Completion of a Village Park No Simple Matter

Completion of a village lage park and high school are park is no simple matter, as the Kewaskum Village Board finding out.

some of the community's leaders had begun to realize that the time had come to modernize the village's swimming facility. As many people in the village did not want a pool, they turned their attentions to the construction of a pond.

Otto Backus' land, north of town, was ruled out because it is located too far outside the village limits to be practical, does not have enough access roads, and is not in an area recommended by the DNR study.

The next step was to get appraisals of all of the sites. to determine which of them. if any, would be suitable for

At the same time, trustee Dan Schmidt was given the task of doing a survey of communities of Kewaskum's size, to find out what types of swimming facilities they had, and how their swimming attendance has changed. A total of 23 villages were sent questionnaires, of which 10 responded and were subsequently included in the re-

Each was asked six different questions in order to determine each facility's size, other nearby facilities, such as a bathhouse, attendance, length of use, cost per year and change in cost. Recommendations of the officials of each village were also requested

Of those who did respond, seven had pools made of concrete. Some of their advice included keeping such a pool small to reduce the cost, build

Construction of New Medical Clinic to Begin

Construction of a new medical clinic in Kewaskum should begin within the next few weeks, "if all goes well," according to Dr. Cesar Sison.

The new building should provide a much more spacious area for medical care, about 3,000 square feet altogether, and was designed by the builder, Marshall Erdman and Associates of Madison. It will resemble a photograph Dr. Sison saw of the Sun Prairie Medical Building in Sun Prairie, and will be built on a 4.5 acre parcel recently annexed into the village.

Only one of the two levels will be used for a clinic, so that the downstairs can be left unfinished on the interior and rented out as office space, or possibly to another doctor, should one decide to locate in this area.

The exterior will be of dark orange brick, while the interior will be carpeted throughout and will consist of six examination rooms, a minor surgery room, an x-ray room, a pharmacy, two business offices, a spacious waiting room, and a small utility room. The pharmacy will be run commercially, in all probability, so that a druggist will not have to be brought

Lab tests will still be done at St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend because of their excellent facility, but upon the hiring of an x-ray technician, all x-rays can be handled right here.

No decision has yet been finalized on the type of heating to be used, but Dr. Sison noted the "electric probably is cleanest, even though it is becoming costlier." He added that the original plans called for gas heat, which is of course no longer available.

There will be parking for about 30 cars when it is originally completed with room to add more space, if needed later on, possibly after the lower 3,000 feet of office space is put to use. The project is expected to be comter its start, possibly by the beginning of next year.

When the new opens, Dr. Sison and his cousin, Dr. Florizel Castro, both natives of the Phillipines, will continue to run the clinic, and will move from their present location on Fond du Lac Ave. Mrs. Sison is also a licensed physician, but will not resume her practice immediately, instead will continue to serve as an anesthesiologist until that time.

All three doctors took their residencies at the Illinois Medical Center in Chicago, and are presently members of the medical staff of St. Joseph's. The Sisons came to Kewaskum to practice in 1971, and were joined by Dr. Castro this summer. Dr. R. G. Edwards is Kewaskum's other M.D., who has been here for over 40 years, and was recently recognized for his work by the community

Village Given OK on Pond

The written permit should arrive here within the next week, and so the contractors. Board Changes Policy, Grants **Building Permit in Subdivision**

Another policy change was made by the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday as they granted the building permit request of Ray Schaefer for a model home in Ideal Subdivision.

A unanimous vote was recorded on the motion to grant the permit, and there seemed to be no dissention among any

of the board members. No change in the village attorney's advice against issuing any more was noted, but the board chose not to follow it any longer. The stand was taken because they feel that individual families are being hurt by a slowdown in construction, more than Ideal Land or anyone associated

as a joint effort between the school system and the village, and above all, if a pool is built, it should be built indoors and heated so that it can be used year round.

Those who had a pond did not seem to regret their decision, but noted that a proper location for it must be found, so that it does not interfere with other recreational areas, and can receive maximum use. Good lifeguards would also be a great asset, and it may be necessary to change the sand along the edges from time to time. Sand would also be the major cause of turbidity in the water, which would be the mafor drawback as compared to a concrete pool.

'A natural pond does seem to have two significant advantages over a pool, however. First of all, it would only cost about 1/10 as much to build, and secondly there seems to be a general drop in usage in a concrete pool as time passes. In a seven year period, attendance at one pool dropped over 34% to 23,000 uses per year and showed little sign of picking up again. No such trend was noted in ponds.

Once the decision had been reached to begin the actual process of purchasing the land for the parksite, an option was taken on 34 acres owned by Mrs. Viola Spoerl. Prior to that time, an appraisal had been done on it, as well as other sites, and negotiations began to determine a sale price.

In September, 1973, the village board passed a resolution authorizing the Village of Kewaskum to participate in the Outdoor Resources Action Plan (ORAP-200 Local Park Aids) and accepted the findings of the Outdoor Recreation Plan, which had recently been completed by the DNR. This was a necessary step in order for the village to become eligible for state funding.

Negotiations c o n t i n u e d throughout the winter and into the spring of 1974 between the village and Mrs. Spoerl on a purchase price for the site and a mutually beneficial method of payment. The option expired on June 2, so a new one had to be taken out at that time, since both parties were still interested in completing the transaction.

Simultaneously, the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum was contacted to see if they would be interested in donating any funds to the village for the purpose of aiding in the completion of the park. They agreed to do this without any stipulations as to how the money would be spent, and in appreciation, it was agreed that the village would name the new facility the "Kewas-kum Kiwanis Park." In December, 1974 a check was received by the village for \$77,000 as was agreed, and was added to the park fund.

By that time, some of the problems had been ironed out between the village and Mrs. Spoerl, and a purchase price of \$76,007.80 was agreed upon. When it looked like this would be the site that would eventually be purchased, the process of selecting an architect began, and many replies from various firms were received. In the end, Arthur and Associates of Fond du Lac was felt to be the best firm for the job, and was hired in the spring of 1975.

On December 18, 1974, the Kewaskum Village Board, by a 7-0 vote exercised the option held on the 34 acres owned by Mrs. Spoerl at a cost of \$76,007.80. An application for funding the land acquisition had been previously filed with the State of Wisconsin under the ORAP program, so the cancelled check was copied and the copy was mailed to them as proof that the land had actu-

ally been purchased, so that funding could be received. No funds are allotted under this plan, until the item in question is completely paid for; only then does the program reimburse the local government for between 10 and 65% of their cost.

At this point, the task became to find out what facilities would be best suited for Kewaskum's special recreational needs. The engineer began working closely with the village board and the Kewaskum Plan Commission in trying to find out which facilities should be included, rejected, or thought about for the park, and if included, discussed where it should be located within the site.

Special attention was given to plans for the pond, since "it had the number one priority," so plans for it were completed before all the others. Once the location and shape were decided upon, test borings had to be taken to determine whether or not the soil in the area could support the pond. They were done in August, 1975 by J. Roger Miller and Company of Sheboygan, and again in August, 1976 by the Soil Conservation Service. This same month, the funding check was received from Madison in the amount of \$28,502.92, which was exactly half of the appraised value of the land, instead of its purchase price.

The detailed plans for the pond and bathhouse were ready by July, 1976 and were approved by the village board with minor corrections at that time. At present, the permit has not yet been received to use the pond, but no serious delay is anticipated. The pond will be dug as soon as the per-

mit is received.

Washovick Construction Company of Green Lake was awarded the excavation bid on the pond for \$39,924.40, and will begin its work as soon as the permit is received. Cost estimate for the remainder of the park, which includes four tennis courts, six horseshoe pits, two softball diamonds, a bathhouse, service drive, entrance sign. lighting, playground equipment, and two basketball courts, will total around \$325,000 when completed in the future.



Lynn Roethke, a 15-yearold girl from West Bend, participated in the judo competition of the 1976 United States Junior Olympics held in Memphis, Tenn.

Lynn was the only judo competitor from Wisconsin and captured a first place gold medal in the 111 to 130 pound division. Roethke is the only Wisconsinite to ever win a first place national title in judo.

Winning all five matches with full point "Ippon" wins, Lynn proved her skill in her first match with a six second morota - seionage (two-arm shoulder throw). This was the fastest throw of the tournament.

To qualify for the National Junior Olympics, Lynn won first place in the Wisconsin State and Midwest Regional Events for 1976.

Lynn belongs to the West Bend Judo Club and is instructed by Jon and Joe Sanfilippo, both holders of the Black Belt rank of Kodokan Judo.

When asked about her future plans, Lynn stated, "I want to work and practice so I am good enough to participate in the 1980 World Olympic Games in Russia."

Defense Leads Indians to 15-0 Win Over North Fondy in Opener

Kewaskum turned two blocked punts in the second half into touchdowns Friday night to blank North Fondy in their non-conference opener on the Orioles' field, 15-0.

The Indians scored just two running plays after the first blocked punt early in the third quarter and then recovered the second blocked punt in the end zone in the fourth quarter for a touchdown

Before the blocked punts, the Orioles, who were annihilated by Kewaskum's Scenic champs last year, 40-12, held their own against the favored Indians on a hot night

The game seemed to turn around in the second quarter when Kewaskum stopped the Orioles on the eight yard line on a couple of big losses. Wingback Jim Lundwall lost 10 yards to the Kewaskum 18 and two plays later quarterback Rick Behnke lost 8 more yards trying to pass on fourth down. Kewaskum. which kept the heat on Behnke all night and threw him for 37 yards in losses attempting to pass, collared the Oriole quarterback on the Kewaskum 26-yard line to end the threat.

Tackle Gary Gavin, allconference last year, was a thorn in Fondy's side all night with his hard pass rush, and Russ Herriges nailed Behnke on the fourth down play.

Another Oriole threat was stopped in the second quarter when a Behnke pass was intercepted by Kewaskum's Lowell Bunkelman on the Indian 30-yard line.

With the defense holding the fort in a scoreless first half, the Indians snapped out of it in the second half when they controlled play. After stopping North Fondy cold in the first series of the second half, the Indians swarmed in to block Scott Parker's punt. They got the ball on the Oriole's 11-yard line (recovered by Mike Perkins) and needed just two plays to

score

Halfback Wayne Endlich who led all rushers with 67 yards in 11 carries, carried twice. He zipped five yards on his first carry and then scampered the remaining six yards for the TD, which came only 2½ minutes into the third quarter.

Quarterback Paul Brenholt who kicked the extra point after Kewaskum's second touchdown, ran this one in for the two-point conversion on a pitchout from Al Jacger, to put the Indians up, 8.0

In the fourth quarter, Kewaskum backed the Orioles to their one-yard line. A furious Indian rush resulted in another blocked punt, and Herriges fell on the ball in the end zone for the score.

With Endlich. Greg Eichstedt and Ray Reindl eating up yards on the ground, the insurance TD gave the Indians all the breathing room they needed. Reindl, who had a 20-yard run down to the Oriole 1-yard line called back by a clip in the third quarter, and Eichstedt carried for 57 and 52 yards respectively.

North Fondy's attack fizzled when soph Pete Braatz, who gained 51 yards, left the game with an injury. Another Oriole starter, Jeff LeMieux, sat out the second half with strained ligaments in his knee.

The Indians were flat in the first half. The reserves drove to the North Fondy 14-yard line again at the game's end. Gavin had 4 solo tackles and 20 assists and Perkins 8 solos, 2 assists and 2 fumble recoveries.
