#### Purchase of New Squad Car Approved, Assessor Hired by Board

The Kewaskum Village Board met Tuesday evening and approved the purchase of a new squad car. Two bids were received out of a total of eighteen sent out. The approved bid was from Stocker Ford, West Bend, for a LTD for a total of \$2,955. Tradein on the present vehicle was \$3,470. The other bid was submitted by Meyer Ford, Campbellsport, for the same car for \$3,600. Trade in there was \$2,782. The difference in the base price on the two bids was only \$40 but Stocker gave a better trade-in value. No delivery date was given.

James Arthur of Arthur and Arthur Associates appeared with the plans needed for submittal to the state by Dec. 31 for refunding on the park project. The plan to be submitted was for the completed finished park with costs notations on each item. Arthur gave a complete breakdown of every item in the park as noted on the plan. Complete cost of the finished park including engineering fees, purchased equipment, estimated legal and administration fees, contingencies and pool amounted to \$489. 000. The complete package will be submitted and Tom Blotz in charge of funding will decide what will be eligible for funding. All items may not be fundable this year but may be eligible in er of Pro-Bilt Homes with future years so will be eliminated at the present time for future submittal. Other the year. items may also be eliminated funding.



#### The History Of Christmas Stockings

holiday season even before the first Christmas. The ancient Romans celebrated midwinter by distributing presents to each other.

According to the Bible, the Three Wise Men brought gifts to the infant Jesus on the 12th day after his birth.

The tradition of Santa Claus filling children's stockings with gifts is not quite so ancient but, according to legend, did start about 16 centuries ago. At that time a Turkish bishop was known for his great charity. According to one story, he took pity on a man too poor to provide a dowry for his daughters and dropped gold pieces into the girls' stockings hung up by the fire to dry.

According to another, gold fell by accident into a poor child's drying stocking when the bishop was on a charitable errand.

It is believed that the custom of hanging stockings for presents originated in Germany and was brought to the New World by the Dutch colonists of New Amsterdam, who also brought America the



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






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# ORIGINS CHRISTIN



#### JUNIOR FIRE MARSHAL RULES FOR HAPPY YULE

Live Christmas trees bedecked with flaming candles are difficult for the younger generation to imagine, but many remember well those holiday hazards of a bygone day. Somehow accepted then, they kept fire departments busy and hospitals full throughout the holiday

Now, thankfully, most people would never consider using candles on a Christmas tree, but many tempt fate almost as blatantly as they do their holiday decorating with nary a thought for fire safety. Ignorance and carelessness combine to turn what should be the happiest of times into the saddest for far too many Americans.

Through The Hartford Insurance Group's 26-year-old Junior Fire Marshal program, young children learn the rules of fire prevention. They know, and take seriously, the danger of fire-and adults would do well to follow their lead in taking the following steps to insure a fire-free and truly joyous holiday season.

START WITH THE TREE

- Select a Chris nas tree carefully, making sure it's fresh enough to last a week or two in a warm house. Shake before you buy: if needles fall off the tree is already drying up, and is sure to be a fire hazard.
- Keep the tree outside, in a bucket of water, until it's

time to decorate. Then, set it up in a spot well away from stairways, doors, radiators, and especially the fireplace. Use a sturdy tree stand, and be sure to anchor it firmly.

• WATER THE TREE DAILY! One watering is not enough!



LIGHTS .

- · Check all lighting equipment before use. Make sure wires are not worn, and plugs and sockets are not loose or damaged.
- · Use only Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) approved lights.
- Arrange wiring so that lights can be turned on and Marshal rules for a happy off without crawling under yule-and the likelihood that the tree.
- Do not overload a socket.

AND OTHER DECORATIONS

- Be sure all decorations are flame resistant.
- · A sheet used around the base of a tree should first be made flame-resistant by dipping it in a mixture of one gallon of water, nine ounces of crystal borax and four ounces of boric acid.
- Pay particular attention to candle arrangements, making sure they are out of drafts and away from flammable objects, such as draperies. Don't burn candles down to the end of the wick, and, above all, don't place them where they may be easily upset by adults or reached by children!
- Never operate electric toys under the tree.

FOCUS ON THE FIREPLACE . . .

- If the fireplace is to be used, be sure it is covered with a tight-fitting screen.
- Don't let mantle decorations hang close to the fire -and watch those stockings! A wayward spark has more than once set stockings, and entire houses, ablaze.

#### THE BICEMTEMMIAL KITCHEM

Towns called Double Trouble and Misery doze forgotten in the pine country of Southern New Jersey, appearing much the same as they did in colonial times. In contrast to these quiet towns is the bustling, restored town of Smithville.

This historic area in South Jersey is responsible for much of the success of cultivated cranberries. Wild cranberries, popular with the Indians of New Jersey long before the colonists arrived, were soon cultivated by the early pioneers. The low, marshy places, called bogs, where cranberries are grown are still a common sight in New Jersey today.

Since the colonists' first introduction to cranberries, relishes, stuffings, breads and tarts have featured plump, tangy cranberries. This recipe for Rock Cornish Hens with Cranberry Stuffing is reminiscent of New Jersey colonial cooking. The cornbread-cranberry stuffing is delicately spiced with thyme, dill weed and onion. Versatile Blue Bonnet Margarine, the modern spread, gives the stuffing that good buttery flavor. The stuffed Cornish hens are also basted during baking to keep the delicate meat moist and to add to buttery taste.

#### HELPFUL TIPS ON ENTERTAINING

from entertaining for fear of failing," says Hollace Ann Dahler, a fabricare home economist for Pittsburghbased PPG Industries. "But by following a few simple guidelines, you can ensure a successful party for your guests, and you'll even have

a good time yourself.
"Remember, a good party doesn't necessarily mean a large party," Miss Dahler said. "A well planned eve-ning with a few close friends will usually add up to a good time for everyone.

"Don't allow those little imminent disasters-a punch spill on your new jumpsuit or a cocktail stain on the sofa slipcover-to cast a gloom on your party. Tell yourself beforehand that accidents will happen in a party atmosphere, and plan to visit your dry cleaner the next afternoon.

"Make sure all chairs allow easy access to a tableeven the simple fold-up kind-so guests can put their drinks down or reach an ashtray.

"Show off your finest items," she said. "Party time is the time to bring the best napkins, table cloths and linens out of the bottom drawer and use them. So what if they get soiled. A quick trip to your local drycleaner will restore your linens to like-new condition for the next party.'

Providing ample food and drink is essential to a

"Many people shy away successful party according to the PPG home economist. "It isn't necessary to serve alcoholic beverages. Soft drinks or a large holiday punch bowl are sufficient," she said. "But if alcohol is served, figure 20 drinks to the fifth, and allow three to four drinks per person.

"It's very important to allow enough time to get yourself ready," she said. Three hours should be enough time, and this should leave at least one hour for you to sit and unwind before the first guests arrive

Whether or not a party is successful depends primarily on the hostess or host, says Miss Dahler. "Be festive. Dress the part. Holiday entertaining provides the best excuse of all to pull your most glamourous clothes

out of storage.
"And once the party begins, relax and have a good time, she said. "Remember, your local dry cleaner can restore all your party fineryfrom linens to that favorite gown-to like-new condition. Just smile and have a happy holiday.'



#### HOLIDAY WARNING: 'TIS THE SEASON FOR KITCHEN FIRES

The holiday season brings ELECTRICAL FIRES America's season of warmth - not of temperature, but of spirit, friendship, and hospitality. Now most of us turn from the casual, outdoor attitude of summer to the coziness of the fireside, and the kitchen once again becomes the focal point of family living and entertainment.

Now, when busy women are likely to slip up on otherwise second-nature safety precautions, the kitchen fire . Never yank an electric cord poses a great danger. A few simple safeguards now will dramatically reduce the likelihood of such a tragedy.

Kitchen fires are generally attributable to one of four sources: electricity; gas; grease; or open flames. The • Use no more than 15 amp



Hartford Insurance Group, sponsor of the 27-year-old Junior Fire Marshal program of fire safety education for children, warns that heating and cooking are the greatest causes of fire, and offers parents tips on avoiding these fires, as well as advice on what to do if fire should start.

- Use only electrical appliances bearing the UL (Underwriters' Laboratories) label.
- · Appliances which give off heat, such as a toaster, iron, heater, roaster and waffle iron, use a great deal of power. Try not to use more than one at a time, and be sure to unplug after each use. Do not overload outlets.
- from an outlet; instead, grasp the plug and pull out firmly.
- · Have appliances repaired at the first sign of trouble; never use one having a fraved cord.
- fuses unless you are sure heavy duty wiring has been provided.
- Use an insulated pad under a toaster, electric grill or other table appliances.

#### GAS FIRES

- All gas appliances should bear the American Gas Association Seal of Approval or the UL label.
- Don't let a pan boil over on a gas stove; it could ex-tinguish the flame.
- · Never use a match to look for a gas leak.
- If you smell gas:
- open windows and doors for ventilation;

#### GREASE FIRES

- · Clean up grease spills on the stove or in the oven immediately.

- · Be sure blowing curtains

#### GENERAL REMINDERS

- · Be sure handles on pots and pans don't extend over the stove edge.
- · Don't use the oven for storage.

#### IN CASE OF FIRE

If, in spite of all precautions, a fire does start, get everyone out of the house

trouble, call the gas and call the fire department



Then, if it is in very early stages, an adult may be able to bring it under control. A critical point: Don't use water on a fat, grease, oil, gas or electrical fire. Instead: Turn off the stove or ap-

- pliance. Cover pan or close oven, if fire is located there.
- 3) Use a dry chemical extinguisher on base of flames
- 4) In the absence of an extinguisher, pour plenty of baking soda on the flames.

Fire insurance experts at The Hartford stress the importance of having a dry chemical extinguisher in the kitchen at all times. Baking soda is good, but does not replace an extinguisher.





Medicare participants should remember that if they have covered medical expenses in the last three months of a year that can be counted toward the deductible for that year, they can also be counted toward the \$60 deductible the following year. This is true even if the total expenses for a year are less than \$60. Therefore, failure to file a claim for medical services received in the last three months of year, even if the total bills for the year are under \$60, could result in a loss of Medicare benefits the following year.
