Kewaskum Man Named Horicon Chief of Police

Erwin G. Bullette, 52, a resident of Kewaskum for the past 17 years, will assume his duties as new police chief for the city of Horicon on Saturday, January 1.

Bullette has been a traffic officer with the Wisconsin State Patrol for the last 20 years, including the past nine as a sergeant.

He was one of nine applicants for the Horicon chief's job. A native of Racine, Bullette replaces Lyle Kohn, present chief, who is retiring.

In October Sergeant Bullette was presented with the American Legion's Second District Award for Law Enforcement Officer of the Year. The Second District consists of Dodge, Columbia, Jefferson, Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Washington Counties. The award was presented by Captain Jack W. Jorgensen, Commander, Wisconsin State Patrol, District No. 2.

Bullette will be moving to Horicon when he assumes his role as chief and his family will move when the present school term is finished. His wife, Elaine, operates "The Olde House" in Kewaskum and will commute between Kewaskum and Horicon to conduct her business.

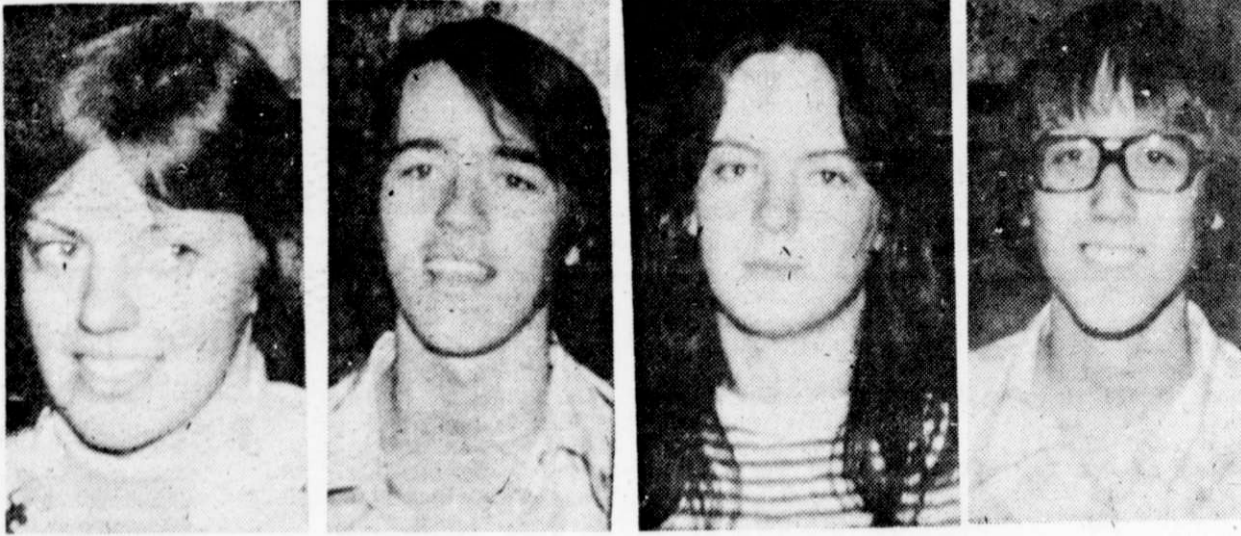

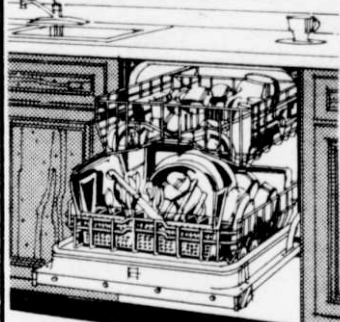

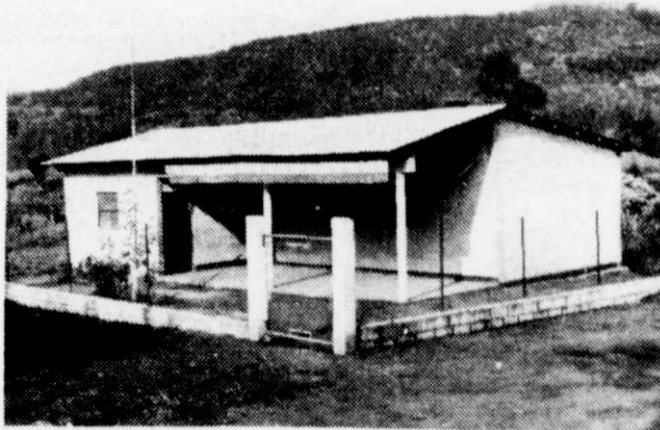

LIONS FUNDED SCHOOL

Twenty-four southeastern Wisconsin Lions Clubs, in cooperation with CARE, have combined to finance the construction of a new five-unit school building in Honduras, which means education for the village. Local support has come from the Kewaskum Lions Club, whose president over the past year was Dr. H. L. Rumsey, 1554 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum.

According to CARE Chairman John H. Nezworski of Brown Deer, the project is located in the village of Jardin Ninos, Danli, Paraiso, Honduras, an area where over 52% of the people are illiter-

ate. Both the Honduran government and the area communities contribute to the project, explained Nezworski, by providing locally available building materials, labor and financial assistance.

International development projects are not new to District 27-A2 Lions Clubs, points out District Governor Alfred H. Kohlwey of Grafton. Past international brotherhood projects with CARE include: construction of a school kitchen in Panama, a clean water project and nutrition program in Colombia, and construction of a school in Nicaragua.

The Wisconsin Association of Conservation Districts (WACD) were "Putting It All Together" in water quality planning for Wisconsin at their 23rd annual conference in Stevens Point on Dec. 7-9. Washington County was represented by District Supervisors, Junior Board members, and the Soil Conservation Service. Those attending were: Reuben Schmah, John Kohl, Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Dettmann, Pat Schwulst, Brian Moser, Tim Groth, Donald Kurer, Tim Anderson, and County Agriculturist Maurice Hoyland.

The Districts, local governing bodies that manage county resources, brought together the agencies that cooperate in the task of cleaning up the state's lakes, streams, and rivers. George Bagley, president of the National Association of Conservation Districts, in his keynote address spoke to the 380 people attending about "putting it all together in our fight against waste and water pollution and our fight to get districts the leadership role in non-point pollution control." The County Soil and Water Conservation Districts, along with the agencies, will have to come up with solutions for the complex problems of maintaining water quality and reducing sediment.

Joseph Krivak of the Environmental Protection Agency in Washington D.C., told the group that the know how to do the job of upgrading our waters is here and has been for forty years. But, he reminded them that "we still have a long road to cover." Krivak encouraged the district supervisors to get involved in the planning of the water quality program. "Above all," Krivak stressed, the districts should "maintain their position as the leaders of the conservation movement."

The WACD annually recognizes the outstanding work that private individuals and groups have done in conserving and improving the state's natural resources. Monroe County SWCD was the first place winner of the Goodyear's Soil Conservation Award. Other awards given were: Outstanding Cooperator, Watershed Man of the Year, Streambank and Lakeshore Improvement, and Wildlife Habitat Development. Norbert Dettmann, Washington County SECD supervisor, received the Distinguished Leadership award as President of the Wisconsin Association of Conservation Districts from 1972-1976. An award for giving "outstanding support to Junior Boards of Soil and Water Conservation districts in Wisconsin" was also presented to Dettmann at the convention.

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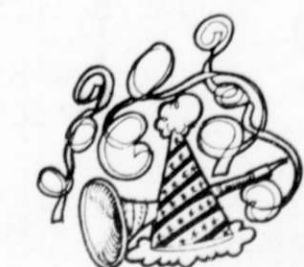

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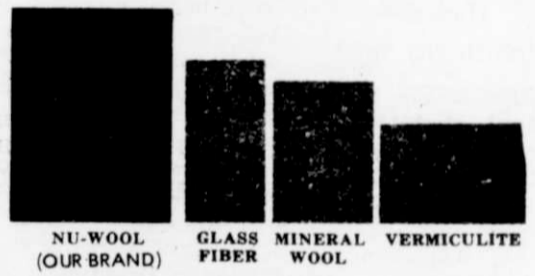
