Village Presented Its Own Flag

After 81 years, the Village of Kewaskum finally was presented its first village flag by members of the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee on Monday.

It was made of green and white nylon flag material by Dorothy Martin, wife of Commissioner Bill Martin. She was authorized to do the flag by the Bicentennial Committee in 1975, after the results of a contest for a design were known.

Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion donated \$100 for a contest to determine which entry would be the one selected for the design of the flag. As no en-

try could be selected as the winner, three were picked that were very similar in design and were combined into the final design of the flag.

The contest was open to anyone living in the Kewaskum School District, but all three winners were grade school students from outlying schools. They were: Vicki Reif, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Reif of Beechwood; Jay Petermann of Farmington; and Jerome Bock, formerly of Farmington, and now living in Denmark, Wis. All were advised by their art teacher, Mrs. Mary Buddenhagen, of Kewaskum.

Other projects undertaken by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee include founding of the Kewaskum Historical Society, writing a Kewaskum history, presenting a pageant about Kewaskum's past by the Kewaskum Women's Clubs, and finishing the flag, which "is making history," according to President Charles Miller.

Board Accepts \$39,924 Bid to Dig Pond; Total Park Cost \$300,000

The bid of Washkovic Construction Company of Green Lake in the amount of \$39,924.40 to dig the pond at the proposed Kewaskum Kiwanis Park was accepted by the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday.

It was accepted subject to the condition that state approval can be obtained on the pond plans when they are taken to Madison on Aug. 23. All necessary plans and drawings are ready for presentation to the Department of Health, except for electrical plans for the bathhouse, which will be done by Wisconsin Electric, and the test borings which will be taken

on Thursday.

The Red Cross Swimming Certificates for those who passed may be picked up at the municipal building after Aug. 18.

The guards wish to thank parents, children and all swimmers who frequented the beach, an area with some unsafe features but also a redeeming natural charm, for their cooperation throughout the years in generally obeying rules and for showing a certain decency and mutual concern. It is to the credit of the people of the Kewaskum area that no serious accident has ever occurred at the beach.

St. Lucas to Begin 100th Year With 3 New Teachers

St. Lucas Lutheran Church will begin its Centennial Year with special services next Sunday. The birthdate of the parish was August 20, 1877. This special day will be celebrated in the worship services on Sunday, August 22, by means of song and sermon.

Then as part of the 9:30 a. m. service, the three teachers who will staff the new St. Lucas Christian Day School will be installed. They are: Orville Breitreutz, Principal and Teacher of Grades 5 - 8; Miss Diana Guenther, Teacher of Grades 1 - 4; and Mrs. Paul Hoenecke, Kindergarten Teacher. After this service, the congregation will have a dinner-reception for the new teachers at the Kewaskum High School Cafeteria. The dinner will also be the kick-off for a year of Centennial activities in the congregation.

Breitreutz will make his home at 1433 Parkview Dr. He was married this past July to Sue Barenz at Hartland, Wis. He is a graduate of Dr. Martin Luther College of New Ulm, Minn. and also took graduate courses this past winter at the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay. He was born and raised at

Redwood Falls, Minn. and his outside interests are hunting and fishing.

The lower grade teacher, Miss Diana Guenther, is also a graduate of Dr. Martin Luther College. Her parents reside in Beaver Dam and she received her elementary and secondary education in that city. Last year she taught school for Zion Lutheran Church, of Mission, South Dakota. Miss Guenther has lived temporarily with Mrs. Hiida Becker and will soon

make her home in the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Bartelt, 1450 Parkview Dr.

St. Lucas' Kindergarten teacher is the wife of Pastor Hoenecke. For the past two years she taught Kindergarten at St. John's Lutheran School in Newburg. Schools to Open August 30

August 30 will be the first day of classes for students in all schools in the Kewaskum district. Class times remain the same as they were last year, with grades 1-6 beginning at 9:05 and dismissing at 3:40. Grades 7-12 begin at 7:45 and dismiss at 2:45. Times for kindergarten will depend on whether the child is assigned to a morning or afternoon session. Letters were sent to parents giving the sessions to which their kindergarten children were assigned.

Lunches will be served beginning August 30. Pupils

should bring lunch money with them on the first day. A weekly ticket for grades 1-6, will be \$2.65; for grades 7-12, \$2.90. A daily ticket is 70c. Reduced lunches, if a family qualifies, cost 10c per day. Milk-breaks will be 4c per day, and extra milk with meals will also be 4c.

Those students who ride busses will be contacted with approximate pick-up times as well as the location of pick-up. Parents who have questions on bussing should call the Johnson Bus Company in Kewaskum (626-4414).

the specifications will have to be used, according to Jim Arthur of Arthur and Associates. A cheaper liner could be purchased, but would tend to increase turbidity rather than decrease it.

No silica sand will be purchased because Washkovick's bid of \$2.33 per ton for regular sand was too low to make buying the higher grade sand practical. "We couldn't even haul it there for that," noted President Miller.

Arthur and Associates also provided cost estimates for various parts of the park as requested. The estimate for the bath house was \$50,000; \$3,830 for the service drive; \$51,000 for a parking lot and lighting; \$7,200 for the access road to the bath house; \$58,000 for engineering and legal fees, and \$600 for an entrance sign.

Six horseshoe courts and four tennis courts with proper lighting should cost just over \$48,100, \$17,400 for two basketball courts, and \$21,080 for two softball diamonds. The grand total for the estimate was just over \$300,000 and included the cost of the pond bid, but not landscaping, ball diamond fencing, or pond lighting.

Possible sources of funding include the Outdoor Recreation and Planning program, which is run by the State of Wisconsin, and the new public works bill enacted recently by the Federal Government may also be a source of

revenue.

A building permit for Ray Schaefer for a model home in Ideal Subdivision was tabled until after another meeting with representatives of Ideal Land, Inc., which will be held on Monday. The board will meet in special session on Tuesday at 7:00 to make a decision on the permit.

Trustee Bob Danielsen reported that his homework showed that 13 out of the 29 lots were owned by Ideal or their associates, 11 owned by Port Washington Savings and Loan, and five by private parties.

He asked who requested the first meeting between village officials and Ideal Land, and was told that it was not the village. To this he re-

plied, "If so, why let them have buildings. All I'm saying is maybe we're doing the right thing. We don't even have Bill Ruth's word that it will be taken care of."

When asked what day he wanted to appear in court if the board continued denying permits, he replied, "I don't think it will go that far."

Kindergarten Classes Again Get Major Attention of School Board

Kindergarten classes again claimed major attention at the meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education Monday night. No action was taken, however, as board members present requested added busing information prior to making a final decision. Since one of the alternatives involved aide time, it was also felt the decision should be made by more than the four board members who were present at the meeting.

With a total of 157 kindergarten students enrolled and with six sections scheduled, the average class enrollment would be 26 students. The question of a need for a pre-kindergarten class (students of kindergarten age but not yet ready for kindergarten work) was raised. Students who fall into this category must, by law, be served if parents agree to or request the service. This will lower the kindergarten en-

rollment in some sections.

As a result of these figures the board tended to feel there was no reason for an added section in the district. Transporting children or putting an aide at Farmington were alternates considered.

New prices for athletic events were enacted. Adult ticket prices will go from \$1.00 to \$1.25. Student tickets for those under grade 9 will increase from 25c to 50c, and adult season ticket prices will

increase from \$7 to \$10.

Prices for lunches for the coming year were set at \$2.65 for a weekly ticket in grades 1-6 and \$2.90 in grades 7-12. A daily student ticket will be 70c. Extra milk or milk-break milk will remain at 4c per carton. Parents may apply for free or reduced-price lunches if they meet the income levels as set by federal standards.

Children from families whose income is within the levels shown are eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with special hardship conditions such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter or notice to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to receive such benefits the foster parents should apply on behalf of the child or contact the school officials about their eligibility.

Under the provisions of the School's Policy, Jack Sutton, Services Manager, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent of Schools, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin;

phone: 414-626-2160, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color

or national origin.

Each school and the agency office has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.


A new contract was approved for the school psychologist.

Village Board Reverses Decision

On Building Permits to Ideal Land

Following a meeting with Ideal Land, Inc., the Kewaskum Village Board reversed its decision to refuse to grant building permits in Ideal Subdivision in a special session.

The special meeting was called by President Charles Miller so that Ray Schaefer, a West Bend contractor, could be notified whether he would be allowed to build a model home in that subdivision after having previously been turned down.

Miller, Commissioner Bill Martin, Public Works Supt. Augie Bilgo, and the board's attorney, Roger McKenna met with members of Ideal Land to discuss the seven items not done properly in Ideal Subdivision. The meeting was held in McKenna's office and was called at the request of the subdividers.

When Miller noted at the end of the meeting that he felt that the board would allow building permits there in the future, McKenna offered no objection, although the ban was put on because of his recommendation at the board's last meeting on Aug. 2.

"It really serves no purpose," President Miller stated on Wednesday night. "All we are doing is creating hard feelings by doing this, and we are hindering Schaefer from developing. Really, we don't have a leg to stand on."

Trustee Greg Nigh wondered why the village wasn't legally able to continue their present course, since the subdividers are in violation of the subdivision ordinance, but was told that the matter would probably soon end up in court, so it might be wise to allow the change.

Some of the irregularities found by the village's engineers have already been taken care of, such as installation of frames and grates for the storm sewers. Street signs are presently on order, and have not yet arrived, while back filling behind curbs is the responsibility of the village's contractor. Sodding the area between curb and the proposed sidewalk "would be a big waste of money, anyway," according to President Miller.

By a 6-0 vote, the board voted to send a list of priorities for the items yet to be completed to the subdivider, with the main item being to find a way to remove some stagnant water and an open drainage ditch in the area. Some large rocks still have to be removed from the gravel in the street, and something must be done about the hydrants and valves that are not at the proper grade.
