School Board to Have Busy Agenda

Topics on the agenda of the delegate assembly meeting of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards will be discussed at the Monday meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education. The January 17, 1977 board meeting will be held at the administrative offices, beginning at 8 p. m.

The regular business of the open meeting is expected to start at about 8:20, as the board will meet in closed session at 8 p. m. to discuss an employment question as well as to discuss negotiations.

In addition to the discussion of the WASB meeting, the board will be verifying candidates for the board election. If more than six candidates have declared, a primary election will have to be set up. Action will be taken on a Title IX evaluation and on a Federal Title IV proposal. A question will be raised on the bussing request from within the village, which had been approved earlier. Salary committees and a negotiations committee will be appointed. Dave Schroeder, School Social Worker, will address the board. Approval is being asked to purchase a copier presently being rented. Action will be taken on the question of whether a course in supervision will be acceptable for placement on the Master's plus 10 column of the teacher salary schedule. In closed session following the meeting, the board will hold a hearing on a student personnel problem.

Eight Candidates File for School Board Positions; Primary Required

The deadline for filing candidacy papers for the school board has passed and a total of eight candidates have filed.

Mrs. Maryann Merwin, Town of Farmington, was the first to file, followed by Donald Hlavaty, Chief of Police in Kewaskum. Mrs. Jean Goeden of St. Michaels, Richard Theusch, Town of Wayne, and Thomas Gundrum, Town of Farmington, filed late last week. Francis Standish, Town of Kewaskum, James Walters, Town of Wayne, and John Tessar, Village of Kewaskum, filed this week.

Gundrum and Theusch are seeking their third term on the board. Tessar was appointed by the board to finish the term of his brother, the late Allen Tessar. The other candidates are all seeking their first term on the board. Merwin, Goeden, Hlavaty and Walters all had submitted their names for consideration by the board to

fill Allen Tessar's vacancy.

Since there are more than six candidates, a primary will be held on February 15. Two candidates will be eliminated, with the remaining six going into the April election.

Names were drawn Wednesday evening to determine name position on the ballot.

Br-r-r 60 Degrees Below Zero at Rice Lake

The coldest temperatures ever recorded in Wisconsin that included an unofficial 60 degrees below zero reading in the Rice Lake area early Sunday literally froze Wisconsin, stalling cars, cracking water pipes and knocking out some heating systems in the northwestern section of the state. In the Kewaskum area an unofficial 27 degrees below was recorded.

It has been a record bitterly cold winter to date. It started early in fall and has been cold most of the time since. During December and the first week and one-half of January it was reported that we had 16 days of below zero temperatures. And we're only in the second week of January with the rest of this month, February and March still left to go.

It has also been below zero every day this week since Sunday and is getting to the point when it gets above zero it seems like a warm spell.

Sunday's cold gave Barron County residents a scary feeling. Ice fog was reported in that area as water vapor crystallized in the frigid air. It was hazy and foggy with the sun out. Smoke came out of the chimneys and would blow straight across and then go down to the ground. That's how heavy the air was.

Some days it has been so cold that the salt placed on the highway didn't even melt the snow effectively, causing hazardous driving conditions.

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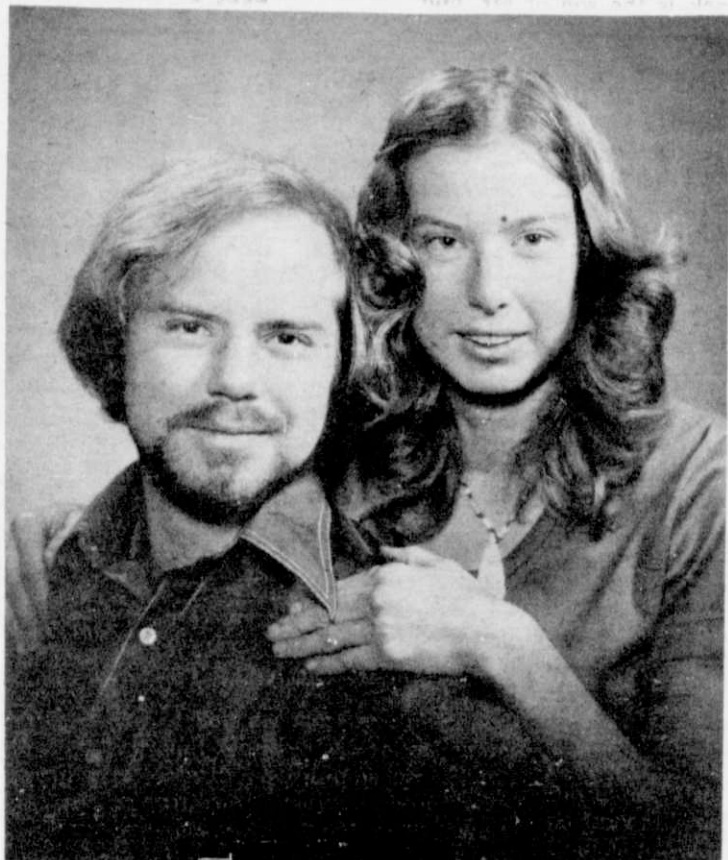

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Campbellsport Man Killed in Car-Train Crash

Fond du Lac County's first traffic fatality of the year occurred Saturday night when a Campbellsport man died of injuries sustained in a car-train crash. County traffic police said that Glen J. Kloke, 27, died of massive head injuries when his car struck a stopped train at the Haven Road crossing of the Chicago & North Western Railroad.

The collision occurred after dark about 7:39 p. m. with a train stopped across a road crossing. It was believed the crossing was not marked with wig-wags nor were there any flares put out at the crossing. The car blocking the road was reported to be a dark "hopper." Haven Road is a country road and it was slippery that night. Kloke was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac.

Funeral services for Kloke, of 220 Jenny St., Campbellsport, were held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday at the Twohig Funeral Home, Campbellsport

and at 11 a. m. at St. Matthew's Church. The Rev. Victor Kemmer officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery. Friends called after 4 p. m. Monday.

He was born in the Town of Ashford on April 8, 1949, a son of Henry and Janet Haberkorn Kloke. He was employed by Gehl Mfg. Co. at West Bend since 1968.

Surviving are his father and stepmother, Henry and Ann Kloke of Campbellsport; a brother, David of Dodgeville; three stepbrothers, Charles Bub of Naperville, Ill., Michael Bub of Menomonee Falls and James Bub of Fond du Lac; and grandparents, Mrs. Irene Kloke of Campbellsport and Walter and Esther Haberkorn of Brownsville. His mother, three brothers, a sister and his grandfather predeceased him.

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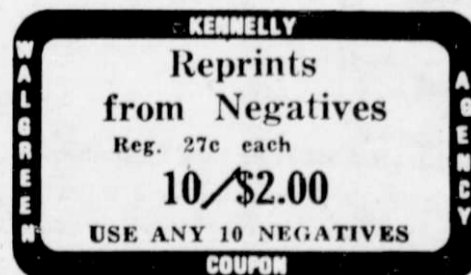

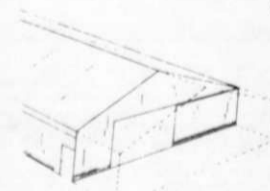

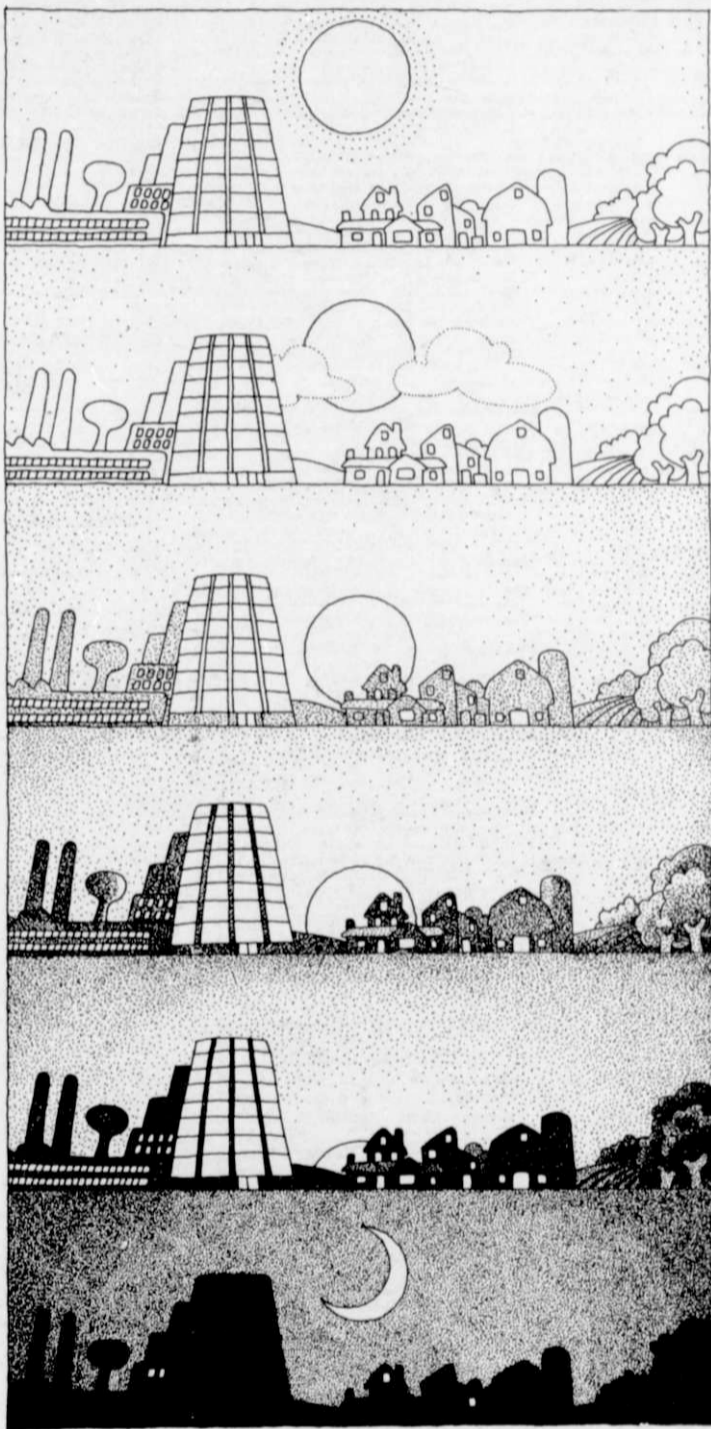

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There are good times and bad times to use electricity.

Returning to Conference Action, Indians Lose Again at Mayville

After jolting previously unbeaten Campbellsport, Flyway Conference leader, in a non-loop game there last Tuesday, 78-61, the Kewaskum Indians returned to Scenic Moraine action at Mayville Friday and were downed, 66-50. It was the Indians' fifth straight Scenic loss without a win.

After a fairly close first quarter, the Cardinals pulled away at the end of it, 14-9. But it was the opening minutes of the second period which ruined Kewaskum as Mayville hit on 14 straight points on a hot streak, paced by their 6-5 center, Mark Gindt, and Gerry Schinderle. About the only points the Indians scored in the quarter were on free throws, except for one basket by Mark Tassar. It was 32-21 at halftime.

Kewaskum staged a great comeback in the third quarter and closed the gap to six points at one point. Leon Laatsch, the conference's leading scorer, who was held to one basket but sank eight free throws in the first half, and Tassar were responsible for 10 Indian points in one stretch while Mayville scored only four. This made it 36-30.

Then the Cardinals took over control again and went up by nine on a basket and free throw. A couple of long jumpers by Mark Zahn and Mayville moved ahead by 14 again. In the fourth quarter the Indians remained behind and the winners took a 16-point lead and that was the margin when it ended.
