## Area Man Killed in Truck Crash

A rural Campbellsport man was killed Friday afternoon in Port Washington when a dump truck he was driving, loaded with 20 tons of asphalt, went out of control and collided with three cars before striking an elm tree.

Norbert W. "Cheesie" Wondra, 57, of R. 3, Campbellsport, a truck driver for Henry Timblin Trucking of Kewaskum, was pronounced dead at the scene shortly after the accident at 1:42 p. m. on Highway 32 near the intersection of Moore Rd., according to Port Washington Police Chief Edward Rudolph.

The dump truck tipped over, spilling the asphalt and creating a traffic jam that took nearly four hours to unsnarl, Rudolph said.

According to witnesses, it appeared the truck driver was experiencing mechanical failure and was attempting to downshift. Police were continuing an investigation of the accident.

The dump truck cab was crushed when it struck the tree, pinning Wondra inside. The Port Washington Fire Department was called to pry the body free, Rudolph said.

There were no other injuries reported.

Funeral services for Wondra were held at 10:45 a. m. Monday at the Twohig Funeral Home, Campbellsport, and at 11:15 a. m. at St. Matthew's Catholic Church. The Rev. Victor Klemmer officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery. Visitation was held after 3 p. m. Sunday at the funeral home.

He was born May 12, 1919, in Campbellsport, the son of Herman and Mary Theisen Wondra. He married the former Agnes Worzalla on July 19, 1944, in Milwaukee.

He is survived by his mother of Fond du Lac; his widow; one daughter, Mrs. Michael (Jane) Brath, Jr. of R. 1, Campbellsport; four grandchildren; six brothers, Carroll, Herman and Alfred, all of rural Campbellsport, James and Andrew, both of Burlington, Iowa; six sisters, Mrs. Sy (Olive) Berger of Brownsville, Mrs. Tony (Marie) Rinzel of Poynette, Mrs. Milton (Adelia) Krueger of Fond du Lac, Mrs. Ruben (Petronella) Kaiser of Beaver Dam, Mrs. Edwin (Berradette) Hankes, also of Beaver Dam, and Mrs. Oliver (Yvonne) Kuen of Fond du Lac.

Mr. Wondra's father, one son and one sister preceded him in death.

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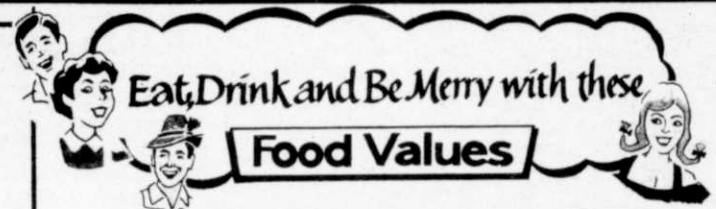

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## 'YARNS OF YESTERYEAR'

The following article was written by Reuben Backhaus, R. 2, Campbellsport, and entered in the 1975 Yarns of Yesteryear Contest sponsored by University of Wisconsin - Extension. More than 650 other contestants from 270 communities in Wisconsin sent in their reminiscences, essays, research articles and poetry. The entire collection has been xeroxed and placed on permanent file in the archives of the Wisconsin Academy of Sciences, Arts and Letters. Backhaus was awarded a certificate acknowledging his participation.

"I was born in the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, in the Kettle Moraine in 1895 when Kewaskum Village had 400 people. It had 3 churches, 5 stores, 12 taverns, 5 blacksmith shops, 2 butcher shops, 3 doctors, 2 dentists, 2 harness makers, a hat shop, a creamery, a malt house, 2 hardware stores, 2 barbers, a baker, a drug store, 2 shoe stores, a weekly newspaper, a photographer, a barrel maker, a flour and feed mill, 4 car dealers, a bank, a jeweler and 2 undertakers. These were all privately owned and all made a good living and were all run on competition.

Today there are still 3 churches, 3 chain stores, 7 taverns, a giant milk concern, one car dealer, 4 filling stations, a chain bank, electric store, an aluminum factory, malt house, a weekly newspaper, an appliance store, a jeweler, 2 doctors, one dentist, several beauty salons, one undertaker, a furniture store, 2 restaurants, 2 feed mills, a picture studio and one shoe store, and there are 2500 people.

In those days everybody knew each other. There was no talk of money or hard times. Everybody had money to spend and welfare was unknown.

We had one room schools where we were taught reading, writing and arithmetic, geography, history and spelling. I walked 1½ miles, sometimes through deep snow.

The generation grew up very successful in their lives. They lived mostly on small

farms, had no money problems. They had their smokehouse filled with hams, sausage, lots of fried down meat and salt pork and lots of kraut and vegetables.

The older people had house parties where every birthday was celebrated with a few kegs of beer and an accordion for music, to which they danced, and beer was 75c a keg.

In winter they made their firewood with bees. Neighbors would help each other have their bees and at supper time they were served with all the goodies on hand. They had corn husking bees and at threshing time farmers all got together till it was done.

Our streams were full of good fish. You could catch enough in an hour for several meals. Today they are so contaminated its impossible to catch any, less eat them.

Our high school had two teachers who taught only academics from 9 a. m. till 4 p. m. I still feel we learned more than they do today. When I talk to high school graduates today, I find they learned less than we did on subjects that affect later life. Drugs were unknown in those days.

I taught a one room school, 37 children in 8 grades and my salary was 25c per hour. Had to pay board and had \$160 left at the end of the year. A lot of money at the time.

I got my first car, a 1914 Model T Ford. It made 30 miles to a gallon of gas at 12c per gallon on ground and rough gravel roads. What would it make today on blacktop roads? The license was \$5 per year and no driver's license was needed.

I would have one dollar in my pocket, pick up my girl, pay 25c to dance all night. Ladies were free. We had 5 beers and would come home with 25c in my pocket.

The golden age of this country was before World War One. We had no public debt, national, state, county or school, and you had no complaining about taxes.

There was no shoplifting as most things were sold in bulk. Today it is as it is, all in packages which is too tempting to fill pockets or purses with goods.

We seldom heard of crimes as there was no poverty and

people were satisfied with their lot in life. No women worked in factories and mothers were home with their family and home was home, as it should be. But when millions of our boys went to war women had to take over the jobs and family life has not been the same since.

The effect of the war was not felt till 1929 when the crash came, caused by monopolies created by the war. Up to that time you never heard of strikes or labor unrest.

So as I look back and think how peaceful and satisfied people were in those days and how today we are worried over crimes, taxes and inflation that could wipe out our life savings, I know life

was happier in those days than today.

In those days the doctor came to your home day or night. Today when you call a doctor he tells you he is booked up for a whole week. He tells you to go to the hospital for every little ailment and we all know this is expensive today.

In those days parents kept their mother and fathers, even grandparents in their home till they died happy in their homes. Today most old people are forced to go to old folks homes, who usually get the last dollar they saved. I was 35 years old before I

saw my first wheel chair, so what has the world come to?

In order to be able to compare the golden years from 1900 till 1930 you must be 80 years or older."

The land upon which the shelter will be built is located on Hy. 60 and Scenic Road between Hy. 45 and Hy. 41 in the Town of Polk. This land was purchased with the aid of voluntary contributions. The group itself consists entirely of unpaid volunteers as a service to the Washington County Community.

Many local and state dignitaries have been invited to attend this ceremony. The symbolic ground-breaking will mark another milestone for the dedicated volunteers of the Washington County Humane Society who gathered 9 years ago on a winter evening. There were 26 people. Speaker at the ground-breaking will be Congressman Bob Kasten who has encouraged humane work and public service before and during his career in government service. ## Two New Teacher Contracts Approved by Board of Education

Two new teacher contracts were approved at the meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education held Monday night. Nancy Caldwell was hired to take the English position at the high school left vacant by Mr. Carpenter's resignation. Diane Bahr will teach the newly created pre-school special education class.

A graduate of Illinois State University of Normal, Ill., Nancy Caldwell has three years of teaching experience. She will direct forensics in addition to her teaching duties. Diane Bahr is a graduate of Cardinal Stritch College. This will be her first teaching assignment.

Wage rates were set for all cooks. This was delayed at the request of the board committee until they could get back to staff members who had contacted them prior to the meeting. Major changes include elimination of fringe benefits of holiday and vacation pay from part-time positions. Wages were adjusted upward to reflect this fringe benefit loss. Wage increases will total between 7 and 8 percent.

The board approved a KEA request, inclusion of the social worker as a member of the bargaining unit. This passed 4-1, with Byron Gessner casting the no vote. On a vote on the same request concerning the school psychologist, the motion to agree to his membership was de-

feated when the vote was tied 3 - 3. Jim Oelhafen, Byron Gessner and Dr. Ogi voted against, while Tom Gundrum, Jerry Secor and Rich Theusch voted in favor.

Tentative withdrawal from State Life Insurance Plan was approved. Because of time limitations it is necessary to give notice now. Investigation will be made of the other plans before the end of December. During that time, the board may, if it wishes, decide to stay in the state plan which is presently in effect.

In other business, the board approved a transportation contract for Mrs. Merwin and approved placement of Dale Squier on the "F" column of the teacher salary schedule effective last year. This placement comes as a result of an arbitration hearing. The board went into executive session following the meeting to discuss a student question.

## Kewaskum Cage Star Clark Eichstedt Named Player-Coach of British Basketball Team

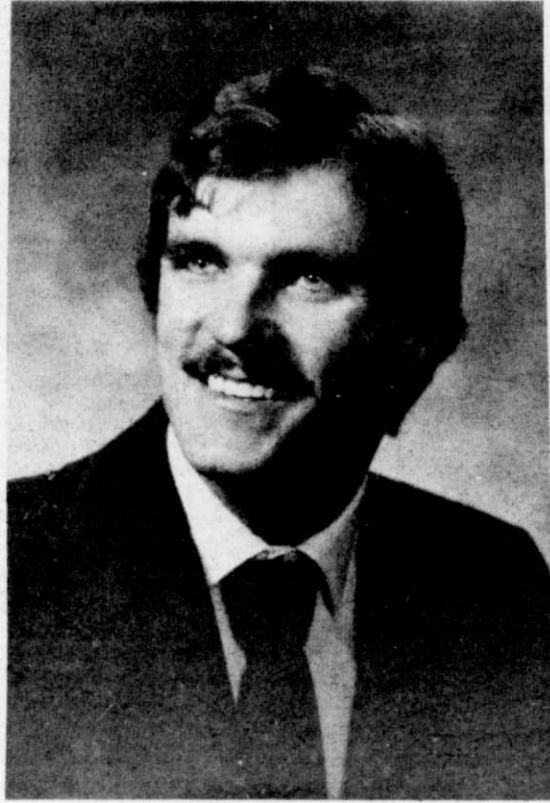

## Mayville Jinx Prevails As Indians Are Edged in 7-6 Upset for 1st Loss

Kewaskum just can't win at Mayville (they never have) and the jinx continued Friday night when they were upset in a tough one, 7-6. It was the first loss of the season for the Indians after four straight victories and believe it or not the Cardinals had not won a game. They were 0-3, but the record book goes sailing out the window when these arch-rivals meet.

It wasn't Kewaskum's night. The Indians fumbled the opening kickoff, which was an indication of things to come. Kewaskum couldn't put anything together. They fumbled, had a pass intercepted, a punt blocked (which led to Mayville's only score of the game). Two or three times running back Ray Reindl broke into the clear. Bruce Muche converted on what later proved to be the game-winning point.

The Cardinals were now up emotionally and sustained another first quarter drive which continued into the second period. The drive continued to the Kewaskum one where the Indians held as Russ Herriges and Jim Donath stopped a fourth down play behind the line of scrimmage.

The closest the Indians could come before halftime was the Mayville 25 and it ended 7-0. The Indians put on their scoring drive late in the third quarter, moving deep into Cardinal territory. On the third play of the last quarter fullback Greg Eichstedt ripped through the

middle from eight yards out for the score. They decided to go for a two point conversion and the lead but the ball was fumbled on an attempted option run and dropped leaving the score at 7-6. Had the ball been caught the ball carrier was in the clear.

Then Mayville put on its only drive of the second half which moved to the Kewaskum 17 but the Indians again held. At this point Kewaskum put on a drive and strung up three first downs in a row, but Al Jaeger fumbled and Dan Pilsner recovered at midfield. The Cardinals were unable to move and the Indians took over on their own 17 for one last attempt with 1½ minutes remaining. The Indians picked up two first downs to their own 40 when a Jaeger pass was intercepted by Lee Bonack to end the threat as Mayville then ran out the clock.

Kewaskum outgained Mayville, 219 yards gained to 162, and Reindl was tops with 13 carries for 107 yards. But the final score read 7-6 Mayville.

In other games Friday Hartland (2-0) beat Kettle Moraine, 20-8, and Germantown also made it 2-0 by defeating Slinger, 28-22. In a Saturday afternoon contest, Grafton buried Pewaukee, 49-0.

This Friday night at 7:30 Kewaskum hosts unbeaten Germantown which is tied for first with Hartland, both 2-0.
