Fire Destroys Barn on Lehnerz Farm Thursday

The barn on the Albion Lehnerz farm located on Mill Road just west of New Fane, northeast of Kewaskum, was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon. The call for the fire came in at 2:50 p. m.

The roof was already caving in and the barn was engulfed in flames when firemen arrived and damage to the barn was nearly a total loss. The fire broke out while the Lehnerz family was putting straw in the barn and had gone out for another load. Lehnerz had been in the barn about half an hour beand found nothing

wrong at that time. Ronald Felten, 16, a neighbor, discovered flames and alerted Mrs. Lehnerz, who put in the call. Felten saved four calves that were in a pen in the lower part of the barn.

Kewaskum firemen with the aid of the Boltonville department fought the blaze and a mutual aid call was also placed with the Campbellsport Department, which sent a tanker to haul more water. It was a hot day and heat from the fire was in-

Chief Augie Bilgo estimated that some 80,000 gallons of water were used in battling the fire. He and Boltonville Chief Joe Enright had about 50 men on the scene. Water was hauled from Kewaskum a Milwaukee River near the Lehnerz branch

'Another concern of firemen was electric high voltage wires located only about 20 feet away from the barn. An electrical pole was on fire and the heat was very intense across the road from

New St. Lucas School to Begin Classes for First Time Monday

Those desiring a Lutheran education for their children will have an opportunity to do so this fall at the newly established parochial school at St. Lucas Lutheran Church, Kewaskum.

As of last week, 56 students were enrolled in grades K - 8, with the largest class having 11 students, the kindergarten. This is the second paroochial school in Kewaskum. the other being run by Holy Trinity Catholic Church.

The Lutheran school will be held at the congregation's Sunday school building, located at 1410 Riverview Dr., and will operate on the schedule used by the Kewaskum High School, so that most of the students living in outlying areas can be bussed into town. Grades 1 - 8 will be in school from 7:45 a.m. to 2.30 p. m., while the kindergarten class will attend class from 9:00 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.

No remodeling was necessary to bring the building up to state standards, except for the addition of two fire extinguishers. The building was dedicated in 1961 and was used for Sunday School and religious instruction. Hot lunches will not be served on a regular basis so students will be allowed to bring cold lunches or go home at noon if they live nearby. Parish women may occasionally make hot meals for variety.

According to Pastor Hoenecke, the cost of running the school for a year should be in the vicinity of \$25,000 per year, with most of the cost being paid by the congregation, which consists of about 375 families. Only two nonmember families will be sending students there this fall, and they will have to pay the \$240 tuition established for those not belonging to the church.

Athletics of some type, for both boys and girls will be started this fall, in a conference with other Lutheran schools in the area. Most of the coaching will probably be done by the principal, Orville

Grades 6 through 8 will be able to participate in band through the public school.

Breitkreutz will be the school's principal and teacher of grades 5 - 8, with Miss Diane Guenther as lower grade teacher, while Mrs. Paul Hoenecke will teach the kindergarten class.

St. Lucas Lutheran Church was founded on August 20. 1877, and began its centennial year last Friday.

Holy Trinity Opens Aug. 30

Classes will be resumed at Holy Trinity Catholic School Monday, August 30.

Bus pupils will arrive at Holy Trinity around 7:45 a. m. Holy Mass will be held daily at 8:00 a. m. on class days. Busses will pick up Trinity pupils about 2:40 p. m.

The same teachers who taught last year will return except for Miss Janet Marx who plans to continue her education. She was to be replaced by Mrs. Constance Miller Navanjo who has a Master's Degree and teaching experience, but due to illness will not be able to teach at the present time.

The teachers at Holy Trinity School this year are:

Mrs. JoAnne Schacht, first grade; Mrs. Irma Reindl, second grade; Sister Marcella Karlin, third grade; Mrs. Ja-Laubenstein, grade; Mrs. Grace Theusch, Principal and fifth grade; Sister Mary Ellen Johnston. sixth grade; teacher pending. seventh grade, and Mrs. Virginia Miller, Vice-Principal and eighth grade.

The school hot lunch program will begin the first day of school. The cost of the meals will remain the same as last year, \$2.40 for a week (ticket for five meals) or .65 for a single meal.

Saturday classes will begin on Sept. 11.

Fire Dept.'s New \$74,000 Tele-Squirt Pumper Arrives tion. There are six different

The latest addition to the arsenal of equipment belonging to the Kewaskum Volunteer Fire Department is a 1975 Tele-Squirt pumper.

Purchased at a cost of just under \$74,000, it is powered by a 5-speed Ford caterpillar diesel engine, and was purchased from the Snorkel Fire Equipment Co. of St. Joseph, Missouri.

Planning for its purchase began "about three years ago" according to Chief Augie Bilgo, and the truck was ordered about six months later, after its advantages were recognized over the others. It was the "dream truck" of the late chief Armin Oppermann, and as a result, a plaque in tribute to him will be installed in the cab, along with another one for the names of the purchasing committee members.

The new pumper has a 50 foot boom with a snorkel on the end that can be operated at three different places; at the top of the boom, which is attached to a ladder, at the back of the truck, and by a remote control box that can be plugged into the truck, and used several yards away. The chassis was made by Motor Company in Louisville, Kentucky, uses a 1,000 gallon per minute pump manufactured by Waterous Engine Works of St. Paul, Minnesota.

Other features include a 500 gallon tank for water storage, and a hydraulic operating system for the boom. which can be rotated through 360 degrees in either direc-

Hearing Set on Gas Service for **New Fire Station**

In November of 1975, contact was made between Wisconsin Gas Company and the Village of Kewaskum regarding the availability of gas service for a new fire station. At that time gas was available to commercial customers up to 50 Mcf per day. The fire station has the potential to use approximately 19 Mcf per day. Further contact between the utility and the Village and the architect for the Village, Tesch, Tesch and Associates of Fond du Lac was made in December 1975, and January 1976. places on the truck to install hoses, so water can be sprayed on seven different places at once, if the snorkel is also used.

The snorkel has the ability to extend 50 feet into the air. and 42 feet horizontally, with maximum firefighting range of about 250 feet

The new truck meets all the requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, which according to the dealer's local sales representative, "means that it is easily insured." He also noted that it is the first engine of its type in Southeastern Wisconsin, although a few larger cities have one with the larger 75 foot boom

These trucks are not built until after orders for them are placed, so that explains the 30 month delay in its arrival. A replacement, according to the representative. would cost you "right around \$100,000 today."

It will be double checked for leaks in the hose and other equipment this week, and will hopefully be ready for use this weekend. Cost of the new vehicle will be shared between the fire department and the village.

heating specifications were sent to Wisconsin Gas Company on December 15, 1975 Wisconsin Gas Company maintains that no such plans and specifications were received by utility personnel. The architect has provided copies of a "speed memo" and plans and specifications dated December 15, 1975 which he alleges were sent to the utility at that time. According to the architect, after this information was sent to the utility no further contact was made and the assumption was that gas service would be provided to the new fire station in Kewaskum.

On June 2, 1976, the Wisconsin Gas Company further limited the availability of new and additional service to customers in its Michigan Wisconsin service territory. This limitation provided that new or additional service was available to only residential customers. Sometime after June 2, 1976, the architect made contact with the utility indicating that gas service was now ready for installation. The utility informed the architect that no application had been received and that gas service was not available for commercial customers. On June 25, the Village President petitioned the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin to direct that Wisconsin Gas Company serve the new fire station at Kewas-

mined that a hearing is necessary. At this hearing the Village is directed to present evidence to establish that the plans and specifications had been submitted to the Wisconsin Gas Company.

pany was called and they reported that by that time the heat was reduced enough so that there was no great danger of the wires burning.

The barn, about 40 ft. by 80 ft. in size, was almost full of hay,oats and straw. Only the lower portion of the barn and milkhouse were saved. Some machinery and tools were also lost. Nearby sheds were not damaged.

With southwest winds blowing, a chicken coop on the John Felten farm across the road also was smoking. The Felten grandsons doused this fire. The Feltens, whose farm is located just across the road from Lehnerz. had their barn destroyed by fire less than a year ago, on Sept. 10. 1975.

Firemen remained at the scene until 12:30 a m Friday morning. Excavator Harold Mueller was called in by Bilgo and his crew used a backhoe to push hay out into the field as firemen continued to spray it with water Bob Marialke also came with a bulldozer to help out.

At 3:10 p. m. Friday Kewaskum firemen were called to the scene again when hay and straw re-ignited. They also made another check at the farm Sunday evening.

It is not sure what caused the fire. No estimate of the damage was given.

At its meeting Monday evening, the Kewaskum Board of Education again took up the question of kindergarten classes this fall. The question, which has been discussed repeatedly at recent meetings, was resolved when the board voted to add an aide at Farmington. Present enrollments now show 27 at Wayne, 82 at Kewaskum Elementary (3 sections), 16 at Beechwood and 32 at Farmington with a teacher and aide assigned to that class.

In a related action, the board voted to approve establishment of a class for children of ages 3 through kindergarten age who could benefit from special programming. This class falls into the special education category. Establishment of this discussed last class was spring but denied at that time. With a number of children already diagnosed as needing this special help, the board felt that a local program would be better than trying to place children elsewhere and then transporting them. The vote was 4-1 in favor, with Jim Oelhafen voting against.










Barn Fire on Lehnerz Farm

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Building Permit Detained Again For Subdivision

No action by the Kewaskum Vilage Board could be taken this week on the pending request for a building permit in the Ideal subdivision. The delay was due to a cancellation of the meeting between representatives of Ideal Land, Inc., and Village President Charles Miller.

Ray Schaefer, a West Bend contractor, has asked for a permit to build a model home on one of the lots. His request has been postponed twice, so that the settlement of a dispute between the village and the subdivider, over work not yet completed, can be negotiated.

President Miller announced that because the meeting did not take place he had nothing to report and added that he appreciated Schaefer's patience and courtesy. He said that an attempt will be made to reschedule the meeting for August 30, so that some action could be taken then.

Following a question from Trustee Greg Nigh, Miller explained that Ideal's reason for calling off the meeting was that some plans for the installation of curbing in the subdivision were not yet available. The board asked for Mr. Schaefer's "indulgence for one more week" so that some type of an agreement can be reached, and were "embarassed that Mr. Schaefer cannot be given an an-

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



The midget race cars of John Heisdorf put on a good performance last Friday night on Hales Corners onethird mile dirt track, where 55 cars from various states competed.







HISTORY OF KEWASKUM

culture Department started in 1951 under the guidance of Mr. Dan Scheid, the first Ag instructor. The agriculture classroom and shop were in the area that now is the Kewaskum Elementary School kitchen, cafeteria and gar-

The FFA charter was composed of the following members: Carl Koepke, Paul Liermann. Theodore Meilahn, Lawrence Nigh, Elmer Terlinden, Merlin Seefeldt, Donald Schulz, Gerald Schulz, Robert Schultz, James Falk, Delmar Kempf, Daniel Klahn, Robert Hulse, Jerry Backus, James Walters, Henry Dillinger, Herman Boegel, Elmer Belger, Ronald Coulter, William Coulter, Donald Hammes, Ronald Stange, Leroy Metz, Allen Coulter, Thomas Rodenkirch, Roger Zettler, Alvin Wiesner, Arthur Beck, William Haack, John Weigand, Herman Panzer, Jr., William Kober, Eugene Krahn, Kermit Coulter, Ronald Klumb, Robert Flasch, Sylvester Stern, Donald Batzler, and Alvin Sylvester Hawig Reindl. served as the first president with William Sippel as vicepresident; the first secretary was Jake Bruessel George Hanrahan served as the first treasurer with Kenneth Sarauer and Earl Petri completing the slate of officers as reporter and sentinel.

Mr. Scheid also started adult evening classes for farmers in the area at Kewaskum and the Washington school. The young farmer classes consisted of young men out of high school and a group of young married farm couples.

The adult classes continued through the sixties when Moraine Park established an Ag program and a full time instructor was hired to teach post-high school Ag classes.

Kewaskum FFA and Agri- The evening classes were an important part of the program for it brought farmers together to discuss current ideas and problems in farming. The classes, especially the Washington school center, were a local social center, for they included a family picnic at the end of the year; cards (Sheepshead) were played after class. Basketball followed the classes; plus trips were taken during Christmas vacation to such places as Oscar Mayer, ABS at Madison, East Central Breeders, and the prison at Waupun, plus other agri-business tours, with the breweries being very popular. The classes also used outside speakers and programs such as University professors or specialists from the agri-business field. Many of the area farmers took advantage of these classes and on a special evening, the membership was as high as 50 or 60 farmers.

Dan Scheid left Kewaskum to take a similar position at Fort Atkinson in January, 1954.

Orv Behnke followed the footsteps of Dan Scheid and brought new growth to the Ag department and the FFA chapter. Land judging became an important part of the curriculum with the varied soils of the Kettle Moraine serving as an outdoor lab. One of the early state land judging contests was held on the site of the present Kewaskum High School track. The first was held at West Bend, with Kewaskum placing third in 1955. The 1956 contest found Kewaskum FFA in first place. These contests have grown to the national level. Soils is still number one in the pre-

sent curriculum.

CHAPTER

FFA basketball, softball, and young farmer basketball was part of the recreation program under Mr. Behnke. In February of 1958, Mr. Behnke became the agent for the Equitable Life Assurance Society. He was followed by Bernard Murray, who took over the agriculture facilities in the new Kewaskum High School. His leadership was short for he left in the fall of 1960 to join the Extension Staff of Marinette County. Roy Esser was hired in the fall of 1960 and continued the program till the present. The department grew from 52 members in 1960 to 200 today.

The chapter received the Wisconsin Superior Chapter award for sixteen consecutive years. The state contests were a source of motivation these 25 years with the Kewaskum Chapter receiving top spots through the years. The FFA chapter followed a program of work of community service, leadership activities, scholarship, and recreation.

Paul Redig was hired as the second instructor in January, 1973 and has helped to maintain the Kewaskum FFA Chapter and Ag department as one of the best in the state.

Mr. Redig's resignation in the summer of 1976 brought Larry Becker to take over as advisor of the FFA

The history of the Kewaskum FFA and Agriculture Dept. is written in the farms and agri-business in the area. It is written in the acres of conservation farming, in the form of strips and terraces and other approved practices. 




