

The long awaited time arrived this week when the Kewaskum Fire Department is moving their trucks and equipment into their new fire station costing over \$234,000 at 1106 Fond du Lac Ave., from the former over-crowded station in the municipal building.

An open house will be held at the new fire station on two consecutive Sundays, this Sunday, Nov. 28, and the following Sunday, Dec. 5, from 1 to 4 p. m. Invitations have been sent out to area fire departments to attend and the public is cordially invited to come and inspect the spacious, beautiful station. Refreshments will be served and all firemen (or their wives) are requested to bake cookies or bars for the open-

The fire department's new \$73,000 snorkel, tele-squirt 1.000 gallon pumper with 50foot aerial ladder and 50foot water tower will also be on display.

The firemen saved much

added cost on the new station by doing the painting. staining, laying of floor covering and a lot of other volunteer work themselves evenings and weekends. Members have been very busy working there in recent

Land for the new station was obtained by purchasing the Clarinda Schmidt and Fellenz Topsoil was removed last November and bids for the building were accepted during the winter. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held April 12, 1976, after which construction was startted. Architects for the building were Tesch - Tesch and Associates of Fond du Lac.

The structure contains approximately 13.400 square feet of space with a 94-foot frontage. The one-story building is built of pre-engineered steel with masonry walls of colored and textured concrete block in a shade of light brown. The station is designed for six equipment bays capable of housing 12 fire fighting units.

Besides the large 70' by 100' equipment area, it contains a 40' by 50' meeting room, training room, fire chief's office, small conference and meeting room,, dispatch office, first aid room. kitchen, toilet, wash down and shower rooms, and various equipment storage areas.

The building has no basement. Parking space for approximately 70 cars will be provided. Some of the area could be used for regional fire and first aid meetings.

Augie Bilgo is the fire chief and Rick Boden assistant chief in charge of the department consisting of 45 active men. The department now has two ambulances and six fire trucks.



Honor Local Historical Society

The Brown County Historical Society was awarded the Reuben Gold Thwaites trophy as the outstanding local history society of the year at the Council for Local History's annual convention Nov. 13 in Madison.

Seven other local history groups, including Kewaskum's, were awarded certificates of commendation and a number of individuals were honored with awards of merit during a luncheon at the Wisconsin

The prestigious Thwaites trophy is given each year in recognition of exceptional work by a local society affiliated with the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. Thwaites, who headed the State Historical Society from 1887 to 1913, is credited with starting the local history movement in Wisconsin

Four of the certificates of commendation, including Kewaskum's, have been voted for museum development.

The Burnett County Historical Society received a commendation for construction and development of a county history museum; the Kenosha County Historical Society for the addition of a \$160,000 wing to its museum, the Kewaskum Historical Society for converting the Kewaskum municipal garage into a community history museum, and the Polk County Historical Society for converting the old county courthouse and two one-room schools into historical museums.

For leadership and long and meritorious service, awards of merit were presented to Pearl Dopp of the Wild Rose Historical Society; Lillian Mackesey, history editor of the Appleton Post Crescent; Dorothy Straubel Wittig of Brown County Historical Society, and Leliah Zanton of the Rock County Township Historians.



Of course problems remain. But the most crucial fact for all of us to remember is that it will be the way in which we deal with those existing economic problems that will either strengthen, or destroy, the precious system that has created America's bountiful harvest.

Among other prayers we offer for the coming year, we might also include one for our elected officials, that they will focus on policies which will make it possible for American industry to grow to its full potential and create more and better jobs for all Americans.

We must see to it that bountiful harvests will continue to be the rule for many Thanksgivings to come.



Presented Wildlife Conservation Awards

Mr. and Mrs. Roland Nickel and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Maurin were presented with wildlife conservation awards by the West Bend Kiwanis at a noon dinner meeting at the Masonic temple Tuesday, Nov. 2.

The award is presented each year to a Washington County farmer and nonfarmer for doing an outstanding job in the development and preservation of wildlife habitat on their land. Both are district cooperators with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The award committee con-

sisted of Dan Wickert and Art Schmidt, Kiwanis conservation committee, Willard Heppe, Soil and Water Conservation District supervisor, Armin Schwengel, DNR game manager and Donald Kurer, district conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Colored slides of the Nickel and Maurin projects were shown.

The Nickels own a 176acre dairy farm three miles north of Nenno. In 1974 they developed a shallow wildlife pond jutting into a 29-acre wooded wetland area. On the banks can be seen prints from a variety of wildlife from raccoon to deer. Many ducks find this spot a good refuge.

In 1975 a one-half acre spring-fed pond was constructed for fish habitat. Also in 1975 and 1976, 1,850' grass waterways and 3,300' of diversion terraces were constructed on the cropland. These practices move water gently down slopes and keep streams, ponds and duck marshes free of sediment. They also produce food for wildlife and their edges are nesting places for pheasants.

Fifty-two acres of strip cropping applied in alternate bands of crops and grass also provide a lot of edges where wildlife food and cover are close together.

The Maurins have 20 acres of wildlife land on the

north edge of West Bend. The entire area is covered with trees, shrubs and water. They have identified 224 different bird species in the last 20 years. A bird club recorded 40 species in one outing and Dale Houdek, the West Bend School District environmental coordinator identified 42 species in two outings with his classes last spring. A bird graveyard is maintained for 31 birds which were found dead from various causes.

The three-acre shallow lake is bordered by cattails, wetland shrubs and open marsh. Here it is not uncommon to see four to six families of ducks make their home -- blackducks, woodducks, mallard, scoup, teal and grebes. A green heron was also spotted.

White cedar, Norway pine, white spruce, highbush cranberry and multiflora hedgerows were planted on hills throughout the property among existing plants since

the Maurins acquired it. Six brush piles, two woodduck boxes, six tree swallow boxes and sixteen wren houses were also placed throughout the area.

It has also been announced that both the Nickel and Maurin wildlife projects are the winners of the areawide contest of the S.E. Wisconsin Area Assoc. of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

More Flu Vaccine Clinics Scheduled



Led by Football Star, Plymouth Thumps Indians in Opener, 64-49

Jim Pieper apparently Form Indians made the transition from football to basketball without Booster Club any difficulty, as he led Plymouth of the Packerland Conference to an easy 64-49 victory over Kewaskum in the Indians opener here Friday night.

The Panthers' junior athletic standout, who rushed for 173 yards and scored four touchdowns the Saturday before when Plymouth shellacked Iowa-Grant, 42-14, in the WIAA Class B football championship game, saw his first basketball action of the season Friday.

Pieper, a starting guard. dazzled Kewaskum with his ball handling. He only scored 10 points but they were big ones. He hurt the Indians by handling their press with his quickness under pressure.
