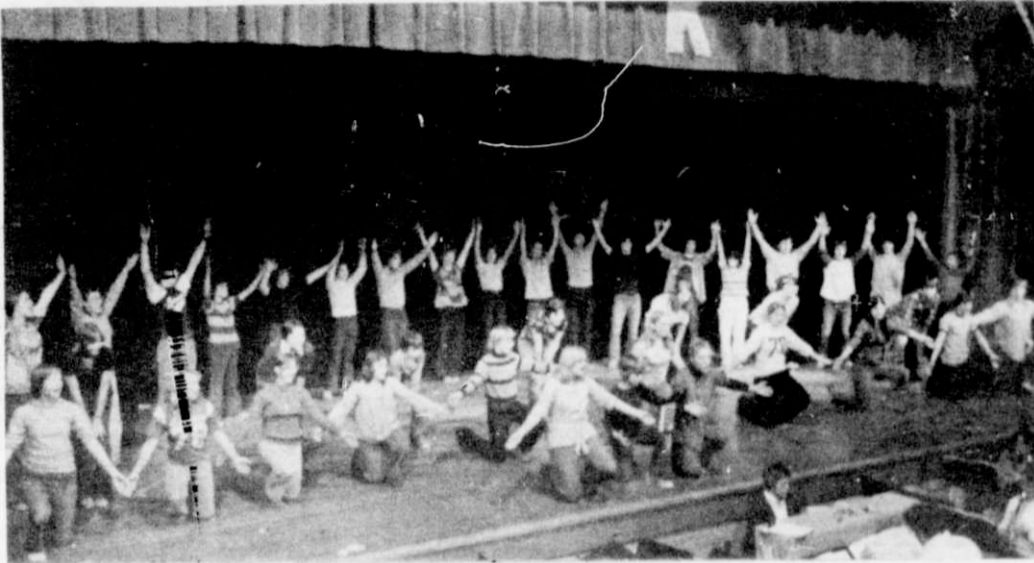

## High School to Present 'Music Man' Nov. 5 - 6



The time to get your tickets for Kewaskum High School's musical is now! The production this year is Meredith Willson's "Music Man." The nights of Nov. 5 and 6 are when you will want to be at Kewaskum.

"Music Man" is a story of a small town in Iowa which is captivated by Harold Hill. Professor Hill is a brash, over-confident young man who plays light with life. Also, he is a person who can't read one note of music from another. Near the end of the story,

we find Harold deeply in love and his foot caught in the door with the instruments having arrived.

Kewaskum High School annually puts on its musical in the fall. This year there is an exceptionally large cast of 45 members. Included this year is a Barbershop Quartet which includes Richard Rauch, Frank Lohr, Frank Schmidt, and Larry Rasmussen. This quartet was organized and rehearsed by Mrs. Chris Stark, the high school vocal teacher. Also, there is a very active dance troupe consisting of David Sleger, David Schoofs, Nicky Stoffel, Victoria Key, Roseann Czaja, Carrie Swanson, Joe Moths, Tommy Rosenburger and Phillip DeLuise.

Three people who play important roles are Jerry Butz,

the mayor of the town who owns a pool hall and is able to control his town with an iron fist; Eric Schmidt, Harold's friend Marcellus, who is now living in Iowa, is an aid to Professor Hill's tricks; and finally Gay Olson who plays Mrs. Paroo. Mrs. Paroo is a lovable Irish woman whose main goal in life is to marry off her daughter, Marian Paroo.

Tickets are available from any cast member, from the Kewaskum High School office, or from the Valley Bank in Kewaskum. Prices are \$1.75 for students and \$2.25 for adults. The performance in the old gym starts at 8:00 p. m. both Nov. 5 and 6. As there are only 400 seats available for each performance, it is suggested you get your tickets in advance.

## General Election Tuesday, Nov. 2

Only a few more days and all the campaigning will be over when voters go to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 2, to cast their ballots on General Election Day throughout the United States.

Wisconsin citizens will go to the polls to select a president and vice president, United States senator, congressman, state senator, representative to the assembly and county offices.

Polls in the Village of Kewaskum will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. and voters will cast their ballots in the fire station at the municipal building. Voters of the Town of Kewaskum will vote at the Labor Center in Kewaskum, Town of Auburn residents will vote at the Town Hall, Hy. Jct. 67 & 45, and Town of Wayne will vote at Strobel's Hall, Wayne, from 9:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

On entering the polling place on Tuesday voters will be handed three ballots: a Presidential ballot, a State, Congressional, Legislative and County Offices Ballot and a State Referendum Ballot. Facsimile ballots and information to electors appear on pages 8 and 9. Kewaskum residents will be handed an additional park referendum ballot, a facsimile of which can be found on page 7.

The appointment will run until the end of April, 1977. The post will be filled by election at that time, with the term running through April, 1978, the end of the term held by Allen Tessar.

In other business, the board appointed Tom Gundrum to the parent committee for the new pre-school program and appointed Jim Oelhafen as WASB correspondent. They approved a child care leave for Mrs. Bender until November 29, and approved changing the health and accident insurance carrier from Wisconsin Physicians Service to the WEA Trust.

## Milwaukee Man Robbed, Beaten And Left Abandoned Near Here

A 44-year-old South Side Milwaukee man who was beaten, stripped of his clothes, robbed, and thrown from his car by two hitchhiking sailors ended up in St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, briefly Sunday before being transferred to St. Mary's Hospital in Milwaukee. He was reported in satisfactory condition there earlier this week.

The victim, Earl T. Hoffman, 5701 W. Crawford Ave., reportedly picked up two hitchhikers in downtown Milwaukee at 5th and Wisconsin about 9:30 p. m. Saturday. He drove the men to the area of N. 27th and W. Pierce Sts., where the sailors, both 18 years old, attacked and beat him, took his wallet containing 35 cents, locked him in the trunk and took control of his car. They then

drove to an area north of Kewaskum where they dumped him along the side of the road. Hoffman told police that they also tried to choke him.

He was abandoned, beaten and naked, in Fond du Lac County, about one-quarter mile south of County H on County W, north of Kewaskum. A motorist from Brookfield, Peter Flick, found the man and brought him to Kewaskum where he was taken by ambulance from Hwys. 28 and 45 to St. Joseph's Community Hospital and later transferred to St. Mary's. Flick reported the incident to police.

Menomonee Falls police arrested two suspects shortly before 3 a. m. Sunday after spotting the victim's stolen car on Hwy. 41.

## Husband of Local Woman Found Shot to Death; Murder Suspected

Murder is suspected in the shooting death of Thomas C. Schrab, 29, of Mayville, whose body was found in the Chequamegon National Forest near Fifield Sunday. Price County Sheriff Paul Gehring said they are considering the death a homicide.

Schrab's wife is the former Renee Teeselink, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Teeseling of Kewaskum, whom he married in Kewaskum on March 2, 1973.

Sheriff Gehring said Schrab was on a hunting trip with his family in the Wintergreen Lake area east of Fifield over the weekend. Schrab was alone driving an open vehicle over a hunting trail when someone approached from behind and fired a shotgun blast. According to Gehring, Schrab jumped from the vehicle, but was shot several more times by his assailant. The sheriff estimated the shooting occurred about 2 p. m. Sunday.

Schrab's body was discovered a short time later by other hunters who heard the shots. He died as a result of multiple bullet wounds.

Sheriff Gehring said this was definitely a homicide and they are doing everything they can to solve it. A full-scale investigation is underway but there currently are no suspects in the case. The state crime laboratory is aiding in the investigation.

Schrab, who lived at 233 S. German St. in Mayville, was employed by Mayville Metal Products as an estimator.

He is survived by his wife; one son Aaron at home; his

parents; two brothers, and one sister.

The funeral was held Thursday at Mayville.

## Kasten Sreaks to Kiwanis, Sportsmen

Congressman Bob Kasten (R-Wis.) Monday charged that the federal budget for the year which began October 1 is "an irresponsible plan for bigger government, bigger deficits, higher taxes and higher inflation."

Speaking to the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club and New Fane Sportsmen's Club, Kasten said he opposed the \$413 billion federal budget, which calls for spending at a rate of \$200 million an hour.

Kasten said that at the end of the year, this spending will cost each family of four in America about \$7,680.

The federal budget this year is nearly \$48 billion more than last year — up 13 percent. "In other words, a government that took 195 years to reach the \$200 billion spending level will take just 15 more years to reach a trillion dollars," Kasten said.

Kasten said he is very concerned about the "heavy burden of debt" which the spending plan carries.

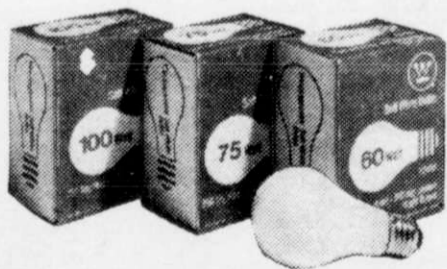

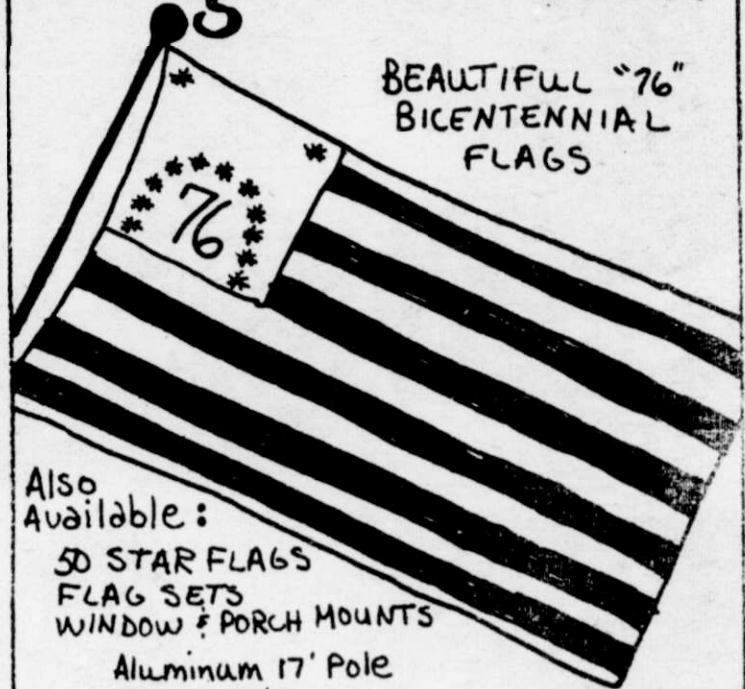

**SAFETY TIPS FOR "TRICK-OR TREAT" NIGHT**

1. Advise children to wear costumes which are light in color, short enough to prevent tripping, and non-flammable. For greater visibility, the costumes can be decorated with reflective tape or bands so that it "glows" in the beam of a cars' headlights.
2. Issue a special warning to motorists to exercise extreme caution on "trick-or-treat" day between the hours that your community has selected.
3. Warn against the wearing of Halloween masks by youngsters. (Masks restrict vision.) Colorful facial make-up can be used instead.
4. Advise children to carry flashlights after dark. If a pumpkin is carried, it should be lit with a flashlight, not a candle.
5. Encourage participation by young children only. Youngsters older than 13 years of age should be discouraged from taking part.
6. Suggest that children's "trick-or-treat" visits be confined to their own neighborhood.
7. Urge that parents or other responsible adults accompany young children on their "trick-or-treat" rounds.
8. Admonish children to wait until they get home to taste their "treats", rather than to eat the goodies while they are making their rounds.
9. Ask the residents who wish to participate to keep their porch lights on. Likewise advise chaperoned children to call only at lighted homes.
10. Lastly, promote the basic pedestrian rules of the National Safety Council through the press, radio and television:

- Cross only at corners, never between parked cars, never diagonally across an intersection.
- Look in all directions before crossing the street.
- Watch for and obey all traffic lights
- Walk, never run across the street.
- Use sidewalks, not the street, for walking.
- Wait on the curb, not in the street, until the street is clear to cross.

Anderson announced that as part of a three-year program to introduce Automatic Number Identification in 47 exchanges, the Company in 1977 would be providing this faster, more simplified

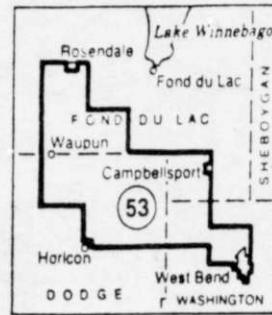

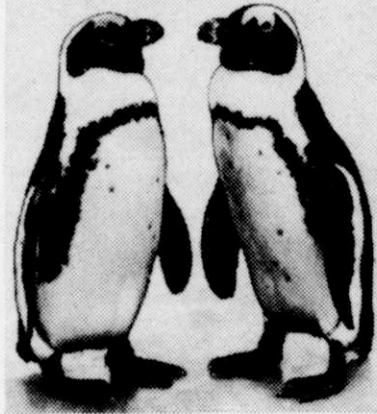

## Attend Retarded Citizens Conference

Alice Laubenstein, president, Kathleen Walter, director, and Leslie Kaschner, developmental disabilities counselor and member of the West Bend Association for Retarded Citizens attended the 27th annual national conference of NARC in Indianapolis, Oct. 18 through 22.

The theme of the conference, "Pursuit of Happiness," dealt with the need for equal opportunity and civil rights for all retarded persons. Workshops included Prevention, Protective Services, Advocacy, Breaking Barriers to Employment, Community Residential Services, and Ethical and Moral issues related to human experimentation.

A report was made on the President's Committee on Mental Retardation summary, "Century of Decision," which is expected to influence the course of services to the mentally retarded for the next 25 years. One of the most interesting workshops was titled, "Nobody Said It Would Be Easy." This session was headed by four mentally retarded adults, who described their lives in group homes and fielded questions from the audience. Their poise and enthusiasm for group living was apparent.

Panelists included internationally known obstetricians, pediatricians, psychiatrists and lawyers. The sessions were attended by professionals, parents, developmentally disabled persons, and other concerned citizens. Prevention and special liv-

ing arrangements will be the local as well as state and national goals during the coming months.

Upon roll call vote, the following voted aye: David E. Nigh, Roger Strack, Daniel S. Schmidt, Gregor A. Nigh, Robert A. Danielsen, Raynor W. Herriges, and the following voted nay: None.

Whereupon, the resolution was declared adopted and immediately recorded.

It was moved by Trustee Raynor W. Herriges and seconded by Trustee Gregor A. Nigh to adopt the following resolution:

**Resolution No. 76-9**

WHEREAS this Village Board has adopted a resolution to authorize general obligation financing in the amount of not to exceed \$360,000; and

WHEREAS the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes permit such resolution to be submitted to the electorate for approval or rejection;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Village Clerk call a special advisory election on the next succeeding regular municipal election, to-wit: on November 2, 1976, for the purpose of submitting the question of financing the Village to the electors thereof, in the following form:

Shall the Village of Kewaskum borrow an amount not in excess of \$360,000 by issuing its general obligation bonds or notes for the purpose of making permanent

park improvements and to purchase and install park equipment in the Village? with an opportunity for voters to vote either "For Financing" or "Against Financing." and the Village Clerk shall place such question on the official ballot and on the sample ballots applicable thereto;

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village Clerk is herewith instructed to publish a notice of said special election, at least twice, one week apart, in the Kewaskum Statesman, the official Village newspaper, such publications to be at least accomplished in the editions of said newspaper published in the weeks of October 18 and 25, in substantially the following form:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a referendum will be held in conjunction with the General Election on November 2, 1976, upon the following question:

Shall the Village of Kewaskum borrow an amount not in excess of \$360,000 by issuing its general obligation bonds or notes for the purpose of making permanent park improvements and to purchase and install park equipment in the Village?

**EXPLANATION**

The answer to be given to such question shall be either "For Financing" or "Against Financing." A "For Financing" vote shall indicate the voter's approval of the borrowing of money by the Village in an amount not to exceed \$360,000 for the purpose of providing the park improvements and equipment and the voter's approval of such purpose. An "Against Financing" vote shall indicate the voter's rejection of such borrowing and such purpose.

## Unexpected Fireworks as Slinger Spoils Indian Homecoming, 14-8

It looked like a victory for the Indians in their homecoming game with Slinger Friday night until the closing minutes when the Owls scored a come-from-behind touchdown to win, 14-8. It was the fifth loss in a row for the second last Indians and their 1st homecoming defeat in years.

With 7½ minutes left in the fourth quarter, the crowd got some unexpected fireworks. Electrical wiring on a pole at the south end of the field shorted out and started to burn, causing sparks to fall on the field. The short blew out the lights on the east side of the playing field. The siren was sounded and the village fire trucks were summoned to stand by while the wires burned themselves out. After both coaches agreed the game went on and the last 7:24 was completed with the lights on one side out.

The first time Slinger got the ball they marched down to Kewaskum's 17. From there the Indians took over and moved 83 yards in 9 plays with 24 and 20 yard runs by Chuck Dreier. Jim Donath took it in for the score and added the two-point conversion to make it 8-0.

Jeff Wolf was the big gun for the Owls in the second quarter. He chalked up 103 yards rushing in that period alone, including 34 and 27 yard runs. With 1½ minutes left in the half, he then got Slinger on the board. The conversion was stopped short and it was 8-6 at halftime.

There was little offense in the third quarter by either team with Kewaskum really missing the running and blocking of Ray Reindl who was injured during the game, adding to the Indians' already injury riddled squad.

After some delay and with half the lights out, Slinger continued its winning drive. The big play was a fake punt pass from Bob Scheer to Greg Jonas on fourth down which set up Jeff Wolf's four yard plunge for the score with 3 minutes remaining.

Wolf, who scored both Owl TD's, had 193 yards rushing in 32 carries. Donath led Kewaskum with 60 yards. The Indians were penalized 80 yards.

In other games unbeaten Hartland blasted Mayville, 45-7, second place Grafton beat Kettle Moraine, 20-8, and Germantown bested Pewaukee, 28-7.

In the final game Wednesday night, Kewaskum hosted undefeated Hartland Arrowhead, the No. 1 Class A team in the state, with a 6-0 record (8-0 overall). Hartland's offensive lineman and defensive linebacker Dewey was named the state's player of the week this week.
