if it was, it would not be before 1990, anyway.

The plans for the park have been revised to include four lifeguard stations, which are required by the state under the circumstances. The pond will also have a permanent diving board in the middle of the deep end, which will extend from cement slabs

resting on the bottom. It may still be removable for the safety of ice skaters during the winter, if a design can be found to enable the diving board and deck from the water without having to also remove the supports.

Final plans for the bath house probably will not be ready by the board's next meeting, but should be available shortly thereafter. When everything is ready the plans will be hand carried to the Dept. of Health in Madison, the bureau in charge of overseeing pond construction.

A resolution of condolence was passed in memory of Ed Brandt, the village building inspector and assessor, who passed away last week. The board reluctantly authorized the search for a replacement so that housing construction should continue on schedule.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty was authorized to attend a conference at Green Bay in 4 weeks in connection with his job. Supt. of Wastewater Treatment Pete Albers was also given permission to attend a three day school on modern methods of disposing of activated sludge, which will be held in Chilton.

## Attendance Boundaries, Transportation Approved at School Board Meeting

Approving attendance boundaries and arranging transportation for the newly formed St. Lucas Day School was the major item of business on the agenda of the Kewaskum Board of Education meeting held Monday evening. The boundaries as proposed by the various churches involved were approved by the board.

The other item which had to be decided was whether St. Lucas would operate on the public school, high school or elementary time schedule. The St. Lucas attendance area extends into what is normally the Farmington Public School attendance area, and those elementary busses do not come to Kewaskum. This would necessitate a shuttle bus or other means of bringing the children involved from Farmington to Kewaskum. If St. Lucas runs on the high school schedule, however, the buses cover the entire district and return to Kewaskum.

On a 3-2 vote, the board agreed to approve the boundaries and to allow St. Lucas to choose between the two time schedules. However, if the elementary schedule is selected the Kewaskum district will not pay any added costs involved in getting children from the Farmington or Wayne elementary attendance area to Kewaskum. This would then be the responsibility of St. Lucas or the parents.

In other business, the board agreed to allow Mr. Getter to give instrumental music lessons to parochial school students provided they come to the public schools and fit into the public school schedules.

Policies regarding school lunches for 1976-77 were approved. The major change from previous years is an updated schedule of families who would be eligible for free or reduced price lunches. This is set each year by the federal government, and must be a part of local policies in order to receive aid.

The 1976-77 school calendar was adopted. August 30 will be the starting date for all students, with June 3 set as the last day of school and the date for graduation. This year, two snow days or emergency days were built into the calendar. If there are no days needed, the last day of school would be Wednesday, June 1.

A contract was approved for David Schroeder as school social worker. Mr. Schroeder is a graduate of UW-Milwaukee. This will be his first position as a school social worker. Approval also was given for a contract for Patrick Mader. He will teach at Beechwood, replacing Mr. Miller, and is a beginning teacher and a graduate of St. Norbert College.

Jerry Secor was appointed as delegate to the CESA 16 annual meeting. The board also approved a resolution to allow short-term borrowing up to \$500,000 as needed. This same resolution was pas-

sed last year, but the district did not have to do any borrowing in 1975-76.

As a result of inquiries by some parents regarding transportation to Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School, the board passed a motion indicating that Kewaskum would not accept responsibility for any added costs for transporting students there. Because the school is more than five miles beyond the boundaries of the Kewaskum District, there is no obligation to transport students.

The board met in closed session following the regular

meeting to discuss salaries of non-certified personnel as well as salaries of the school psychologist and of the elementary teaching principals.

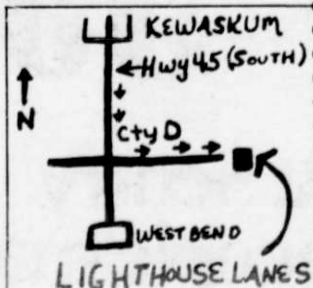

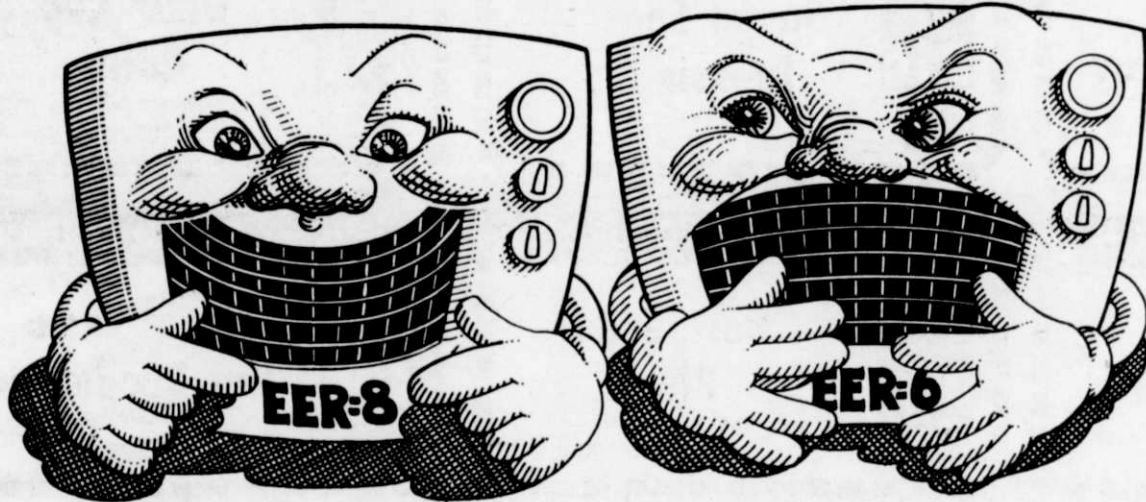

**RESOLUTION NO. 76-6**

PRELIMINARY RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENT TO EXERCISE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT POWERS UNDER SECTION 66.60, WISCONSIN STATUTES OF 1969

RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin

1. The Village Board hereby declares its intention to exercise its power under s. 66.60, Wisconsin Statutes, to levy special assessments upon property within the following described area for benefits conferred upon such property by improvement of the following streets:

CURB & GUTTER on all property fronting on streets as follows:

A. All property fronting on Stark Street north of Keller Street.

B. All property fronting on Moraine Court.

C. All property fronting on the north side of Werner Drive.

D. All property fronting on Lin-De Lane west of Bel-Ric Drive.

E. All property fronting on Brooklane Drive from Edgewood to Hillside.

F. All property fronting on Edgewood Road in Roseland Hills Addition No. 2.

2. Said public improvements shall include the installation of curb and gutter on the streets as set forth above to the grade established therefore in Ordinance 58-1 of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and recorded in the office of the Village Commissioner.

3. The total amount assessed against such district shall not exceed 100% of the cost of improvements.

4. The assessments against any parcel may be paid in cash or in installments as shall hereafter be determined.

5. The Village Engineer is directed to prepare a report consisting of:

a. Final plans and specifications for said improve-

ments.

b. An estimate of the entire cost of the proposed curb and gutter improvement.

c. An estimate of benefits to be levied for each improvement as to each parcel of property within the assessment district of:

1. The assessment of benefits to be levied for each improvement.

2. The damages to be awarded for property taken or damaged by said improvement.

3. The net amount of benefits over damages or of the damages over benefits for such improvement.

4. The total assessment against each parcel.

5. Upon completion of such report the Village Engineer is directed to file a copy thereof in the office of the Village Commissioner for public inspection.

6. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Commissioner is directed to give notice of a public hearing on such report as specified in Section 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes. The hearing shall be held in the Council Room in the Municipal Building of the Village of Kewaskum at a time set by the Commissioner in accordance with s. 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes.

**ORDINANCE NO. 76-6**

AN ORDINANCE TO CODIFY THE GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN, AS THE SAME EXISTED UP TO AND INCLUDING THE 2ND DAY OF AUGUST, 1976.

WHEREAS, it is deemed expedient and necessary that the general ordinances of the Village of Kewaskum be revised, codified and arranged in appropriate chapters, sections and subsections; that omissions be supplied, defects be amended and new ordinances be enacted and that the same be published in book form to make the whole thereof plain, concise, intelligible and convenient; and

WHEREAS, on December 4, 1972 the Village Board authorized the preparation of a code of general ordinances for the Village; and

WHEREAS, a copy of such code has been on file and open for public inspection in the office of the Village Clerk for not less than 2 weeks, as required by s. 66.035 of the Wisconsin Statutes;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE VILLAGE BOARD OF KEWASKUM DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

That the code of ordinances in book form entitled, "Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum," a copy of which is on file in the office of the Village Clerk for public inspection, shall be and is hereby adopted as the general ordinances in and for the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, up to and including the 2nd day of August, 1976.

This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as provided by law.

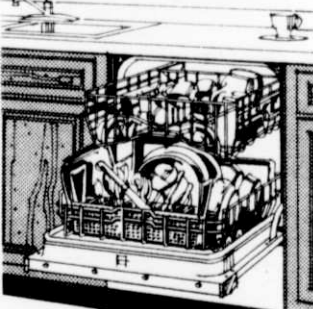
