Primary Election For School Board Members Feb. 15

A School District Board Primary Election will be held in each village or town lying wholly or partially within the Kewaskum School District on Tuesday, Feb. 15, for the purpose of electing two members to the School Board for terms of three years and one member for a term of one year.

Polling places in the village and various townships were listed in last week's issue. Polling hours are from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m.

There are eight candidates for the three positions, thereby necessitating a primary Two candidates will be eliminated in the primary and the remaining six names will then be drawn for their order of appearance on the April 5

The eight candidates appearing on the ballot are: Maryanne Merwin, Jean E. Goeden. John R. Thomas W. Gundrum, Francis J. Standish. James Walters. Richard S. Theusch and Donald J. Hlavaty.

Statewide, voters will also cast ballots for Justice of the Supreme Court and State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The three candidates on the primary ballot for Supreme Court Justice are Trayton L. Lathron, William G. Callow and Robert W. Landry. State Superintendent candidates are Leon Todd, James Scamman. Ninety-one Town of Kewaskum voters turned out Saturday for a caucus that determined the April 5 election ballot.

Allen Koepke, 8390 Kettle View Drive, with 35 votes, and Dolores Prost, 8891 Kettle View Drive, with 32 votes, are the two who will be on the ballot for the treasurer's post. Marilyn Haug, 3326 State 28, with 13 votes, was eliminated.

In the race for the two supervisor's posts, David Dorn, 4280 Ridge Rd., received 40 votes but withdrew, leaving Jerome Herriges, 9065 Hickory Drive, with 45 votes, and Daniel Stoffel, R. 2, with 56 votes. One write-in candidate, Victor Backhaus, R. 2, will also be on the ballot. He received 7 write-ins.

Incumbent Town Chairman, Mervin Thompson, Town Line Road, is being challenged by George Allman, 9205 Hickory Drive. Allman received 47 votes to Thompson's 31 at the caucus.

Town Clerk, Barbara Hinz, 9055 Kettle Moraine Dr., is running unopposed. She received 69 caucus votes.

Law on Following **Emergency Vehicles**

Senate Bill 372 was signed into law. Section 346.90 of the State Statutes has been amended to read, the operator of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow an authorized emergency vehicle responding to a call or alarm closer than 500 feet or drive into or park his vehicle within 300 feet of the driveway entrance or similar point of access to a driveway or road on which fire apparatus has stopped in response to an alarm.

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

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
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

TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a Spring Primary election to be held in the several wards in the County of Washington, on the 15th day of February, 1977, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a nonpartisan primary, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his choice for a

The ballot shall not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsement and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read, that he has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.


