### Village Presented Its Own Flag



After 81 years, the Village of Kewaskum finally was pre sented its first village flag by members of the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee on Monday.

It was made of green and white nylon flag material by Dorothy Martin, wife of Commissioner Bill Martin. She was authorized to do the flag by the Bicentennial Com-. mittee in 1975, after the results of a contest for a design were known.

Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion donated \$100 for a contest to determine which entry would be the one selected for the design of the flag. As no entry could be selected as the winner, three were picked that were very similar in design and were combined into the final design of the flag.

The contest was open to anyone living in the Kewaskum School District, but all three winners were grade school students from outlying schools. They were: Vicki Reif, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Reif of Beechwood; Jay Petermann of Farmington; and Jerome Bock, formerly of Farmington, and now linving in Denmark, Wis. All were advised by their art teacher, Mrs. Mary Buddenhagen, of Kewaskum

Other projects undertaken by the Kewaskum Bicentennial Committee include founding of the Kewaskum Historical Society, writing a Kewaskum history, presenting a pageant about Kewaskum's past by the Kewaskum Women's Clubs, and finishing the flag, which "is making history," according to President Charles Miller.

#### TO FLUSH HYDRANTS

The village water department will flush hydrants Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 25 and 26. If water appears rusty, do not be alarmed as it is harmless and will clear in a few hours.

Children from families whose income is within the levels shown are eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with special hardship conditions such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physial condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter or notice to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to receive such benefits the foster parents should apply on behalf of the child or contact the school officials about their eligibility.

Under the provisions of the School's Policy, Jack Sutton, Services Manager, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent of Schools, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wiscon-

sin; phone: 414-626-2160, for or national origin. a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.



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



By Mark Smucker Following a meeting with Ideal Land, Inc., the Kewaskum Viilage Board reversed its decision to refuse to grant building permits in Ideal Subdivision in a special sessicn.

The special meeting was called by President Charles Miller so that Ray Schaefer, West Bend contractor. could be notified whether he would be allowed to build a model home in that subdivision after having previously been turned down.

Miller, Commissioner Bill Martin, Public Works Supt. Augie Bilgo, and the board's attorney, Roger McKenna met with members of Ideal Land to discuss the seven items not done properly in Ideal Subdivision. The meeting was held in McKenna's office and was called at the request of the subdividers.

When Miller noted at the end of the meeting that he felt that the board would allow building permits there in the future, McKenna offered no objection, although the ban was put on because of his recommendation at the board's last meeting on Aug.

"It really serves no purpose," President Miller stated on Wednesday night. "All we are doing is creating hard feelings by doing this, and we are hindering Schaefer from developing. Really, we don't have a leg to stand on."

Trustee Greg Nigh wondered why the village wasn't legally able to continue their present course, since the sub-

dividers are in violation of the subdivision ordinance, but was told that the matter would probably soon end up in court, so it might be wise to allow the change.

Some of the irregularities found by the village's engineers have already been taken care of, such as installation of frames and grates for the storm sewers. Street signs are presently on order, and have not yet arrived, while back filling behind curbs is the responsibility of the village's contractor. Sodding the area between curb and the proposed sidewalk "would be a big waste of money, anyway," according to President Miller.

By a 6-0 vote, the board voted to send a list of priorities for the items yet to be completed to the subdivider. with the main item being to find a way to remove some stagnant water and an open drainage ditch in the area Some large rocks still have to be removed from the gravel in the street, and something must be done about the hydrants and valves that are not at the proper grade.

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

The Kettle 20 marathon sponsored by the Lions drew a large field of 105 runners, mostly from a distance, and a new record was set. Runners began to assemble just after 9 a. m. for the 10:15 race and officials knew they were going to better last year's attendance run along the scenic Kettle Moraine route.

Only 65 minutes later Green Bay's Jim Drews crossed the finish line, breaking the old record of 67 minutes 23 seconds set by Olympian Lucian Rosa the first year the event was held. Drews, an experienced marathon and distance runner, usually runs "70 miles a week."

Drews was 23 seconds in front of Terry Rodiez, Milwaukee. In third was Kerry Mayer, Milwaukee with a 68minute, 52-second time. Fourth was Danny Bouche, Luxemburg, 71:03 and fifth, John Kiekaefer, Milwaukee. 72:04. All these runners were in the 18-29 year class.




