## Primary Election For School Board Members Feb. 15

A School District Board Primary Election will be held in each village or town lying wholly or partially within the Kewaskum School District on Tuesday, Feb. 15, for the purpose of electing two members to the School Board for terms of three years and one member for a term of one year.

Polling places in the village and various townships were listed in last week's issue. Polling hours are from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m.

There are eight candidates for the three positions, thereby necessitating a primary. Two candidates will be eliminated in the primary and the remaining six names will then be drawn for their order of appearance on the April 5 ballot.

The eight candidates appearing on the ballot are: Maryanne Merwin, Jean E. Goeden, John R. Tessar, Thomas W. Gundrum, Francis J. Standish, James Walters, Richard S. Theusch and Donald J. Hlavaty.

Statewide, voters will also cast ballots for Justice of the Supreme Court and State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The three candidates on the primary ballot for Supreme Court Justice are Trayton L. Lathron, William G. Callow and Robert W. Landry. State Superintendent candidates are Leon Todd, James Scamman, Barbara Thompson, John T. Benson, Arlyn F. Wollenburg, Robert L. Gilpatrick, Jr. and Sara J. Sherkow.

## Know Your School Board Candidates

Three more candidates for the Kewaskum School Board primary to be held on February 15 are John Tessar, Richard Theusch and Donald Hlavaty.

John Tessar of 541 Habeck St., Kewaskum, has been a lifelong resident of Kewaskum. He is a graduate of Kewaskum High School and attended University of Wisconsin Milwaukee. He is employed at Regal Ware as Office Manager. Tessar feels his goal as a board member is to strive for better education. The time has come, he feels, "to go back to the '3 R's' to better prepare the students to go out on their own." He also stated that "the cost of running the school system is skyrocketing. I believe we are going to have to take a good hard look on where we can start cutting costs and still give the student a good education." Tessar also feels

that the district is now large enough that the school board members should be represented by each township in the district.

Richard Theusch, Town of Wayne, is a lifelong resident of the Kewaskum area. He attended Kewaskum schools and is employed at Gehl's in West Bend. He has served on the board for six years and is seeking his third term. Theusch stated that "he feels we have accomplished a great many of our goals, but there are more to be done. We all realize the cost of property taxes and everything must be done to keep them at a minimum but still keeping the students in mind."

Donald Hlavaty has been a resident of Kewaskum for the past 10 years. During this time he has served on the Kewaskum Police Department, first as a patrolman and since 1959 as Chief of Police. Hla-

The Kewaskum Village Board met in a short session Monday evening and in the absence of Village President Charles Miller, who is on vacation, Gregor Nigh was appointed President pro-tem until Miller returns.

A building permit was granted to Ervin Waala Jr. for remodeling the second floor of the Regal Outlet Store into a small apartment.

The board approved the certified survey map presented by Wilmer Ramthun and Daniel Schmidt. Schmidt abstained from voting since it applied to him.

Dan Schmidt reported that all necessary papers concerning funding for the park are in Tom Blotz's office and that he talked with Blotz that morning and he would be contacting Schmidt towards the end of the month.

The Kiwanis appropriated \$1,000 toward the erection of the entrance sign at the new park.

Robert Danielsen stated that he was absent from the special meeting called on Feb. 1 because he did not receive his notice of the meeting until 5:45 of the day of the meeting when picking up

his mail. The meeting had started at 5:00 p. m. He read from the ordinance that stated, when a special meeting is called written notice is to be delivered personally; if board member cannot be found, a copy of such notice should be left at the home of the trustee. The board recommended that the members be called for any future special meetings.

A recess was called in order for the finance committee to go over the bills. Upon re-opening the meeting, payment of bills was approved and the meeting adjourned.

## Fire Inspection Training Seminar To Be Held Here

Madison — A Fire Prevention Inspection Training Seminar of the State Fire Prevention Codes will be conducted by the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations for Fire Departments and industry in Washington County area on March 1, 2 and 3, 1977.

The sessions, all of which begin at 7:30 p. m. will be held at the Kewaskum Fire Station, 1106 Fond du Lac Avenue, Kewaskum.

Marvin H. Olson, Fire Prevention Representative, with the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations will conduct the Seminar. Included in the Seminar will be an explanation on how municipalities may receive insurance rebate funds for carrying out the fire inspections in their communities.

The Liquified Petroleum Gas Code will be covered on March 1. The Flammable and Combustible Liquids Code will be covered on March 2. The State Building, Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning Code will be reviewed on March 3. Representatives of Oil Companies, LP Gas Industries and other industries are invited and urged to attend.

## Law on Following Emergency Vehicles

Senate Bill 372 was signed into law. Section 346.90 of the State Statutes has been amended to read, the operator of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow an authorized emergency vehicle responding to a call or alarm closer than 500 feet or drive into or park his vehicle within 300 feet of the driveway entrance or similar point of access to a driveway or road on which fire apparatus has stopped in response to an alarm.

## Town Kewaskum Slate Selected

Ninety-one Town of Kewaskum voters turned out Saturday for a caucus that determined the April 5 election ballot.

Allen Koepke, 8390 Kettle View Drive, with 35 votes, and Dolores Prost, 8891 Kettle View Drive, with 32 votes, are the two who will be on the ballot for the treasurer's post. Marilyn Haug, 3326 State St., with 13 votes, was eliminated.

In the race for the two supervisor's posts, David Dorn, 4280 Ridge Rd., received 40 votes but withdrew, leaving Jerome Herriges, 9065 Hickory Drive, with 45 votes, and Daniel Stoffel, R. 2, with 56 votes. One write-in candidate, Victor Backhaus, R. 2, will also be on the ballot. He received 7 write-ins.

Incumbent Town Chairman, Mervin Thompson, 9592 Town Line Road, is being challenged by George Allman, 9205 Hickory Drive. Allman received 47 votes to Thompson's 31 at the caucus.

Town Clerk, Barbara Hinz, 9055 Kettle Moraine Dr., is running unopposed. She received 69 caucus votes.

The caucus committee for the next two years will remain the same. They are Edward Dorn, 73 votes, Wesley Haug, 70, and Carl Herriges, 70.

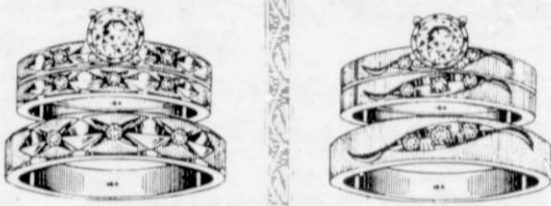

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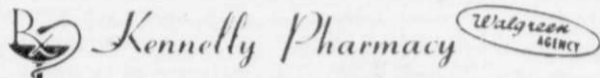


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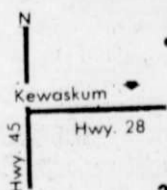

## FACSIMILE BALLOT NOTICE OF JUDICIAL AND STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION ELECTIONS FEBRUARY 15, 1977

OFFICE OF WASHINGTON COUNTY CLERK

### TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a Spring Primary election to be held in the several wards in the County of Washington, on the 15th day of February, 1977, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a nonpartisan primary, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

The ballot shall not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsement and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read, that he has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.

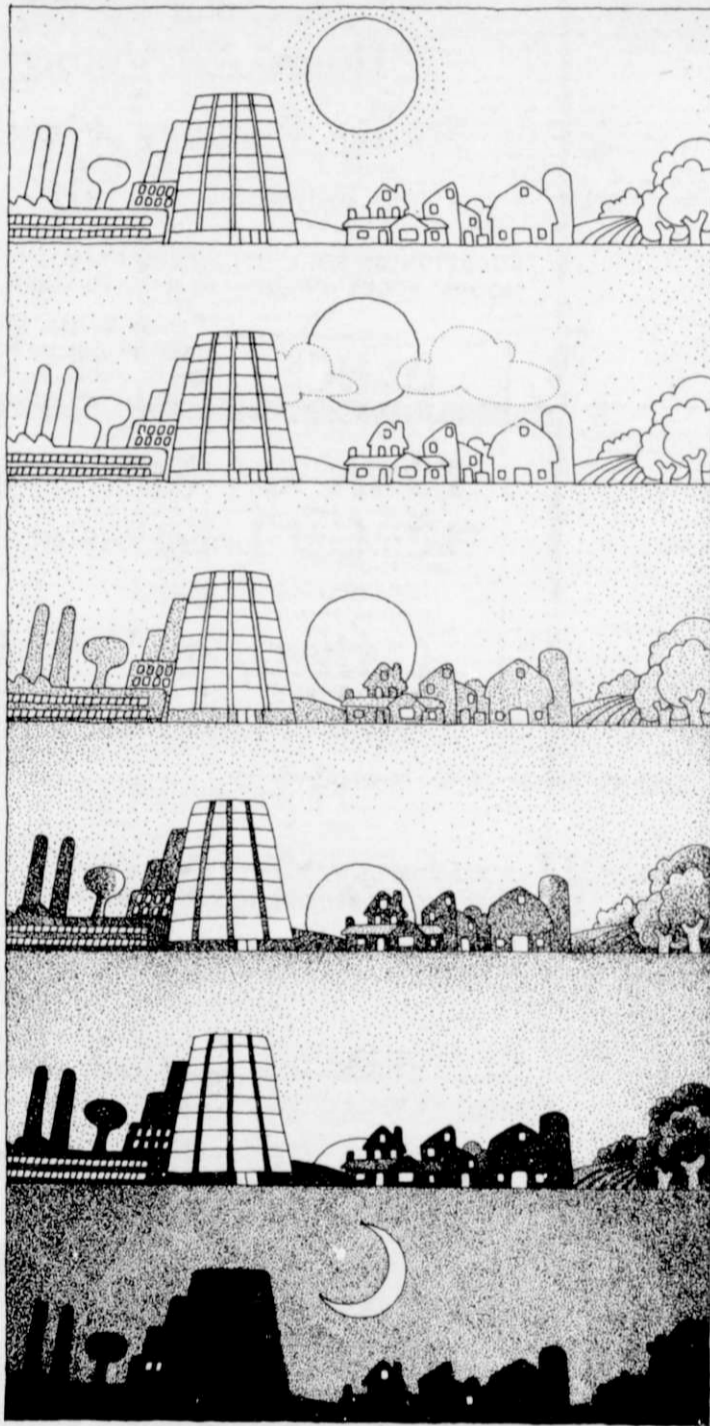

# There are good times and bad times to use electricity.

## The difference is like night and day.

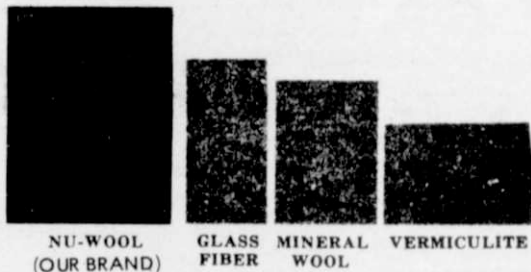
