Only a few more days and all the campaigning will be over when voters go to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 2, to cast their ballots on General Election Day throughout the United States.

Wisconsin citizens will go to the polls to select a president and vice president, United States senator, congressman, state senator, representative to the assembly and county offices.

# Milwaukee Man Robbed, Beaten And Left Abandoned Near Here

A 44-year-old South Side Milwaukee man who was beaten. stripped of his clothes, robbed, and thrown from his ear by two hitchhiking sailors ended up in St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, briefly Sunday before being transferred to St. Mary's Hospital in Milwaukee. He was reported in satisfactory condition there earlier this week.

The victim, Earl T. Hoffman, 5701 W. Crawford Ave., reportedly picked up two hitchhikers in downtown Milwaukee at 5th and Wisconsin about 9:30 p. m. Saturday. He drove the men to the area of N. 27th and W. Pierce Sts., where the sailors, both 18 years old, attacked and beat him, took his wallet containing 35 cents, locked him in the trunk and took control of his car. They then

drove to an area north of Kewaskum where they dumped him along the side of the road. Hoffman told police that they also tried to choke

He was abandoned, beaten and naked, in Fond du Lac County, about one-quarter mile south of County H on County W. north of Kewaskum. A motorist from Brookfield, Peter Flick, found the man and brought him to Ke waskum where he was taken by ambulance from Hwys. 28 and 45 to St. Joseph's Community Hospital and later transferred to St. Mary's Flick reported the incident to

# Husband of Local Woman Found Shot to Death: Murder Suspected

Murder is suspected in the shooting death of Thomas C. Schrab. 29. of Mayville. whose body was found in the Chequamegon National Forest near Fifield Sunday. Price County Sheriff Paul Gehring said they are considering the death a homicide.

Schrab's wife is the former Renee Teeselink, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Teeseling of Kewaskum, whom he married in Kewaskum on March 2, 1973.

Sheriff Gehring said Schrab was on a hunting trip with his family in the Wintergreen Lake area east of Fifield over the weekend Schrab was alone driving an open vehicle over a hunting trail when someone proached from behind and fired a shotgun blast. cording to Gehring. Schrab jumped from the vehicle, but was shot several more times by his assailant. The sheriff estimated the shooting occurred about 2 p. m. Sunday.

Schrab's body was discovered a short time later by other hunters who heard the shots. He died as a result of multiple bullet wounds.

Sheriff Gehring said this was definitely a homicide and they are doing everything they can to solve it. A fullscale investigation is underway but there currently are no suspects in the case. The state crime laboratory is aiding in the investigation.

Schrab, who lived at 233 S. German St. in Mayville, was employed by Mayville Metal Products as an estima-

# Kasten Sreaks to Kiwanis, Sportsmen

Congressman Bob Kasten (R-Wis.) Menday charged that the federal budget for the year which began October 1 is "an irresponsible plan for bigger government, bigger deficits, higher taxes and higher inflatioa."

Speaking to the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club and New Fane Sportsmen's Club, Kasten said he opposed the \$413 billion federal budget, which calls for spending at a rate of \$200 million at hour.

Kasten said that at the end of the year, this spending will cost each family of four in America about \$7.680.

The federal budget this year is nearly \$48 billion more than last year — up 13 percent. "In other words, a government that took 195 years to reach the \$200 billion spending evel will take just 15 more years to reach a trillion dollars," Kasten said.

Kasten said he is very concerned about the "heavy burden of debt" which the spending plan carries







### SAFETY TIPS FOR "TRICK-OR TREAT" NIGHT

After the effective date of this act, no person's registration may be canceled, except in accordance with section 6.50 of the statutes as repealed and recreated by this act.

(3) The question of whether the treatment of sections 6.02, 6.15, 6.18, 6.22 (7), 6.33 (1) and (2), 6.92 (2) and 6.94 of the statutes as provided by this act shall take effect shall be submitted to a vote of the people of this state, in the manner provided by law for the submission of an amendment to the constitution, at the general election to be held in November, 1976. If approved by a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, it shall take effect after such approval by the people; otherwise it shall be of no effect. The question submitted to the voters shall be "Shall that portion of chapter 85 of the laws of 1975, relating to extension of the privilege of voting to qualified persons who are residents of this state for 10 days prior to the date of an election, be adopted?" The elections board shall within 10 days after the receipt of the returns from the county clerks canvass, certify, record and publish as in the case of a constitutional amendment, the number of ballots cast in favor of such proposed extention of suffrage and the number of hallote east against

The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his

the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read, that he has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.

# **EXPLANATION**

Effect of ratification Wisconsin presently extends the right to vote to qualified persons who have resided in this state for six months preceding an election. Federal courts have struck down as unconstitutional the six-month residency requirement of the right to vote. A "yes" vote would grant the right to vote to qualified persons who have resided in this state for ten days next preceding an election. This proposed adoption would bring Wisconsin law into conformity with the mandates of the federal courts.

Chapter 224 (Section 145r) Laws of 1975 Published May 4, 1976 SECTION 145r. Referendum directed on proposed constitutional amendment. In order to prescribe the time and manner to submit to the people the proposed amendment to sections 7 (2) (a) and 10 of the article VIII of the constitution. relating to internal improvements for transportation facilities, as agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the 2 houses of the 1973 legislature (1973 Assembly Joint Resolution 133, Enrolled 1973 Joint Resolution 37) and as agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the 2 houses of the 1975 legislature (1975 Assembly Joint Resolution 2, Enrolled 1975 Joint Resolution 2), the legislature directs that the said amendment to the constitution be resubmitted to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in November 1976; and further directs that the question of the ratification of the foregoing amendment be again stated on the ballot, as it was stated in the 1975 spring election, as follows:

"Shall article VIII, section 7 (2) (a) and section 10 of the constitution be amended to broaden the existing authority under which state funds may be appropriated for highways, for airports and for port facilities to apply, generally, to the development, improvement and construction of transportation facilities?"

The legislature further directs that if a majority of the voters voting thereon approve the foregoing question, the amendment to section 7 (2) (a) of article VIII shall be deemed an amendment of section 7 (2) (a) 1 as provided by the final resolve of 1975 Assembly Joint Resolution 1 (1975 Enrolled Joint Resolution 3) which was ratified by the people in the 1975 spring election, and the amendment of section 10 of article VIII shall be incorporated into the constitution as shown by 1975 Assembly Joint Resolution 2 (1975 Enrolled Joint Resolution 2).

# EXPLANATION

Effect of ratification. The constitution presently allows the State to contract public debt for the development, improvement and construction of highways and to appropriate money for the development, improvement and construction of highways, airports and facilities. A "yes" vote on this amendment would broaden the existing authority by allowing the State to contract public debt and appropriate money for the development, improvement and construction of transportation facilities generally.



# Attend Retarded Citizens Conference

Alice Laubenstein, president, Kathleen Walter, director, and Leslie Kaschner, developmental disabilities counselor and member of the West Bend Association for Retarded Citizens attended the 27th annual national conference of NARC in Indianapolis, Oct. 18 through 22.

The theme of the conference, "Pursuit of Happiness," dealt with the need for equal opportunity and civil rights for all retarded persons. Workshops included Prevention. Protective Services. Advocacy, Breaking Barriers to Employment, Community Residential Services, and Ethical and Moral issues related to human experimentation.

A report was made on the President's Committee on Mental Retardation summary, "Century of Decision," which is expected to influence the course of services to the mentally retarded for the next 25 years. One of the interesting workshops was titled, "Nobody Said It Would Be Easy." This session was headed by four mentally retarded adults, who described their lives in group homes and fielded questions from the audience. Their poise and enthusiasm for group living was apparent.

Panelists included internationally known obstetricians, pediatricians, psychiatrists and lawyers. The sessions were attended by professionals, parents, developmentally disabled and other concerned citizens.

Prevention and special liv-

ing arrangements will be the local as well as state and national goals during the coming months.
