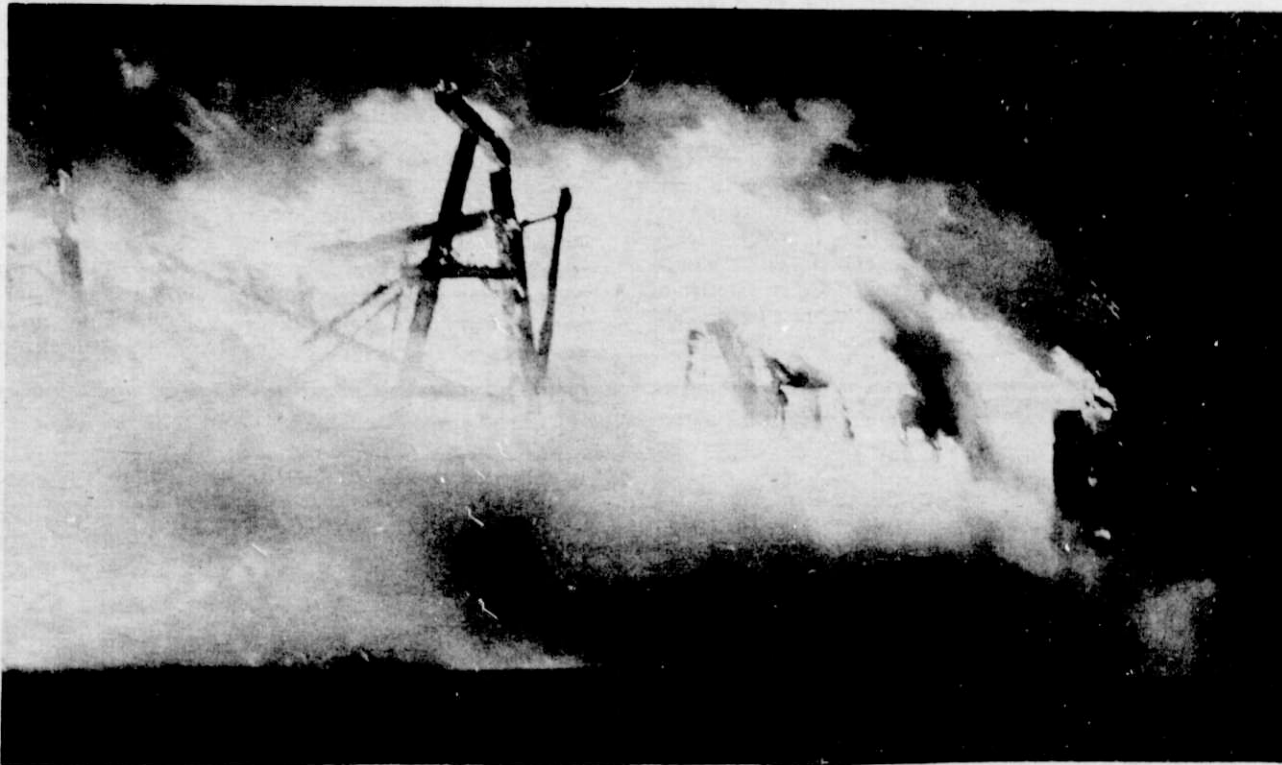

## Fire Destroys Barn on Henry Oppermann Farm

Fire completely destroyed the upper portion of a 136 by 40 foot barn on the Henry Oppermann farm on E. Auburn-Ashford Drive west of New Fane, about three miles north of Kewaskum, Monday night. Kewaskum firemen were called to the scene about 10 p. m.

Also reported damaged was a Harvestore silo and the milk house. The roof of the milk house was burned off but the equipment was saved.

The lower portion of the barn used for milking was also pretty well intact.

The Oppermanns had retired for the night when the fire was discovered almost at the same time by their son, Ronald, who resides on the next farm west, and a passer-by, who stopped to alert them. The Oppermanns then called the Kewaskum Fire Department and Mr. Oppermann went to the barn and was able to save all the livestock, which included over

60 milk cows and several young calves.

When Kewaskum firemen arrived, the entire sky was aglow. Chief Augie Bilgo and his men remained on the scene all night and until Tuesday afternoon before they returned to the station. The Boltonville department was called in for additional manpower and equipment and the Beechwood and Campbellsport department responded with water tankers to help fight the blaze. Also, area milk truckers brought in their tankers to help transport water.

The Oppermanns, who farm close to 300 acres, estimate they lost 10,000 bales of hay in the fire. Also lost was

some machinery.

Clean up operations by firemen and neighbors who volunteered continued through out most of the next day. Much of the clean-up involved dragging smoldering hay into the barn yard. The Oppermanns hoped to be able to move their stock back in a few days.

The Oppermann's farm, Silver Leaf Dairy, is located within a half mile of two other barns that have been destroyed by fire in the last two years.

The cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

## Opposition In Town of Kewaskum

Three candidates for Town of Kewaskum Treasurer will be narrowed to two by electors at a town caucus Feb. 5.

William Bruhn, the incumbent, is not running and the three who have told the caucus committee they intend to run are Marilyn Haug, 3326 State Hwy. 28; Dolores Prost, 8891 Kettle View Dr.; and Allen Koepke, 8390 Kettle View Drive.

Those names will then go on the April 5 general election ballot, which will include several other town contests.

Mervin Thompson, incumbent Chairman, 9592 Town Line Rd., is being challenged by George Allman, 9205 Hickory Dr. Barbara Hinz, 9055 Kettle Moraine Dr., Clerk, is unopposed, but three are running for the two supervisor positions. One is incumbent Jerome Herriges, 9065 Hickory Dr. and the other two are David Dorn, 4280 Ridge Rd. and Daniel Stoffel, R. 2, Hwy. 28. James Andre the incumbent is not running for re-election.

The caucus will be held at the Kewaskum Labor Center from 2 - 4 p. m. The caucus committee will also be elected. All incumbent members are running unopposed. They are Wesley Haug, 3326 State Hwy. 28; Edward Dorn, 4280 Ridge Rd. and Carl Herriges, 2796 Salisbury Lane.

## Historical Society Elects

The Kewaskum Historical Society met on the 18th of January and elected a new slate of officers for 1977. The new President is Marshal Reysen; Vice-President, Allyn Rodenkirch; Secretary, Clifford Stautz, and Treasurer, Gloria Rodenkirch. Daniel Schmidt was elected to a three year term on the Board of Directors.

Mrs. Kathleen Paul will be in charge of the museum. She will oversee work parties and scheduling of families to work at the museum openings.

The museum will re-open the third Sunday of April and will be open the third Sunday of May, September and October. It will be open every Sunday during the months of June, July and August.

The Society will be selling new Historical Society buttons as a money making project and will again feature an enlarged Early Farm Days display at the Kewaskum Lions Barbecue in the summer.

The next meeting of the Society will be Feb. 15.

## 2 Races in Town Of Farmington

It appears that the Town of Farmington will have a new town chairman this year. Incumbent Vaughn Brown has not filed for re-election, making John Theusch, 9069 State 144, West Bend, the only candidate for the post.

Three candidates have declared for the town supervisory positions. They are incumbent Isadore Stahl, 9059 Orchard Valley Road, West Bend, and Carl Hauch, 654 State 184, Fredonia, and challenger Eugene Laatsch, Paradise Road, Kewaskum.

Challenging incumbent clerk Elmer Plaum, 9060 State 184, West Bend, is Ralph Horner Jr., 2307 Scenic Drive, Kewaskum.

Treasurer Kenneth Ramthun, 7730 Forest View Road, West Bend, is running unopposed.

There are no constable or assessor candidates.

## Know Your School Board Candidates

Two candidates for the school board, who are on the primary ballot for the Feb. 15 election, are Maryann Merwin and Jeanne Goeden.

Mrs. Merwin lives at 9159 Bolton Dr., R. 1, Kewaskum, Town of Farmington. She and her husband have four children, two of whom attend Farmington Elementary School. She is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, with a BS degree in Political Science, with a year of study of law at Marquette University. In her candidate's statement, she states that "the position of school board member carries a dual responsibility; to the source and to the recipient of these public funds. Ultimately and ideally each board member must seek to invest the most for the most good in the education of a responsible public." Merwin also states that "having to budget my own household, I am well acquainted with the term 'fiscal responsibility' and I would like the chance to apply practical solutions

to the practical aspects of educating our children and meeting their physical and emotional needs while away from home."

Jeanne Goeden lives at 2478 Hwy. 28 E, Kewaskum, Town of Farmington, although her five children attend Kewaskum schools. She is a graduate of the West Bend school system and is active in the Farmington PTO. Her candidate's statement reads that she feels since she has five children in school, that is five reasons for being a candidate. She states that "she feels that as fast as the programs in teaching are changing, a parent with students in the different grade levels in school is better qualified to deal with the decisions and problems of students and schools." Goeden also states that "there are many things involved with such an important position and I'm willing to learn and do the best that I can."

## Doc Edwards 'Slipped' Into Retirement

After 45 years of walking the halls of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, on Jan. 11 Doc Edwards was on his way from the OB Dept. to see his friend Pat Miller on the second floor. At the entrance of the cafeteria, walking on a freshly scrubbed floor with caution signs displayed, Doc's right foot suddenly slipped to the east and the body fell to the west with the right knee receiving the twist which partially dislocated the joint and tore many ligaments. Many helpers were upon him in seconds

and an x-ray soon revealed no bone fracture—hence just rest and retirement will eventually return the joint to near normal.

It is his hope that this report will be a real warning to all people who go to the hospital to visit or for any other reason to please be extra careful — your fall may be more serious than Doc's.

It is also his hope that the floor scrubbing can be deferred until after visiting hours in the evening when traffic is very light.

## Death of Myron A. Perschbacher

Myron A. Perschbacher, 70, a lifetime resident of Kewaskum, dealer in farm implements, lawn and garden equipment for 50 years, died Friday, Jan. 21, at Milwaukee County General Hospital, where he had been a patient for two weeks.

He was born Dec. 9, 1906, in Kewaskum to the late Arrey A. and Louisa Krueger Perschbacher. On Sept. 7, 1929, he married Lazeda Ramthun in the Peace Church in Kewaskum.

Mr. Perschbacher was past president of Peace United Church of Christ and a member of their Consistory Board for many years, past president of the Kewaskum Businessmen's Association, charter member of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club and Kewaskum Sportsmen's Club, member of the Kewaskum Village Board many years, past director of the Washington County Red Cross Association, and a member of the Wisconsin Implement Dealers Association.

Survivors include his widow; three sisters, Mrs. William (Gladys) Knickel of Sun City, Ariz., Mrs. (Carl) Evelyn Peters of West Bend,

and Mrs. Harry (Bernice) Keller of Bloomsburg, Pa.; two brothers, Dr. Chester P. (Louise) Perschbacher of Appleton and Dr. Ray P. (Evelyn) Perschbacher of Denver, Colo.; an aunt, Mrs. G. A. Perschbacher of Milwaukee; another sister-in-law, Mrs. Jean Ramthun of Kewaskum; nieces, nephews and many other relatives and friends.

Visitation was at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, from 3 p. m. Sunday until 11 a. m. Monday and at Peace United Church of Christ from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. Monday. Pastor Darrell Joiner officiated and burial was in the church cemetery.

## Inpatient Program At County Mental Center Approved

The Comprehensive Community Services Agency of Washington County announces the recent state approval of its inpatient program at the Washington County Mental Health Center according to Don Hilbig, the Mental Health Coordinator for the county.

The State Department of Health and Social Services, Division of Health, has approved the unit as a special hospital for acute care. The inpatient program serves Washington County citizens experiencing acute psychiatric problems and adheres to standards of care under both the State Division of Health and the Division of Mental Hygiene. The program has also been approved for Federal Medical Assistance (Title XIX) funding.

The treatment approach is based on a team concept, combining Psychiatry, Psychology, Nursing and Social Work and utilizing individual, group and family therapy. Occupational and Activity Therapy are also available as indicated by the needs of the patient. Discharge planning and follow-up services are specialized for each patient.

Hilbig emphasized that admission to the Special Hospital is open to any Washington County citizen experiencing acute psychiatric problems. Average length of stay is three weeks. Costs are generally covered by insurance,

for example Blue Cross.

The hospital is located on the first floor of the Samaritan Building, 531 E. Washington Street, West Bend. For additional information on pre-admission screening or evaluation, just call 338-6631 and ask for the intake worker.

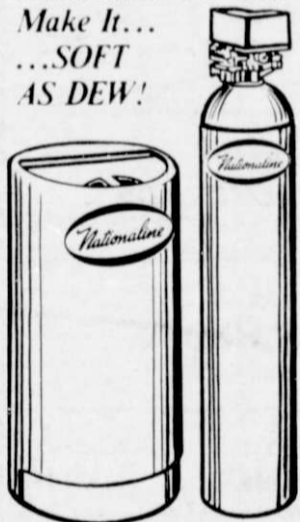

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## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Harbeck:

I have condensed from the latest report the following results of the water analysis survey begun one and one-half years ago of Kewaskum and surrounding communities by Dr. M. E. J. Curzon, Chairman Department of Caries Research of the Eastman Dental Center, Rochester, New York. The survey was concerned with the prevalence of dental decay of young adults of twelve to fourteen years who were life long residents of the area.

Three conclusions are currently supported by the results:

First: As the Strontium level increases the decayed, missing, or filled teeth or surfaces of teeth decreases (this is the standard index used to measure the decay level) until an optimum level is recorded, but as the Strontium level increases greater than ten parts per million of water (PPM) the decay level also increases. Coincidentally, the study results show that the decay level of the test communities was not high relative to the other areas of the U. S. This is due to natural and artificial fluoridation of approximately one part per million of the drinking water.

Second: Mottling of enamel is linearly related to the Strontium level. Mottled enamel is discoloration of teeth due to chemical reaction of the flourine ion with the enamel substructure.

Third: The decay level of children not born in their present locations, that is those arriving between one and six years and six and nine years is directly related to both the topical and de-

velopmental uptake of Strontium. In other words there is more decay in life long residents than in children who moved into the area after the age of one year.

I am cooperating with the study which is continuing with examination of water, saliva, tooth and plaque samples from the test area of Kewaskum. The other test areas included in the study are Eau Claire, Beaver Dam, Little Chute, Kimberly, Union Grove, and Menomonee Falls. As I receive further correspondence from Dr. Curzon I will report the latest results to you.

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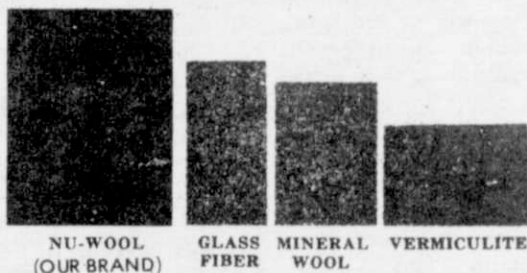

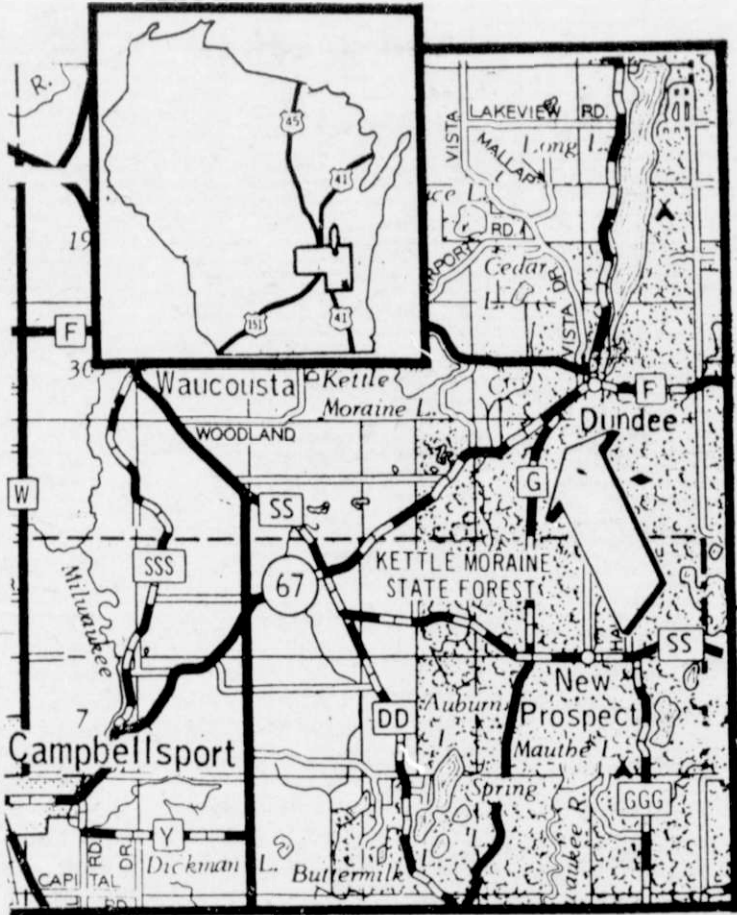

Ice Age Interpretive Center

## Major tourist attraction is planned near Dundee

Fond du Lac County will get still another tourist attraction.

A \$680,000 building, the Ice Age Interpretive Center, will be constructed near Dundee to assist visitors and help them understand the history of the national scientific reserve.

The structure will be at the junction of State Highway 67 and County Highway G a short distance southwest of Dundee.

News of the project was received today from Milwaukee Congressman Henry S. Reuss, who long has been interested in the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve which encompasses much of the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest.

Work on the center will start this spring, and completion date is scheduled for late 1978. Total cost of the center will be \$680,000 — \$170,000 from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, \$170,000 from the U.S. Department of the Interior, and \$340,000 from the federal Land and Water

Conservation Fund.

Two interpretive hiking trails and an auto tour route will originate at the center. It also will feature models of glacial formations, lectures by naturalists, film and audiovisual materials.

From the center, important glacial features such as Dundee Mountain and the Jersey Flats are visible.

The Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest had more than one million visitors in 1975. It is anticipated that at least 500,000 will visit the Interpretive Center annually.

The Ice Age National Scientific Reserve was set up in 1972 to preserve outstanding examples of continental glaciation at nine major units throughout Wisconsin. The new Interpretive Center, like other features of the reserve, will be under the joint jurisdiction of the National Park Service and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

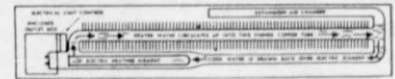


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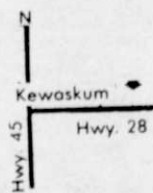


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
