## James Sarauer, 13, Killed in Hunting Mishap

A 13-year-old rural Campbellsport youth was fatally wounded Saturday when his brother's gun accidentally discharged and struck him in the lower back.

Dead on arrival at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, at 3:30 p. m. was James Sarauer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Sarauer.

He and his 14-year-old brother Timothy were returning from squirrel hunting in the marsh behind their home at 1660 Lovers Lane Road north of Kewaskum when Timothy, who was walking behind Jim, stumbled. The gun, a .410 shotgun which was not on safety, discharged and struck Jim. He was taken to the hospital by Campbellsport ambulance.

According to the family, the brothers left the house around 2:30 p. m.

James was born June 24, 1963, at Campbellsport and was an 8th grade student in the Campbellsport School System.

Survivors include his parents, Bernard and Jeanette (Koenings) Sarauer; seven brothers, Ronald of Kewaskum, Bernard Jr. and Dennis, both of Campbellsport, Gerald, Danny, Ricky and Timmy, all at home; five sisters, Mrs. Roger (Sandy) Pieper, Mrs. Patrick (Susan) Johnson, Mrs. Norman (Gloria)

## Village Board Discusses Park Financing, OK's Police Contract

The Kewaskum Village Board met in a special session Monday evening at 7:30 p. m. to decide on the type of financing for the new park. This was the result of the decisive vote on the referendum for borrowing \$360,000 in the Nov. 2 election. Types of financing had been discussed previously and the board decided to go with a negotiated sale, sending letters with criteria to First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee and Valley Bank of Kewaskum, to allow both to submit bids.

The criteria would include length of note, results of referendum, legal opinion, and date representatives of banks would appear before the board. Letters will be sent to both banks inviting their representatives to appear at the Nov. 15 meeting with their proposals.

President Charles Miller inquired if only inviting two representatives would satisfy a negotiated sale. Robert Danielsen replied that First Wisconsin National Bank is the largest bank in the area and Valley Bank is of a smaller nature so should get a good opinion from both. First Wisconsin National would buy the bonds themselves, then sell them, while Valley Bank would buy them and keep them. Danielsen explained. The motion was made and passed to go with the negotiated sale and send-

ing the letters out in Tuesday's mail.

Richard Knoebel, president of the Police Association appeared to explain the 1977 contract which the association and the board had approved. The contract is the same as last year with the exception of a 7½% increase on each of the five steps of the pay scale. This would mean a 7½% increase from the 1976 pay scale of a first year man of \$873.04 per month ranging to the fifth year of \$1,157.15 per month.

Also the contract has a clarification of holiday pay. Holidays consist of all legal holidays with ten hours of work. The men will now receive double time for the ten hours of holiday work. All part time men and the chief of police are not included in this contract. The contract

## Bumper Crop the Year of the Blue Snow

Recently I found a photo among my collection, taken on my grandfather Pete Kohn's farm in Section 5 in the Town of Kewaskum. It was taken in the fall following the winter of the blue snow.

In 1800 and the blue snow

there were many blizzards and most of the snow was blue. The following summer all of the area covered by this snow had bumper crops. Corn grew to enormous size. Farmers saved the cobs and did not have to cut wood for several years. The people around Kewaskum had so much of all the vegetables that most of it

was wasted. Pumpkins and cabbage had to be cut into smaller pieces with a cross cut saw.

State agricultural officials said the unusual size was probably caused by a fertilizer contained in the blue snow.

The following summer all crops were normal in size again.

The board also approved the certified survey map of the Myron Belger estate with the understanding the repair of the street is at the property owner's expense.

Approval was also given to Police Chief Donald Hlavaty to advertise for bids for a new squad car, with the same specifications as last year. It was called to the board's attention that the present car has 43,000 miles on it now with an expected additional 30,000 miles to be added before the new car is purchased.

There has been no response to the ads for assessor and building inspector as of yet. It was stated that it was brought to a member of the board's attention to hire someone who has some building experience.

The board started preliminary discussion of the 1977 budget. Final board decision on the budget is not needed until around Nov. 22.

The next board meeting will be Nov. 15 starting at 7:30 p. m. instead of 8:00 p. m.

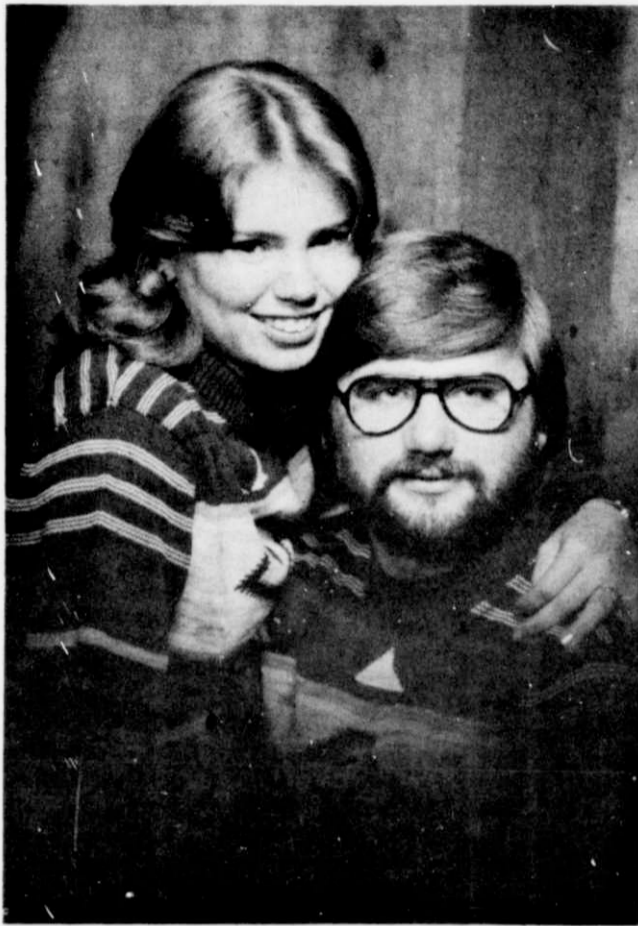

Mrs. Guy resides in West Bend with her husband, Ken, a practicing attorney, and their two children, Eric age 11 and Sarah age 5.

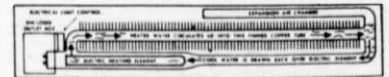


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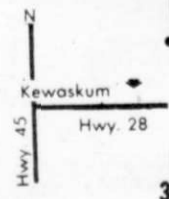
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### Elementary Children Learn About Agriculture

Children at the Kewaskum, Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne elementary schools are learning about agriculture this week from Kewaskum vocational agriculture students who know from first-hand experience and study what agriculture is all about. The instructors for the elementary students are all members of the Kewaskum FFA Chapter, who are conducting class in agriculture for elementary school children as part of the FFA's new "Food For America" program.

"Food For America" is an effort by FFA chapters across the nation to tell the story of modern agriculture to elementary school children. Chapter members are being aided in their effort by a set of instructional resource materials that includes a FARM ART BOOK and a film provided through the National FFA Organization. The Farm Art Book contains interesting illustrations of agricultural facts that students can color or illustrate themselves while the film — "Food from Farm to You" — explains in elementary terms how food is produced and ends up on supermarket shelves.

The entire "FOOD FOR AMERICA" projects is co-sponsored through the Na-

tional FFA Foundation, Inc., by four agricultural businesses: American Breeders Service; Division of W. R. Grace & Company; J I Case, a Tenneco Company; Chemagro Agricultural Division of Mobay Chemical Corporation, and DEKALB AgResearch, Inc. Funds from the sponsoring companies and from the FFA Foundation General Fund have been used to develop and distribute resource materials and to offset the costs of distributing the film.

"We are concerned that so few young people understand where their food comes from" says Kewaskum Chapter President Jerry Berres. "Our members are well qualified to help elementary school children learn about agriculture because of the knowledge and experience we've gained in the vocational agriculture courses and by actual experience on the farm and in local agricultural businesses."

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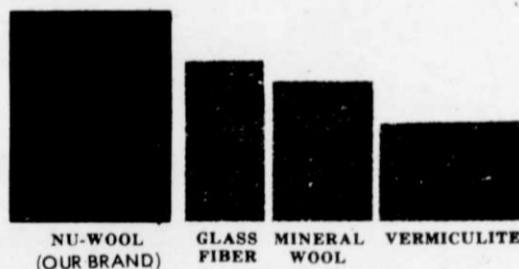

## YMCA Building Drive Begins

The Kettle Moraine YMCA officially opened its drive today for the funds to build a major family Y center, complete with Olympic size pool and a gymnasium.

Cliff Nelson, drive chairman, set the stage for the inauguration of the campaign by announcing that advance gift workers had already solicited pledges of over \$1,000,000.

The sum includes the \$250,000 lead gift from The West Bend Company, nearly \$200,000 from the board of directors who picked that goal to demonstrate their commitment, and other donations solicited by the leadership Gift Division under the chairmanship of Bernard C. Ziegler.

The goal of the drive is \$2.1 million.

Other phases of the drive will be special gifts, advance gifts, in-plant solicitation, area solicitation and the general drive. The general drive will kick off early next year, with the completion set for the end of February.

The announcement that the drive was nearing the \$1,000,000 mark came last week at a dinner given for potential major sponsors of the building program.

The general mood of the meeting, also attended by Y directors, was that the goal can be reached if a broad cross section of the community becomes involved in making it a success.

Ziegler pointed out in his remarks that the Y already has paid for the 14 acres of land that centers around the old West Park — The location of the present YMCA activity center that doubles as a Day Care operation.

The land purchase was paid for, he said, by a quiet solicitation of a few donors over the last several years. That effort was headed up by Norman Schowalter.

It means that the Y enters the building drive debt free and all the funds raised can be used for the building.

Ziegler pointed out that the Y had wanted to build as early as 1974 but held off because of the economic recession that year and because the Threshold fund raising activity had taken precedence.

Ziegler gave Y executive Jack Murray much of the credit for bringing the Y to a level of activity where a major facility is justified. In 1970 the Y had 950 members and 9,944 attendances in its programs. In 1975 it had 3,477 members and 45,953 attendances.

Nelson commented at the meeting, "I don't think the community could be doing anything better for the youth of this area."

Robert Claus, Y President, said it's time for the community to "roll up its sleeves" and get the job done.

It is expected that formal ground breaking will take place in the spring, providing the drive is successful.
