Village Tax Rate Set at \$42.87, Increase of \$6.98 Per Thousand

By Karen Schmidt Monday evening the Kewaskum Village Board passed Resolution No. 76-11 pertaining to the levying of taxes for the year ending December 31, 1976 on all read and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year. The tax rate will be \$48.82 minus \$5.95 tax credit from the state, leaving a balance of \$42.87 per one thousand dollars as sessed evaluation which is a \$6.98 increase over 1975. Of the total the village absorbs \$3.79 with the remainder being county tax, school tax, vocational school tax, state tax. The tax increase also includes the cost of the new park which is approximately \$1.50 per one thousand assessed evaluation according to Dan Schmidt. The village is approximately \$15,000 below the allowable state limit.

In 1975, the real estate and personal property tax rate was \$35.89 per one thousand with a \$5.08 tax credit from the state.

The board deliberated carefully on ways of reducing the budget in order to cut the tax rate, but the few items discussed would not make much of a dent in the rate. \$21,800 has to be eliminated ir order for a .50 tax reduction. The board came up with a possible reduction of \$9000 which doesn't even give the taxpayers .50 off the rate. In discussion all members except Robert Danielsen felt that they couldn't cut any more from the budget. due to the fact small cuts had no significant change in the rate. Danielsen stated that with the present rate, this would mean an additional \$140 to the average home. owner and he had as a goal a \$1 cut which would help quite a bit. It was at this time that the rest of the board felt that no more could

be cut. The vote for approv-

ing the resolution was 6 to 1 with Danielsen voting against.

Other resolutions approved were No. 76 12 which will allow the Commissioner to place upon the present tax roll for collection all delinquent accounts of all departments of the village: No 76-13 which will change the date from January 31, 1977 to February 28, 1977 for the first payment of split payment of 1976 real estate taxes; No. 76-14 which authorizes the village to retain the firm of Kannenberg. Kieckhafer and Company to audit (Continued on Page 2)

Town Kewaskum **Tax Rate \$21.61**

The tax rate for Town of Kewaskum residents will net \$21.61 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, compared to the 1975 net rate of \$18.81. The total assessed valuation of the township is \$14,964,644, compared to the 1975 valuation of \$14,847,759.

Three properties were annexed to the Village of Kewaskum, reducing the 1976 assessed valuation by \$142, 180.



the records of all depart ments of the village for fiscal year ending December 31. 1976 and No. 76-15 outdoor recreation aids which states that the village needs financial aid to develop the new park and that a sufficient sum has been budgeted to complete the project. Dan Schmidt made a motion to accept Plan No. 2 from Valley Bank on financing the new park. This plan is one tailored to the present village debt retirement over a period of ten years at an interest rate of 4.9% per year.

Gregor Nigh received a report from Recreation Director Tom Larson on the adult basketball program held on Thursday evenings for the winter months. The cost of the program will be \$527.00 with revenue of \$570.00 coming in from a total of six teams participating at a cost of \$70 per team and an additional \$5 charge per persons living outside the village. At this rate, the program is selfsustaining.

Robert Danielsen inquired if a decision had been reached as to giving the school board an answer to the question Dr. Charles Ogi, School Board President, had asked at a previous meeting concerning the construction of sidewalks from the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision. President Charles Miller stated that no conclusion had been reached as yet and it has been sent to the proper committee for further study. Roger Strack sta-

ted that some type of sidewalk program will have to be initiated and it might as well start in the near future, since the longer the wait, the more expensive it will become. Dan Schmidt said this is the reason the committee has been instructed to look into the sidewalk situation coming up with a long range plan for development.

ELECTION NOTICE VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

County of Washington) State of Wisconsin

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affi-davit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer ooths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted


