Excavation for Park Pond Begins



Excavation for the new Kewaskum Kiwanis Park pond began Monday morning. The 1.2 acre area designated for the pond site, is located just west of the village.

Washkovick Construction of Green Lake moved their heavy equipment, including

two caterpillars and a bulldozer, to the site and a short time later were in the process of scraping topsoil and ground.

Washovick had set a 100-day completion limit in his bid but it is felt it will not take that long to complete the

job.

Markers showed the outline for deep and shallow ends of the pond. The architects, Arthur and Associates of Fond du Lac, were expected to come to Kewaskum this week to discuss the exact slope of the pond bottom so the workers could go ahead without further delay.

The cost for the pond itself will be just under \$26,000 including sand, excavation, overfill and drain pipes.

Swine Flu Immunization Clinics To Begin in County Next Week

Washington County residents will start "rolling up their sleeves" for swine flu shots the week of Oct. 18, County Health Nurse Delores P. Harder said today as she announced immunization plans.

Because of many revisions along the way, the plans have been changed a number of times, she said, adding "It's most frustrating."

But the first clinics are now scheduled, with the target population being high-risk individuals. Hartford and West Bend will be the only clinic locations, she said.

The Hartford clinic for those over 60 and high-risk adults between 25 and 60, will be held at the Lincoln Elementary School cafeteria (use south entrance only) Oct. 23, from 1-5 p.m.

The West Bend clinic for those groups will be held at Silverbrook School cafeteria Oct. 24, from 1-5 p.m.

Only bivalent vaccine will be offered at the first clinics. The bivalent vaccine offers protection for Swine flu and A/Victoria flu and is ONLY for those adults with chronic illness and/or over 60 years of age.

Any adult with: 1. Chronic broncho pulmonary disease; 2. heart disease, 3. diabetes mellitus, 4. other chronic metabolic diseases, 5. chronic central nervous system disease, or 6. chronic renal disease, is to have bivalent vaccine. All persons over 60 years of age should also receive bivalent vaccine.

Children from age 3-17 with chronic illness are eligible to receive bivalent vaccine, but there are no recommendations for normal healthy children at this time.

High risk children and young adults age 18-24 with chronic diseases have special vaccine requirements. A clinic for them will be held Oct. 21, at Lincoln School cafeteria, Hartford, 3:30-6:30 p.m. and Oct. 22 at Silverbrook School, 3:30-6:30 p.m.

Only children and young adults with chronic illness will be immunized at these clinics and will require a second immunization, one month later, for adequate protection.

High risk children are those with: 1. chronic pulmonary diseases, 2. heart disease, 3. chronic renal disease, 4. diabetes and other chronic metabolic disease, or 5. chronic neuromuscular disorders.

Those with malignancies and immuno-deficient states should be immunized by their physician.

Monovalent vaccine will be offered at future clinics in Washington County as vaccine becomes available. Monovalent vaccine is for administration to the general population aged 18-59 and provides protection against Swine flu.

Vaccine will come to Washington County in limited

\$360,000 Park Referendum to Be Voted on in Village Nov. 2

Wording of the resolution to appear on the November 2 ballot was the purpose of a special meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board Wednesday, Oct. 6, at 7 p. m.

Village attorney Roger McKenna appeared and was upset about the fact that his office was called Wednesday morning to prepare for the resolution and he did not feel it was fair for his office to receive such late notice to draft such important papers. Charles Miller informed him he had tried reaching him Tuesday morning but to no avail.

McKenna's recommendation was to contact Quarles & Brady Law Firm in Milwaukee, who specialize in preparing resolutions for bond issues. They would then prepare the resolution to be placed on the November ballot. He felt if he contacted them on the 7th they would have the resolution ready by Monday and a special meeting would have to be called as the resolution has to appear in print two consecutive weeks before the election date.

The board's decision was to go along with McKenna's recommendation. The resolution will be for a bond issue of \$360,000.00 which includes all park improvements and facilities including pond e-

quipment, such as diving board, raft, fencing, etc., but does not include the pond itself, which has funds already set aside in the park fund.

The board then adjourned to executive session to discuss police salary negotiations and the summons received from Ideal Land Corp. The village had until Tuesday, the 12th, to answer the summons or face litigation.

A unanimous vote by the village board at another special meeting on Monday evening, Oct. 11, resulted in the adoption of a resolution, namely, "shall Village of Kewaskum borrow an amount not to exceed \$360,000.00 in the form of general obligation bonds or promissory notes to be used for park improvements and purchase and installation of equipment." This resolution will be placed on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Roger McKenna, Village Attorney, appeared at the meeting to explain the resolution to the board. McKenna asked the board members, "as a citizen I would like to know if the \$360,000.00 is what is needed and if this amount covers lighting." Dan Schmidt answered that this is the amount needed to finish the work the park committee has planned but does not cover lighting at the ball dia-

Dole's Daughter to Visit Kewaskum With Ford Caravan

Robin Dole, daughter of the Vice-presidential candidate Robert Dole, will accompany the caravan of cars in the "Take Ford to the People" program that is traveling through rural towns of Wisconsin, Saturday, October 16.

The caravan will reach Kewaskum at approximately 11:35 o'clock.

The day long effort is designed to establish Neighborhood Home Headquarters and to answer voters' questions in rural areas not normally reached in a national campaign.

According to Warren P. Knowles, Chairman of the Wisconsin President Ford Committee, "Take Ford to the People is an integral part of our national campaign strategy and is being manned by hundreds of dedicated Ford volunteers. This unusual grass roots effort provides us with the opportunity to share President Ford's record with thousands of Wisconsin voters."

Along with traditional rallies and canvassing, the caravan will distribute bumper stickers, buttons, and brochures; and set up lawn signs, banners and posters.

Another Teaching Position OK'd; Vacancy on Board to Be Filled

Another third grade teaching position was approved for the Kewaskum Elementary School at the Monday meeting of the Board of Education. The question was raised at the meeting because enrollment has increased at the third grade level from what was anticipated in July and August. Enrollments have reached 33 per class with added students and with some children from special classes being assigned part time to those classes.

The board accepted the fuel oil bid from Condon Oil Co. of Ripon. The bid was not firm, but will go up or down from a base of 38.9c per gallon. The bid was for 36.9c for tankwagon deliveries and 32.92c for transport deliveries.

A slightly revised budget proposal was approved. Expenditures approved were up \$15,200, while the levy was up \$10,069. The tax rate is down 27c from that estimated in July. The July figure was 13.167 mills. The final equalized valuation figure is

higher than expected, and will result in a levy rate of 12.8983 mills. The budget is approximately \$5,000 under the state imposed spending limitations.

A discussion was held on a request by a family from the village to have their kindergarten child transported. They expressed their willingness to pay costs. No action was taken.

The board decided to mail a special notice to residents of the district indicating there is a vacancy on the board and that the board will be appointing someone to fill the position. Those interested in being considered for appointment will be asked to submit a statement indicating their interest, along with a resume of their background and a statement of their educational views.

In other business, the board approved final non-certificated wage rates, the purchase of draperies for the new area in the Farmington School, and then adjourned to closed session to discuss negotiations.


Two different votes were taken by the board, one for adoption of the resolution and one for placing it on the ballot.

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Ruths Receive Forestry Award

George Haase, chairman of the Fond du Lac County Soil and Water Conservation District Committee, presented plaques to the outstanding cooperators and outstanding tree farmer at a recent R. 1, Mount Calvary, meeting.

Norman and Jerome Loehr of R. 1, Mount Calvary, were recognized for their work in adopting a sound land use program for their farms and promoting the importance of the conservation of our natural resources. This year's recipient of the forestry award, Mr. and Mrs. William Ruth of R. 2, Campbellsport, have been cooperators with the Fond du Lac SWCD for over 20 years.

In 1957, the first tree

plants were done by the Ruths with the intention of eventually planting the entire farm to trees. Many practices were implemented to turn marginal land into a haven for wildlife, a profitable tree farm and beautiful place to live. A wildlife pond was constructed in 1963. Openings were left in the plantation for wildlife and the perimeter was planted to multiflora

rose. Access roads are maintained by disking and prunings improve the quality of the stand and control disease. Trees from the farm are donated to area churches at Christmas time.

amounts on a weekly basis and additional clinics will be established as the adequate vaccine arrives. Times and dates will be published in all Washington County newspapers and announced on local radio stations.

Vaccine may not be administered to those persons who are allergic to eggs or have an elevated temperature on the day of the clinic.

Those attending the flu vaccine clinics will be required to complete a consent form prior to immunization. Registered nurses will also be available to answer questions regarding the vaccine. The immunizations will be administered by public health nurses from the Washington County Community Health Nursing Service and the West Bend Health Department using a high pressure injection gun.

For further information, Washington County residents may call the Community Health Nursing Service, 334-3491, Ext. 261, or 342-2929.

Harder emphasized that normally healthy persons should wait until their clinics are set and announced. To come in earlier "would be taking it away from somebody who's a high risk," she said.

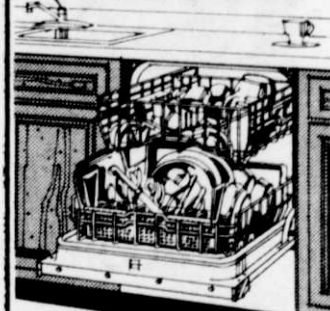



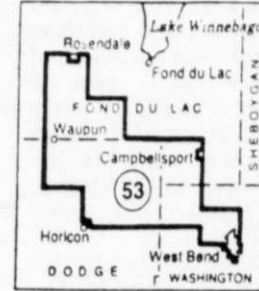

Grafton Grinds Out 14-0 Win Over Indians; First in 7 Years

For the first time in seven years, second place Grafton finally defeated Kewaskum here Friday night, 14-0. It was the third straight loss for the crippled Indians, with five players at eight starting positions out with injuries, who are now 1-3 in Scenic and 4-3 overall.

In a relentless ground attack, Grafton's Dave Brewster and Todd Gundrum ran over the Indians. Brewster scored both touchdowns, on 1 and 3 yard runs in the first and third quarters, as he rushed for 111 yards in 21 carries. Gundrum gained 208 yards in 36 trips. Sophomore Mike Schaub, moved up to the varsity due to all the injuries, led the Indians with 45 yards rushing.

Brewster and Gundrum led a Grafton offense that netted 325 yards and picked up 24 first downs to Kewaskum's 5. The defense, led by middle linebacker Dave Levenick and end Mike Lemirande, held Kewaskum to 18 yards in the first half and 102 for the game.

Grafton took the opening kickoff and marched it 60 yards in 14 plays to score their first touchdown with 6:23 left in the first quarter to start out a long night for the Indians. Showing little offense in the initial quarter, Kewaskum was forced to punt twice and failed to gain a first down.

In the second quarter the Blackhawks moved to the Kewaskum one yard line but a 5-yard penalty and a 3-yard loss by quarterback Greg Merchen moved them back to the 9. They tried for a 23-yard field goal but missed.

The Indians picked up one first down in the second quarter on a pass play, Al Jaeger to Randy White. They came out in the second half with two first downs after taking the kickoff but that ended the drive. A 6-yard loss on a bad pitchout forced them to punt. Grafton took over on the 15 and put together an 85-yard drive for their second score in 16 plays by Brewster.

Grafton had two more drives in the last quarter but fumbled on both with Kewaskum's Gary Gavin and John Bemis recovering. The Indians crossed over into Grafton territory only twice during the game and never got within the Grafton 40-yard line. One thing, the Indians moved the football better than many teams had done against Grafton.

Mike Perkins, Mike Schaub and Randy White came up with good performances offensively, according to Coach Joe Harlow. He also said the defense did pretty well in view of all the injuries in the backfield.

In the Scenic game of the week, Hartland (6-0), which is rated first in the state among Class A schools in the WIAA grid ratings, blanked previously unbeaten German town in the big one, 10-0, to

take over undisputed first place. In other contests Mayville shaded Kettle Moraine, 10-8, and Slinger beat last place Pewaukee, 20-7.

This Friday night Kewaskum makes the long trip to Kettle Moraine, which is tied with the Indians for sixth with 1-3. Then there will be two home games left with Slinger and wouldn't you know it—Hartland!

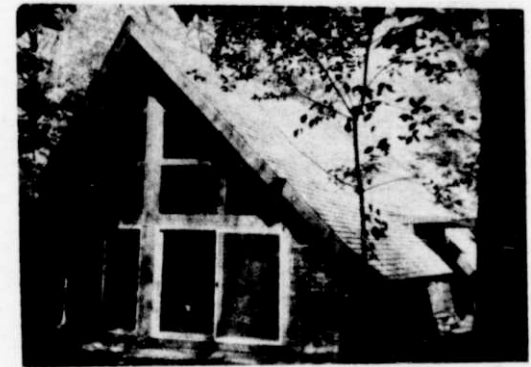

"We enjoyed the reunion and are happy to have been able to attend," Dr. Edwards said.

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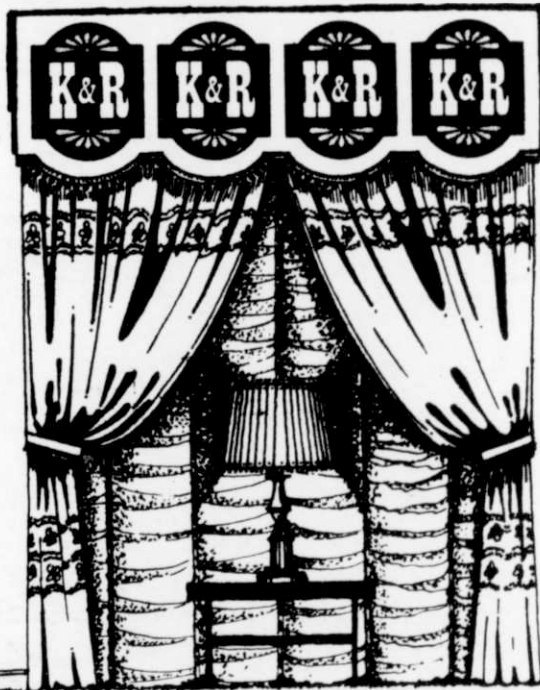


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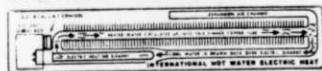

Pet Patrol

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Leaves contribute to water pollution

Washington County's lakes and rivers would be better off if people thought twice about raking autumn leaves into street gutters where they are easily transported by storm drains directly into rivers. Washington County project personnel studying ways to improve water quality urge area residents to keep leaves with their high nutrient content out of streams and lakes by mulching or composting them or properly bagging leaves for collection.

Leaves are rich in phosphorus, a nutrient when introduced into lakes or streams nourish aquatic leaves and algae, causing unwanted excess growth of these plants. It is estimated that leaves contribute from 10 to 20% of the phosphorus entering surface waters in our area.

Urbanization has been one of the big contributors to the problem of nutrient pollution in surface waters because of extensive paving. Leaves placed on street pavement, driveways or sidewalks wash from gutters into storm sewers and move directly into rivers and lakes where they decay. Other pollutants such as salt, gas, oil, fer-

tilizers, etc. enter our surface waters in urban areas the same way.

Citizens are urged to learn more about mulching and composting leaves to preserve these valuable nutrients for soil of yards and gardens. Leaves used as organic mulch placed around trees, shrubs and flowers hold in soil moisture, keep weeds from growing and prevent erosion. As the leaves decompose, they add fertility to the soil. Leaves also make an excellent ingredient in a compost pile. For further information on composting, contact the Washington County University Extension office.

If leaves cannot be used organically and must be disposed of, they should not be burned or placed in the streets or on paved surfaces. Instead, leaves should be bagged or put in containers and left on the terrace - the strip of land between sidewalk and street. In small amounts, bagged leaves will be picked up with your regular refuse. For those who have a large number of bags or containers, a special pickup is necessary and can be arranged by contacting the city hall.

Slipping Indians Lose Fourth In Row at Kettle Moraine, 14-6

After winning their first four games, the injury riddled Kewaskum Indians ran their current losing streak to four straight when they were downed at Kettle Moraine's homecoming Friday, 14-6.

Prior to the contest Kewaskum and Kettle were tied for second last with identical 1-3 records. The Lasers' win dropped the Indians to undisputed second last with 1-4, just a notch above winless Pewaukee.

The first half told the whole story of the ball game for the happy Laser homecomers. They got all but one of their 11 first downs and scored all of their points in the first half.

Kettle brought the opening kickoff back to the 20-yard line and marched the ball 80 yards in 15 plays with Bob Jackson going over on fourth down.

Jackson then covered 58 yards in the first three plays of the second quarter to set up his winning touchdown run. But the key play was a 31 yard pass, the only pass completion of the entire windy night. After moving to Kewaskum's 12-yard line, Jackson scored again. Mike Fink ran for the two point conversion to make it 14-0 at half-time.

The Indians settled down in the second half and played a tough defensive game. They held Kettle to just one first down the rest of the game and 45 total yards. But each time Kewaskum got inside

the Lasers' 35 offensively, it ran into trouble.

The Indians' only score came on a break late in the final quarter. A bad snap from center on an intended punt sailed over Scott Gilbert's head and he recovered the ball on his own 18-yard line. Five plays later Jim Donath scored for Kewaskum.

In other games Friday Hartland (7-0 overall), which is ranked first in the state in Class A in the Associated Press poll, ran over last place Pewaukee, 35-3, using first stringers only in the first half, and Mayville came back to edge Slinger, 15-14. On Saturday Grafton upset Germantown, 7-0, to take over second place.

This Friday night at 7:30 the Indians host Slinger in their homecoming game. If they are going to win another game, this better be it as they entertain Hartland in the finale next week. The Owls are 2-3.
