

Fire Destroys Barn on Henry Oppermann Farm

Fire completely destroyed the upper portion of a 136 by 40 foot barn on the Henry Oppermann farm on E. Auburn-Ashford Drive west of New Fane, about three miles north of Kewaskum, Monday night. Kewaskum firemen were called to the scene about 10 p. m.

Also reported damaged was a Harvestore silo and the milk house. The roof of the milk house was burned off

The lower portion of the barn used for milking was also pretty well intact.

The Oppermanns had retired for the night when the fire was discovered almost at the same time by their son, Ronald, who resides on the next farm west, and a passerby, who stopped to alert them. The Oppermanns then called the Kewaskum Fire Department and Mr. Oppermann went to the barn and was able to save all the livebut the equipment was saved. stock, which included over

She states that "she feels that as fast as the programs in teaching are changing, a parent with students in the different grade levels in school is better qualified to deal with the decisions and problems of students and schools." Goeden also states that "there are many things involved with such an important position and I'm willing to learn and do the best that I can."

Inpatient Program At County Mental Center Approved

The Comprehensive Community Services Agency of Washington County announces the recent state approval of its inpatient program at the Washington County Mental Health Center according to Don Hilbig, the Mental Health Coordinator for the county

The State Department of Health and Social Services, Division of Health, has approved the unit as a special hospital for acute care. The inpatient program serves Washington County citizens experiencing acute psychiatric problems and adheres to standards of care under both the State Division of Health and the Division of Mental Hygiene. The program has also been approved for Federal Medical Assistance (Title XIX) funding.

The treatment approach is based on a team concept, combining Psychiatry, Psychology, Nursing and Social Work and utilizing individual, group and family therapy. Occupational and Activity Therapy are also available as indicated by the needs of the patient. Discharge planning and follow-up services are

specialized for each patient. Hilbig emphasized that admission to the Special Hospital is open to any Washington County citizen experiencing acute psychiatric problems. Average length of stay is three weeks. Costs are generally covered by insurance, for example Blue Cross.





January 18, 1977 Dear Mr. and Mrs. Harbeck:

I have condensed from the latest report the following results of the water analysis survey begun one and onehalf years ago of Kewaskum and surrounding communities by Dr. M. E. J. Curzon, Chairman Department of Caries Research of the Eastman Dental Center, Rochester. New York. The survey was concerned with the prevalence of dental decay of young adults of twelve to fourteen years who were life long residents of the area.

Three conclusions are currently supported by the results:

First: As the Strontium level increases the decayed, missing, or filled teeth or surfaces of teeth decreases (this is the standard index used to measure the decay level) until an optium level is recorded, but as the Strontium level increases greater than ten parts per million of water (PPM) the decal level also increases. Coincidentally, the study results show that the decay level of the test communities was not high relative to the other areas of the U.S. This is due to natural and artificial fluoridation of approximately one part per million of the drinking water.

Second: Mottling of enamel is linearly related to the Strontium level. Mottled enamel is discoloration of teeth due to chemical reaction of the flourine ion with the enamel substructure.

Third: The decay level of children not born in their present locations, that is those arriving between one and six years and six and nine years is directly related to both the topical and developmental uptake of Strontium. In other words there is more decay in life long residents than in children who moved into the area after the age of one year.

I am cooperating with the study which is continuing with examination of water, saliva, tooth and plaque samples from the test area of Kewaskum. The other test areas included in the study are Eau Claire, Beaver Dam, Little Chute, Kimberly, Union Grove, and Menomonee Falls. As I receive further correspondence from Dr. Curzon I will report the latest results to you.

Some aspects of art that may be included in the course are: (1) definition, history, and uses of art; (2) the meaning of "modern" art; knowledge of color through the use of paints; (4) good design principles; (5) drawing - showing form and perspective, sketching from life and from photographs, "creative" drawing; (6) paper collage; (7) lino!eum prints; (8) sculpture from ordinary materials; (9) matting of flat work; (10) personal exploration of a favorite art form.

Suggestions are welcome for this course as well as for the content of possible future art courses.

Site of new tourist center

Ice Age Interpretive Center

Major tourist attraction is planned near Dundee

Fond du Lac County will get still another tourist attraction. A \$680,000 building, the Ice

A \$680,000 building, the Ice Age Interpretive Center, will be constructed near Dundee to assist visitors and help them understand the history of the national scientific reserve.

The structure will be at the junction of State Highway 67 and County Highway G a short distance southwest of Dundee.

News of the project was received today from Milwaukee Congressman Henry S. Reuss, who long has been interested in the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve which encompases much of the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest.

Work on the center will start this spring, and completion date is scheduled for late 1978. Total cost of the center will be \$680,000 — \$170,000 from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, \$170,000 from the U.S. Department of the Interior, and \$340,000 from the federal Land and Water

Conservation Fund.

Two interpretive hiking trails and an auto tour route will originate at the center. It also will feature models of glacial formations, lectures by naturalists, film and audiovisual materials.

From the center, important glacial features such as Dundee Mountain and the Jersey Flats are visible.

The Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest had more than one million visitors in 1975. It is anticipated that at least 500,00 will visit the Interpretive Center annually.

The Ice Age National Scientific Resreve was set up in 1972 to preserve outstanding examples of continental glaciation at nine major units throughout Wisconsin. The new Interpretive Center, like other features of the reserve, will be under the joint jurisdiction of the National Park Service and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.


