Board Accepts Valley Bank's Bid For Financing New Park Facilities

The Kewaskum Village Board gave the nod to the Valley Bank of Kewaskum Monday night at their meeting for the financing of the \$360,000 for the park facilities. First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee and Valley Bank of Kewaskum were invited to the meeting to have their representatives explain their individual banks position on the financing.

Dennis Pordon represented First Wisconsin National. He explained that his bank would offer general obligation promissory notes, with these notes being resold to investors. The interest rate on this type of financing to the village would be 5.24% over a nine year period with the total amount of interest being \$126,210.73. This figure includes a \$61.15 premium which the bank would pay the village at the end of the nine year period. He explained they were only offering one financing program at this time and that the 5.24% interest rate would only be in effect at the present time and if the board took a day or several days to come to a decision, a new bid would have to be re-submitted. Also First Wisconsin did not offer any pre-payment penalty.

Wayland Tessar represented the Valley Bank of Kewaskum. He stated their re-

presentation followed the criteria they received in the board's letter with two plans being offered. Plan No. 1 would be ten equal payments over a period of ten years and Plan No. 2 would be tailored to present debt retirement. Both these plans carried a 4.9% interest rate with no pre-payment penalty. Total interest on Plan No. 1 was \$97,020.00 and on Plan No. 2 \$124,460.00. He did state that the bank was flexible and would offer any other legal "custom" plan the village would prefer. Valley Bank's quote would hold for thirty days.

Gregor Nigh suggested the finance committee discuss both offers and the meeting was recessed while this was going on.

Dan Schmidt of the Finance Committee reported that the Valley Bank total interest for the 10 year plan was \$1,750.73 less than First Wisconsin for their 9 year plan. Also the no pre-payment penalty from Valley Bank was held in high regard by the board. The motion was then made to accept the Valley Bank's bid. The vote was 6 yes and one abstention, this being Robert Danielsen, who is an employee of the Valley Bank.

It was also decided at this time that the board would decide later on whether to

UWWC Basketball Team to Use Local Gyms; OK Teacher Contracts

Use of the local gymnasiums by UWWC was approved at the meeting held Monday evening by the Kewaskum Board of Education. The UWWC basketball team will use these gyms for practice, since they were unable to find suitable gym space in the West Bend area. The board approved the use of the gym without charge, with a possible review of a fee at a later date. This question will be reviewed after the program has begun and added custodial time, if any, is determined.

A resignation from Mrs. Bender, first grade teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School, was approved. A contract was also approved for Carole Czoschke to replace Mrs. Bender. Mrs. Czoschke has been substituting for Mrs. Bender since September.

A contract was approved for Mary Diez to teach third grade at KES. This is to fill a position added earlier by the board when the third grade at Kewaskum became too large for two sections.

Mrs. Diez is a beginning teacher and a graduate of UW LaCrosse.

Approval was given for Johnson Bus to make arrangements with the Richard Lochen family to pick up their kindergarten child. The family lives in the village in an area which would not usually receive transportation. Charges will be paid by the family.

Richard Theusch was named as the representative of the Kewaskum Board to the delegate assembly of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards.

In other business, the board approved a long-range building health and safety plan and also approved installation of a dusk to dawn light at Wayne School.

A closed session was held following the open meeting to discuss negotiations and a personal question.

Senator Sensenbrenner, who had been scheduled to meet with the board, had called earlier in the day to say he would be unable to attend the meeting.

take Plan 1 or Plan 2 of the bid.

In other business, a 12 foot by 15 foot piece of carpeting which had been used in the Geidel house, which is village owned, was being offered for sale to the village by the renter of the property who had moved out. It was thought to use this carpeting in the municipal offices. A discussion followed on the condition of the Geidel house, on whether it should be rented or possibly torn down for future street construction. A committee will check into the house's condition and report back to the board. A motion was made by Schmidt not to purchase the carpeting due to possible remodeling of the municipal offices was passed.

A resolution will be drawn up for the next meeting to name the new park "The Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park."

Dan Schmidt reported on a meeting that was held with Tom Blotz of Milwaukee who is in charge of the federal and state funding for parks. Blotz told Schmidt that a possible 50% funding on the park equipment could be expected after all is completed and paid for. Applications must be in before December 31, 1976. Also more items are eligible for funding than previously expected. Each year new items are eligible and possibly in 1977 lighting of the ball diamonds could be an item for funding. Blotz

would look into the village's application and decide which program, federal or state would be more feasible for them.

It was the board's decision to ask for a 30 day extension on the Lehman Rosenheimer offer of property bordering the new park.

The board then went into discussion of the up-coming budget, which has to be finished for a December 3, 1976 publication.

A special meeting was called for November 16 at 7:00 p. m. for further discussion on the budget.

Following a trip out east, the newlyweds are now residing at Jackson.



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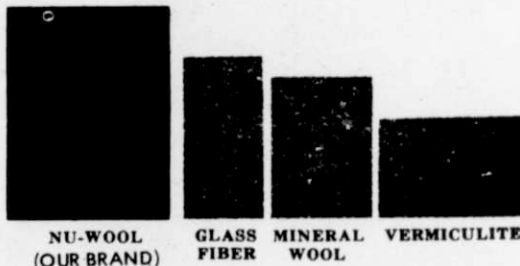

Members also collected

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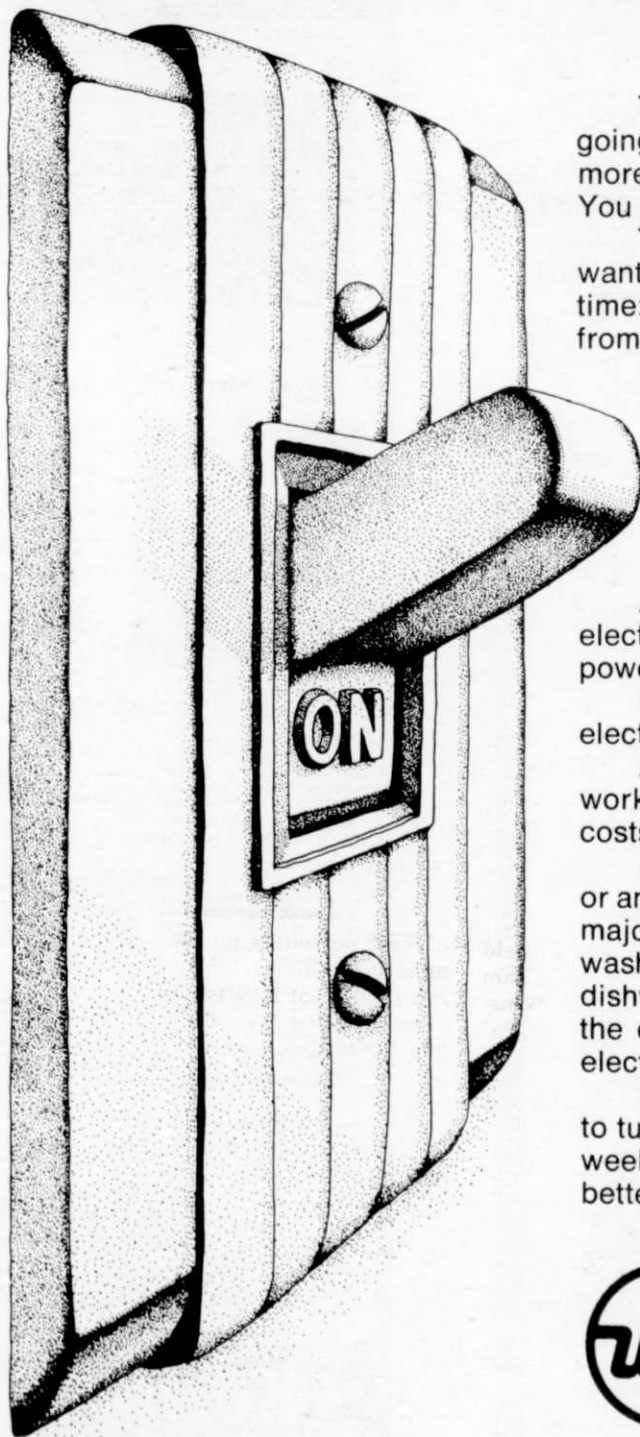

Indian Cagers Will Open Season Against Plymouth, West Bend East

The Kewaskum Indians will open their 1976-77 basketball season this Friday in a 7:30 p. m. game when they host the powerful Plymouth Panthers of the Packerland Conference in a non-loop contest. Then on Tuesday night the Indians play at West Bend East of the Little Ten, another strong team with three starters back, in another non-conference tilt.

Both Plymouth and East already have one game under their belts. They played each other at Plymouth Tuesday with the Panthers easily handling the Suns, 60-46. Three Plymouth cagers got a late start with the team as they were members of the football squad which won the WIAA Class B playoff title in the finals Saturday at Madison. Plymouth, a Class A school with an enrollment of just under 1,000 (991), ran over little Iowa-Grant, a Class B school with an enrollment of 417, 42-12. The Panthers built up a 42-0 lead before substituting to keep the score down. Plymouth is in Class B because the schools in the Packerland Conference, to which they belong, average less enrollment. It is time for some realignment of conferences, including the Scenic Moraine, in which Kewaskum is competing against four Class A schools.

Kewaskum's defending Scenic champions, face a major rebuilding job this season. The Indians have just one returning starter back. He is 6-3 forward Leon Laatsch, who didn't come out for football this year because of a back injury suffered last season. Laatsch was an honorable mention pick in the Scenic

nic a year ago when he had 276 points (13 a game) and 195 rebounds for the Indians.

Unfortunately the other returning letter winners played sparingly and totaled just 12 points. They are Tom Ryan, a 6-5 center; Paul Brenholt, 5-11, G-F; Kevin Darmady, 5-7, G; Paul Lehnert, 5-9, G; Dave Schmidt, 5-11, F, and Rick Dreher, 6-0, F. All are seniors. Non-lettering seniors are Mike Perkins, Jim Donath and Jim Dean.

Other candidates include Dale Poling, Tim Perkins, Joe Matenaer, Al Jaeger, Roger Rezel, Bruce Steinhardt, Jeff Limberg and Wayne Endlich.

For the Indians to be successful, a number of these players and newcomers must make rapid development. Head Coach Jim Westphal feels some of the juniors will have to be counted on heavily. He expects to find some talent in the junior crop, which had a successful JV record last year. Leading scorer on the JV team was Mark Tessar, brother of Scott Tessar, one of the aces of last year's champions. Also gone from that strong, big team are stars Jack Kern, Dennis Bremser, Tom Rohlinger, Dave Menzel, Tom Edwards and Jim Bilgo.

The Indians finished with a 12-2 conference mark last year and were 16-5 overall.

Competition in the Scenic Moraine will be tough. Mayville will be a contender with three starters back, among others. Grafton has some big kids and Slinger will be good.

The girls' varsity team will be playing many of the preliminary games this year (6:00 p. m.) instead of the JV's.
