Dr. Edwards to Retire



'Doc'

Dr. R. G. Edwards will retire from medical practice on January 1, 1977.

Alma and Doc wish to thank their many friends for their very kind expressions of gratitude. They have enjoyed serving this community all these past 45 years and will miss the people very much.

Dr. Edwards, who practiced full time from an office in his home, came to Kewaskum Feb. 6, 1932, after completing his internship at Minneapolis General Hospital. He celebrated his 71st birthday on Sept.

On Sept. 7, 1975, over 600 grateful people of Kewaskum and surrounding area paid special tribute to Dr. Edwards at a Recognition Convocation held in the new local high school gymnasium, honoring him for his many contributions to the community and surrounding area. The program highlighted the many milestones in Dr. Edwards' long medical and civic career.

At that time he had delivered over 3,400 babies, over 1,000 more than the present population of the village. At the ceremonies a special scholarship fund was estab lished to serve as a living testament to the many years of faithful and outstanding service provided by Dr. Edwards. Called the Dr. R. G. Edwards Health Care Scholarship Program, this fund provides scholarships for Kewaskum area high school graduates to pursue any one of the expanding health care careers.

Doc has always been very active in promoting the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club's turkey shoots. This now famous annual fall fund-raising event has made well over \$100,000 for various community projects, including \$77,000 for the purchase of the new Kiwanis Community Park.

A record of 41/2 decades of dedicated service, combined with a rare sense of humanitarianism, has made Dr. Edwards a respected institution to the people of Kewaskum and area.

Dr. Edwards was born in Sargeant, Nebr. Sept. 1, 1905. the son of a Congregational minister. After graduating from Cresbard, So. Dak. High School, he attended the University of Minnesota where he graduated from Medical School in May, 1931. He completed his internship at Minneapolis General Hospital in January, 1932, and passed his State of Wisconsin Medical Board Examination the same month. On Feb. 6, 1932, he started his general practice here in Kewaskum as a fully credited Doctor of Medicine, Surgery and Obste-

During Dr. Edwards' long career, his wife Alma has assisted him in his office as a graduate nurse.

Dr. and Mrs. Edwards have six children, Mrs. Annabelle Tessar, Richard (Arlette) and William (Violet), all of Kewaskum; Ruth (Eldon) Ramthun of R. 2, Campbellsport; Gwen (Jules) Dreher of Kenosha, and Patricia (Dr. Joseph) Darin of Brookfield. They also have 26 grandchildren, 13 boys and 13 girls, and one great-grandchild.

Over 900,000 Visit Kettle Moraine Forest North Unit

Over 900,000 recreational visits were made to the Kettle Moraine State Forest-North Unit during 1976. This represents a ten per cent decline from the one million plus visits made during the record year 1975. The decrease on the forest can be attributed to citizens traveling further away from home during the bicentennial year, and an improved economy.

With the winter season upon us, the forest area will be enjoyed by winter sports enthusiasts. The Greenbush Ski Hill will operate on weekends from 10:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. The forest hiking trails will serve as cross-country ski trails The Greenbush hiking-ski trails are especially recommended for cross-country skiing. Fifty miles of snowmobile trails are available for snowmobiling. Snow mobilers are cautioned that they must stay on designated marked trails.

Campsites will be available at the Mauthe Lake Recreational Area during the winter season. In addition. winter backpacking is available on the forest-long glacial trail. A camping permit is required at both areas. For further information, visitors may contact the Forest Headquarters.

Board Acts on KEA Agreement, Increases Credits for Graduation

Action on the 1976-77 a greement with the Kewaskum Education Association was the major item taken up at the two recent meetings of the Kewaskum School Board. At a special meeting last Friday, the board ratified the tentative agreement which the Kewaskum Education Association had earlier approved. At that meeting, the board also approved placement of all personnel on the salary schedule, except for the social worker position. which was only recently added to the bargaining unit.

At the regular meeting on Monday, a motion was made to place the social worker at the beginning step of the "F" column of the schedule. The motion also would have left the salary at \$11,000 for this year, the amount agreed to by contract prior to the inclusion of the position in the bargaining unit, since the placement on the schedule would result in a salary cut. The motion failed when three members voted in favor. three against. No further action was taken, and the salary will be set at the beginning of the schedule. The "F" column of the schedule applies to those persons who have a Master's Degree plus at least 10 graduate credits.

The new contract increased the salary base from \$8,400 per year to \$8,875 for a person with a Bachelor's Degree and no teaching experience.

In other action at the Monday meeting, the board approved a recommendation for increasing credits required for graduation from high school. The present requirement is 18 credits. This will change to 19 for 1978 graduates, 191/2 for 1979 and 20 for 1980 and beyond. No other changes in curriculum were recommended or adopt-

Two student requests for graduation at the end of their junior year were dis-

cussed. A request from Dale Butts was approved, and a request from Lana Becker was held over pending further information from her par-

Dan Filzen of Kewaskum Savings and Loan spoke with the board about the possibility of depositing some school district money with concern. No action was taken as the board requested further information on how these services and rates compared with the bank.

Action on a contract with the Wisconsin Association of School Boards for special services, including negotiating, was delayed. The second December meeting was cancelled, and the board gave Mr. Brenholt authority to agree to a delay as late as March 15 for beginning 1977-78 teacher negotiations

A closed session was held following the meeting for a board hearing on a student personnel problem and for the annual board-superintendent evaluation session.

Campbellsport Curriculum Study

The Campbellsport School Board recently appointed a curriculum study committee consisting of three citizens from each of seven areas in the district.

After listening to speakers on curriculum, the committee decided to use a survey method to determine if the school system is meeting the needs of the district, a method used successfully in other areas, according to the Department of

Co-operation of citizens in the school district is important to the study and sub-committees have been appointed. A number of people will meet with various organizations in the Campbellsport School district to explain the study and sur-

At least one meeting is planned for the general public, who are not contacted through an organization. Another group will conduct a survey of past graduates of the school system. From this information, a written survey will be conducted throughout the district.

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

The Christmas season usually goes hand in hand with traditions. Many traditions revolve around the decorating of the Christmas tree, and the purchasing of gifts for loved ones and friends. - Christmas decorations are beautiful and very pleasant to look at. However, when you leave your home or retire for the night, turn off the light sets, colored spot lights. or other decorations.

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



The Indians just couldn't match the Owls' firepower, especially after their second leading scorer, Tessar, turned an ankle in the second quarter and was out of the game.


