500 Turkeys Taken at Shoot Sunday

Ideal weather helped make the Kewaskum Kiwanis Turkey Shoot at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday an outstanding success. The attendance was estimated to be the largest since the club had to stop using live birds as targets.

The club expects to gross over \$13,000, but the exact amount cannot be determined at this time as advance ticket sales have not all been turned

in. Five hundred frozen turkeys were awarded sportsmen in different categories at the shoot. The frozen birds averaged 11 lbs. each. About 200 trout were caught in the trout pond by anglers of all ages.

Food sales were excellent with both the brats and hamburgers being sold out and all other stands noted increased sales. Bargain hun-

ters managed to buy a full truckload of Regal cookware.

Ed Odermann of West Bend caught the largest trout which was 15 1/4 inches. For his efforts he received a Regal Ware set of cookware and a \$5.00 gift certificate from the Hide-A-Way Trout Farm, Beechwood, who supplied the trout.

Ideal Again Main Topic at Board Meeting

The Kewaskum Village Board met on Tuesday Sept. 8. Main topic of the meeting was the Ideal Land Subdivision.

The previous week the board had granted a building permit to Ray Schaefer, a West Bend builder, who had appeared at earlier meetings requesting a permit to build a model home. His former requests had been denied. After granting Schaefer his permit, the board at the Sept. 8 meeting tabled another permit application until meeting with the village attorney.

Two meetings with Ideal officials were set and each meeting was cancelled by Ideal. Trustee Dan Schmidt suggested inviting Ideal officials to the board meeting on Sept. 20 to clear up some facts contained in a letter from Ideal regarding litigation if the village did not return money by Sept. 1. When the Sept. 1 deadline arrived village employees stated that items in the subdivision still were not completed and Attorney Roger McKenna recommended the board not issue any permits.

An official of Ideal stated that if they do not receive their money in the next week or so Ideal will be suing for the money and damages.

This issue should come to some conclusion at the Sept. 20 meeting of the board.

Only 203 Votes Cast In Village

Only 203 voters turned out in Tuesday's Primary Election in the village to cast their ballots.

The only opposition on the ballot was in the race for Clerk of Circuit Court of Washington County on the Republican ticket where there was four candidates seeking the nomination.

Jon Sanfilippo won the nomination in the county with 1,802 votes. He will face Democratic candidate Dorothy A. Sieber in November. Dolores Hansen placed second with 1,573 votes, Mary K. Charland third with 1,215 and William Lane fourth with 504.

Position Terminated by School Board; Teacher Granted Release

At its meeting Monday evening, the Kewaskum School Board took the question of wages for non-certificated personnel to a closed session at the suggestion of the committee appointed to this area. They also tabled the question of reconsideration of the request that the psychologist and social worker be represented by the Kewaskum Education Association. More information was wanted concerning this. As a result, the meeting lasted a little over half an hour as the board ran through a number of more routine agenda items.

There were a number of personnel and position changes which were approved. The half-time position of Services Manager was terminated effective at the end of September. This position is held by Jack Sutton. The board approved transfer of that budget amount to the secretarial-clerical account and authorized a part-time secretarial position. Mr. Carpenter, English teacher at the high school, asked for and was granted a release from his contract to accept a position outside of education. The vote on this was 4-1 as Richard Theusch voted not to approve the release. In order to

speed the behind-the-wheel instruction for students, Guy Bohman was approved to pick up some of this assignment.

The board cancelled the Sept. 27 meeting, but recognized a special meeting will be needed at some point to take action on pending items of business.

A transportation contract was approved for \$40.00 for one-way parent transportation of a kindergarten student at St. Lucas.

Diplomas were approved for three persons who have earned enough credits since leaving school to earn the diplomas. The three were Richard Eichstedt, Thomas Herman, and Darwin Tackes.

The board went into closed session following the regular meeting to discuss compensation of non-certificated employees.

MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

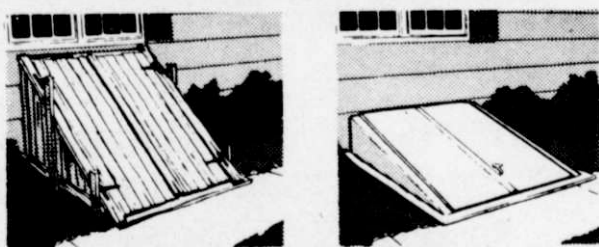
Called Meeting

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Retirement Benefits for Volunteer Firemen Sought by Candidate Bowman

Former Green Bay Packer Ken Bowman, Democrat candidate for the 2nd State Senate seat, called for passage of a measure which would provide at least minimal retirement assistance for persons who give of their time and effort as volunteer firemen. Speaking with and soliciting the views of hundreds of voters during the long Labor Day week-end, Bowman pointed to this long overdue piece of legislation as another example of callous government inaction.

Speaking with a group of persons in the Camobellsport area, Bowman said:

"Modern State Government seems not to be able to remain in touch with the little people, the hard working people who contribute so much to the common well-being. For years, attempts have been made to pass legislation which would provide a vehicle for minimal retirement benefits to persons who

have served as volunteer firemen for at least 15 years. These little people have not had enough influence to see the legislation passed. If it were not for these people who give of themselves freely in this dangerous job, the state and local governments would have to provide the service at an astronomical cost. We ought to applaud and encourage this type of public service. Short sighted penny pinching will only cost all of much more if we have to not only fund a retirement plan for new regular fire departments, but also pay them a fair living wage to do a job that is now being done by volunteers."

Emergency Fire Regulations in Effect in State

MADISON, WIS.—Department of Natural Resources Secretary, Anthony S. Earl, announced that the Department placed emergency fire regulations in effect in all fire control areas in Wisconsin beginning at midnight, Friday, Sept. 10.

In commenting on the regulations, which place severe restrictions on the use of fire in the outdoors, Earl said, "The very serious fire conditions existing throughout the state because of the dry weather, and the opening of some of our hunting seasons, which bring more people into the outdoors, make this move imperative in order to reduce the danger of wildfires and to protect lives of our citizens and their property."

The emergency fire regulations will be in effect in portions of, or all of, a total of 43 counties where the DNR has authority to impose the restrictions.

The emergency regulations provide the following:

—1. No smoking is permitted except in places of habitation or authorized improved campgrounds or in automobiles or vehicles operating on state or county highways. Such vehicles must be equipped with an inside receptacle to serve as ash container. Also no matches, ashes, burning tobacco or other burning material shall be thrown from any vehicle within the fire control area.

—2. No campfires shall be built in any manner except as authorized, improved campgrounds or other places of habitation unless by special permit from a duly appointed area forest ranger.

—3. No brush or trash burning will be allowed outdoors by anyone unless a special permit is obtained from a duly authorized area forest ranger or other person delegated similar authority by the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board.

Earl said, "Last May we found it necessary to impose

emergency fire regulations in several northwestern counties of the state for a period of time because of hazardous fire conditions, and we received excellent cooperation from the public in complying with the fire restrictions. As a result we did not have any serious fires in the restricted area while the regulations were in effect."

Earl pointed out that similar restrictions will be in effect on the Chequamegon and Nicolet National Forests in Wisconsin by order of the U. S. Forest Service Eastern Regional Forester, Steve Yurich.

The emergency fire regulations will affect all of the counties of Douglas, Bayfield, Ashland, Iron, Vilas, Forest, Florence, Marinette, Washburn, Sawyer, Rusk, Taylor, Price, Oneida, Lincoln, Langlade, Menominee, Portage, Adams, Waupaca, Waushara, Marquette, Green Lake, Columbia, Sauk, Richland and Crawford. It will also be in effect in portions of Polk,

Barron, Chippewa, Marathon, Oconto, Wood, Juneau, Dane, Iowa, Grant, Monroe, Jackson, Clark, Eau Claire and Shawano Counties.

Earl said the affected areas are being posted by DNR personnel, and further information on the emergency fire regulations may be obtained from any DNR office.

Noting that several peat fires are now burning in the state, Earl concluded by saying, "The threat of wildfires exists throughout the entire state of Wisconsin, and in those areas where the Department does not have the authority to impose the emergency fire regulations, I ask all citizens to cooperate with us and their townships in restricting their use of fire in the outdoors."

The regulations do not apply within the corporate limits of cities and villages.

The emergency fire regulations are in effect in the shaded areas of the map below.

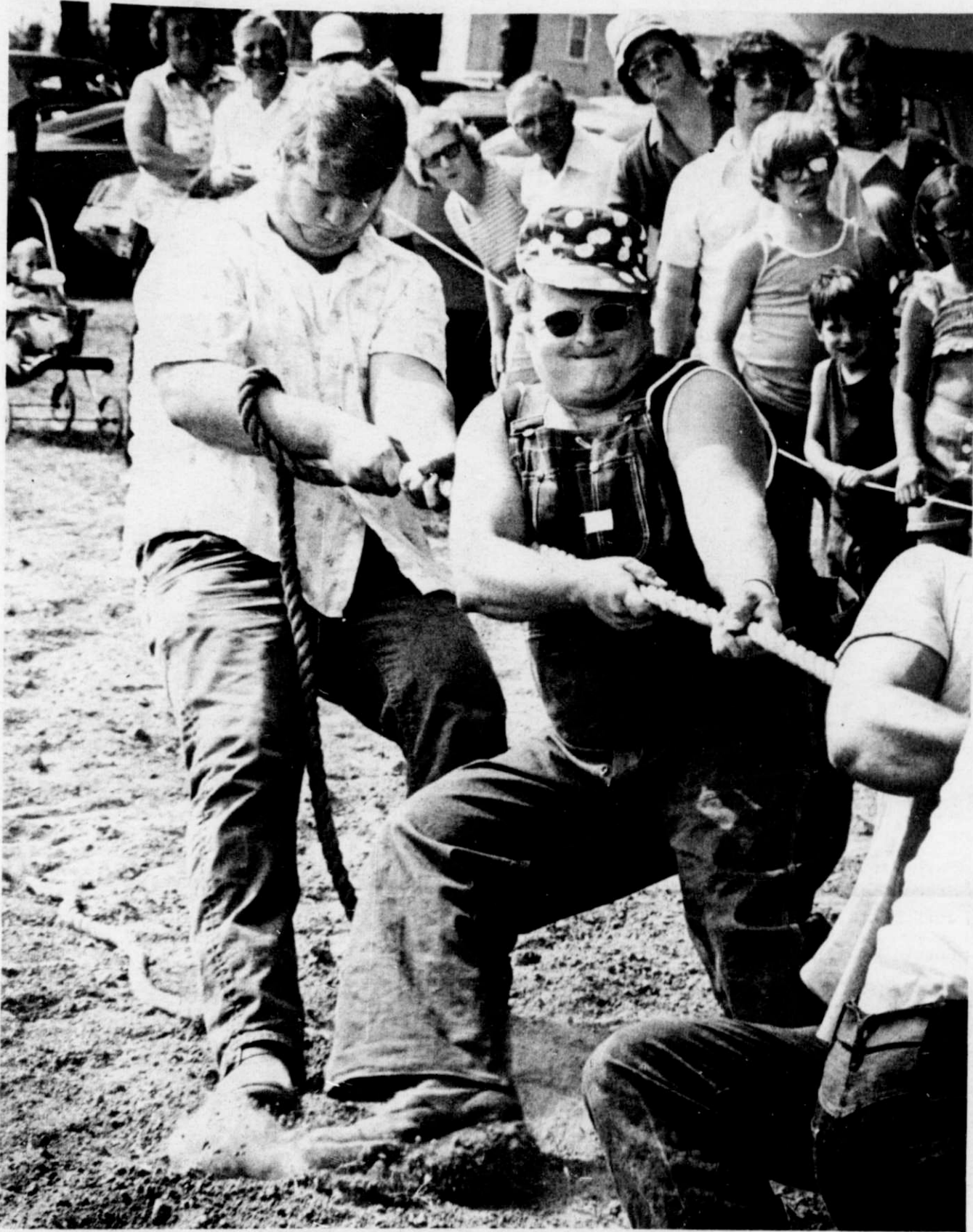
